It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Hutchison, to accept the Consent Calendar, with the exception of items f, j and k, requested by Hupp to be removed for later discussion. MOTION CARRIED unanimously.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

1. Phyllis Dalton, Library Consultant from Sacramento, California, was introduced by Ruth Green, Milwaukie Librarian, and briefly explained her program, which is to develop a county-wide library service that is equitably funded and provides service to everyone.
2. Certified Building Inspector provided by International Conference of Building Officials was presented to Jim Mishler, city Building Inspector.

NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL REPORTS

Neighborhood Council 4 reports Tom Hopkins, Duke Fugitt and Chet Wolters have resigned from Board positions, and recommends that Virginia Kopp and Mary Kearns be appointed to regular positions, and Bill Burbach and Lloyd Miller to alternate positions. It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Hutchison, to accept the NC 4 Board recommendation and appoint Virginia Kopp and Mary Kearns to regular positions, and Bill Burbach and Lloyd Miller to alternate positions. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

Neighborhood Council 2 and 3 have sent letter to the Commission on Postal Services, Washington DC, concerning postal problems.

Neighborhood Council 1 has sent memo recommending additional members on the Riverfront Development Committee from the NC 1 area. It was Council consensus that the Neighborhood Council be notified the Co-chairmen of the committee will welcome their attendance, and if there are members who would like official appointment, they should get in touch with a Councilmember.

Neighborhood Council 2 reports that Mai Kiigemagi has resigned, and recommends appointment of Fred Liddell to a Board position, and appointment of Ellen Wiseman as alternate. It was MOVED by Hutchison, SECONDED by Swan, to accept the resignation of Mai Kiigemagi and appoint Fred Liddell to a Board position and Ellen Wiseman as alternate. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

CORRESPONDENCE

I. Herman P. Bauer, 10966 SE 42nd Avenue, and L. W. Judd, 9529 SE 32nd Avenue, have written letters critical of provisions of the city's newly-enacted business license ordinance requiring business license for duplex and single-family rentals. It was Council consensus that after March 1 all complaints will be considered and possibly turned over to the committee that recommended the ordinance for recommendation, and if necessary, refunds will be made to those who have paid a business license fee that is later eliminated in an amended ordinance.

PRESENTATION ON TRI-COUNTY LOCAL GOVERNMENT COMMISSION

Alan Brickley, representing Tri-County Local Government Commission, described the Commission's proposal now before the Legislature.

APPOINTMENTS TO CITY ADVISORY BODIES

Council had requested staff inquire of those persons whose terms on city advisory bodies are expiring as to whether they would be willing to accept reappointment. The following persons have indicated willingness to be reappointed:

- Traffic Safety Commission: David McConnon and Dick Samuels
- Budget Committee: Wallace Bischoff and Donald W. Graf
- Planning Commission: Robert D. Kennedy

It was MOVED by Hutchison, that Robert Kennedy and Robert Gudgel be reappointed to the Planning Commission. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

It was MOVED by Hupp, SECONDED by Swan, that Donald L. Trotter be appointed to fill out the rest of Jon Nickel's term on the Planning Commission. After discussion of the fact that Mr. Trotter does not reside in the city, the motion was WITHDRAWN.

It was MOVED by Hupp, SECONDED by Burgess, that Jim Lotz be appointed to the Planning Commission to fill out the remainder of Jon Nickel's term. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Hutchison, that Wallace Bischoff and Donald W. Graf be reappointed to the Budget Committee, and that Diane C. Brock be appointed as a new member of the Budget Committee. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Hupp, to reappoint Dave McConnon and Dick Samuels to the Traffic Safety Commission. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

JOINT WORK SESSION WITH PLANNING COMMISSION

The Planning Commission has invited Council to meet with the Commission at their next work session to discuss potential expansion of the business-commercial core of downtown Milwaukie. It was the consensus to hold this meeting at 7 p.m. March 8.

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LETTER FROM COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Mayor has received letter from County Commissioners, dated February 7, 1977, concerning funding of social service agencies. A letter of appreciation will be sent to the county. Councilwoman Burgess will represent Milwaukie at meetings of the County Department of Human Resources.

ORDINANCES REGULATING DISRUPTIVE BUSINESSES

Council had requested staff draft an ordinance or ordinances regulating disruptive businesses, and proposed ordinances have been prepared. It was MOVED by Hutchison, SECONDED by Hupp, to refer the matter of proposed changes in the zoning ordinance dealing with drinking establishments to the Planning Commission, and refer back to staff for restudy and rewriting the proposed ordinance amending Ordinance 1257 dealing with sexual and related offenses. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

BARTHOLOMY VARIANCE APPEAL

At a prior Council meeting an appeal of a Planning Commission decision by Trixie Bartholomy was presented. The Planning Commission was asked to submit a recommendation that would allow the home business requested, and Council directed the matter be placed on the February 7 agenda. However, the Planning Commission has not yet dealt with the matter, and therefore Council can take no action.

APPROVAL FOR SIGNATURE - FURNBERG PARK DEVELOPMENT PHASE II

Parks and Recreation Branch of State Department of Transportation has sent Land and Water Conservation Fund Agreements for the above project. It was MOVED by Swan, SECONDED by Hutchison, to authorize the Mayor to sign the agreements for funding. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

APPROVAL FOR SIGNATURE - ANIMAL CONTROL AGREEMENT

The city has applied for and the county has provided an agreement which will permit the city of Milwaukie to issue dog licenses to its residents. It was MOVED by Hutchison, SECONDED by Swan, to approve signature of the agreement. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

FIRE DISTRICT LETTER AND RESPONSE

Council has received copy of letter from Clackamas County Fire District No. 1, dated January 19, concerning Fire Service Study Committee, and Manager's response, dated February 3.

WORK SESSION ON GOAL-SETTING

Council has expressed interest in setting a date for a work session to discuss setting city goals. It was decided each councilmember will list several goals to be included in the next regular meeting agenda packet. It was Council consensus to ask Neighborhood Councils for input on goal-setting, and a meeting date will be decided later.

MEMO REGARDING AIR EVACUATION SYSTEM

Manager has written memo regarding bill introduced at Legislature which would prohibit smoking in public places. It was MOVED by Hupp, SECONDED by Burgess, that staff proceed forthwith with implementation of installation of the air evacuation system in Council Chambers. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

STP LANDSCAPING

County Public Works Department has written letter, dated February 2, 1977, concerning landscaping modification at Kellogg Creek Water Pollution Control Plant.

DISCUSSION OF HUGHES V. ELDRIDGE CASE

There was general discussion of city policy on assuming expenses incident to the defense of city employees in lawsuits, and indemnifying employees from punitive damages. It was decided to discuss the circumstances of the particular lawsuit in question in executive session before making a policy decision.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 5-1977 - TRANSFER OF FUNDS

It was MOVED by Swan, SECONDED by Hupp, to read Resolution Number 5-1977 (A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS TO REAPPORTION THE 1976-77 BUDGET) by title only. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered. It was MOVED by Hutchison, SECONDED by Swan, to adopt Resolution 5-1977. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

CLERICAL PROMOTION IN PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Manager has written memo, dated February 3, 1977, concerning clerical promotion in Public Works Department. It was MOVED by Hutchison, SECONDED by Swan, to authorize the Manager to initiate a promotional examination for Clerk Typist in Public Works Department. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 6-1977 - ZONING, SUBDIVISION, SIGN AND DESIGN REVIEW FEES

It was Council consensus to add the words "or City Council" at the end of the last sentence on the first page of the resolution, and add transcript charge of \$5 per hour, with \$100 maximum to the \$40 appeal fee. It was MOVED by Hutchison, SECONDED by Burgess, to read Resolution Number 6-1977 (A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING FEES FOR APPLICATIONS UNDER ZONING, SUBDIVISION, SIGN AND DESIGN REVIEW ORDINANCES), as amended, by title only. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered. It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Swan, to adopt Resolution 6-1977. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 7-1977 - SEWER ASSESSMENTS ON CHURCH PROPERTIES

It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Hutchison, to read Resolution Number 7-1977 (A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A CONTRACT PAYMENT PLAN FOR SEWER ASSESSMENTS ON CHURCH PROPERTIES) by title only. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered. It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Swan, to adopt Resolution 7-1977. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

BUSINESS LICENSES FOR FARMS

A question has arisen with respect to the application of the recent business license and business tax ordinances to farmers. It was

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MOVED by Hupp, SECONDED by Swan, to direct staff that a farm be assessed the minimum fee of \$20 for operating their farm as a business. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered. It was decided this matter will be referred to the Business License Review Committee after March 1.

DELINQUENT AND UNBONDED SEWER AND OTHER ASSESSMENTS

It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Swan, to accept the recommendation of staff to turn over a list of property owners who are delinquent or who have not bonded their sewer and other assessments, to the City Attorney for his use in pursuing foreclosures. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

LETTER REGARDING BOAT RAMP

Manager has written State Marine Board, dated February 3, concerning the Board's grant-in-aid allocation for reconstruction of Willamette River boat ramp, and the Board has responded. The bids are substantially more than the grant amount. It was MOVED by Burgess, SECONDED by Swan, to authorize the Manager to move ahead with the project forthwith. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

BIKE/PEDESTRIAN PATHWAYS

Councilman Swan has written memo, dated February 2, 1977, requesting the city make construction of bike/pedestrian pathways a number one priority. It was MOVED by Manuel, SECONDED by Hutchison, to direct staff to prepare a proposal based on the top four proposals in the bike plan and present it to Council as soon as possible. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

OTHER BUSINESS

1. Parks and Recreation Commission has written memo, dated February 3, 1977, concerning North Clackamas Park.
2. Councilman Hutchison stated state law now requires anyone who spends more than 16 hours per quarter communicating with anyone in Legislature to register as a lobbyist.
3. It was MOVED by Swan, SECONDED by Hutchison, to authorize signing of Scott Park development fund agreement, sent by Parks and Recreation Branch of State Department of Transportation. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.
4. Since the regular meeting date falls on a holiday, the next regular Council meeting will be held on February 28. The public hearing on Mary Court will be held on March 7.
5. It was Council consensus that broken equipment at Century Park be repaired.

PAYMENT OF BILLS

It was MOVED by Swan, SECONDED by Burgess, that the bills listed for February 7, 1977 payment be approved for payment. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.

REGULAR SESSION

Meeting returned to regular session at 11:45 p.m.

OTHER BUSINESS


1. It was MOVED by Swan, SECONDED by Hutchison, to retain the services of Bruce Bischof as the city's bargaining representative at an amount not to exceed \$6000. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.
2. It was MOVED by Swan, SECONDED by Burgess, that the city indemnify Donald R. Jones and Ronald Justice for punitive damages and legal expenses in the case of Hughes v. Eldridge et al. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.
3. It was Council consensus to accept City Attorney's recommendation to pay \$400 to Tim Deggendorfer for sewer easement, to settle the case of City v. Deggendorfer.
4. It was MOVED by Swan, SECONDED by Hutchison, to accept the Manager's recommendation to pay Robert Kincaid \$300 for services as city's representative in Fire and Police factfinding. MOTION CARRIED unanimously and so ordered.
