**CITY OF MILWAUKIE
CITY COUNCIL MEETING
MAY 5, 1987**

The one thousand five hundred and twenty-seventh meeting of the Milwaukie City Council was called to order at 7:05 p.m. on May 5, 1987, with the following Councilmembers present:

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Richard Holm thanked the City and particularly Don Robertson for Down-to-Earth Day. Because of a recent after-dark robbery of a pedestrian near the library, Mr. Holm suggested the City lighting that area.

Al Liane thanked City Manager Brown for a letter clarifying his questions regarding management raises. He also requested the City investigate a vehicle which had been parked at Home and Monroe for a long period of time.

Lloyd Woods of the "Clackamas County Review" announced the election issue forum to be held by League of Women Voters (MECCA) at the Milwaukie Senior Center, May 11 from 7-9 p.m.

Mart Hughes, 3006 SE Washington, of the Greater Milwaukie Neighborhood Association urged citizen involvement in city government. He also told Council of questions he had concerning the 911 system within the City.

Richard Holm asked for an explanation of library funding -- what portion is covered by the County?

City Manager Hugh Brown told Mr. Holm the City funded approximately \$100,000 or 1/3 of the library budget. Regarding the 911 question, Brown replied it was a portion of the fire and police dispatch and operated efficiently and effectively. He referred Mr. Hughes to Chief Goodpaster for further information.

Mart Hughes asked that Council promote a better dialogue with its citizens, and **Mayor Hall** replied the budget process had been open to the public, and the City staff was available for questions regarding programs.

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Councilmember Sandusky said that figures had been prepared regarding the levy request and would be published in the "Review" the following week. **Mayor Hall** replied the May edition of the "Messenger" also contained information.

Mayor Roger Hall read a proclamation naming the week of May 3 - 9 as "Fire Appreciation Week".

OTHER BUSINESS

Sheriff's Levy

Darlene Hooley, Clackamas County Commissioner, and **Mike Swanson**, Clackamas County CEO, were present to urge the City Council's endorsement of the three-year levy and to encourage an era of cooperation through the Blue Ribbon Committee. Swanson said it was anticipated the group would study the process and reach an equitable solution within 2 years. **Mayor Hall** asked about the length of the timeframe, and Swanson said those who were appointed would be asked to volunteer a great deal of time to a complex issue.

Councilmember Lomnicki stated his opposition to the Sheriff's Levy saying that although police services are important, taxes were levied upon people who were not receiving services. He also stated a two-year timeframe was too long. **Lomnicki** suggested either two levies, one for incorporated areas and a separate one for unincorporated areas, or the county's contracting for services from the City.

Mayor Hall said he felt working together on "mutual concern" as stated in the letter to Chairman Lindquist was of greatest importance. **Mike Swanson** told Council that both he and the County respected the differences of opinions, but asked they remember the interdependence of the parties involved and the importance of indirect benefits. **Councilmember Lomnicki** said he understood the interdependence but felt cities should not subsidize rural residents.

Mart Hughes suggested the formation of special service district in rural areas, and he urged Council to protect residents from such inequities. **Richard Holm** said he understood the complexity of the situation but felt two years was too long.

Councilmember Sandusky said she felt the initial neutrality of the City had helped shape the idea of the Blue Ribbon Committee and supported the contents of the letter to Chairman Lindquist. **Councilmember Richmond** said he felt progress was being made and expressed approval of the letter.

It was moved by **Councilmember Sandusky** and seconded by **Councilmember Richmond** to accept the contents of the letter to Chairman Lindquist endorsing the Sheriff's Levy and the formation of a Blue Ribbon Committee. Motion passed 3 - 2 with Councilmembers Lomnicki and Fitzgerald voting against.

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Consideration of Intergovernmental Agreement between City of Milwaukie and Clackamas County Regarding Harmony/Lake Road Improvements Steve Hall, Public Works Director, presented the staff report in which he outlined the areas of responsibility for the project and recommended Council authorization.

It was moved by **Councilmember Richmond** and seconded by **Councilmember Sandusky** to authorize the Mayor and City Manager to sign the intergovernmental agreement. Motion passed 5 - 0.

Citizen Action Board. It was moved by **Councilmember Richmond** and seconded by **Councilmember Sandusky** to appoint **Councilmember Lonnicki** to the board. Motion passed 5 - 0.

Comprehensive Plan Review Committee. **Councilmember Lonnicki** volunteered to be City Council representative on the committee.

Scheduling **City Manager Hugh Brown** asked Council to note the following meetings: (1) May 8, Chamber of Commerce Meeting regarding street maintenance, (2) May 14, Chamber of Commerce Business Fair, (3) May 16, City Birthday Party, (4) May 20, Clackamas Cities dinner meeting.

CONSENT AGENDA

It was moved by **Councilmember Lonnicki** and seconded by **Councilmember Sandusky** to approve the Consent Agenda which consisted of the City Council minutes of April 21, 1987. Motion passed 5 - 0.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:35 p.m.
