### A life filled with City service



Bill, who's now 87 years old, says that what raised his ire the most was the fact that Milwaukie's government wasn't accessible to the people. Bill



So Bill ran for office and won and tried to change some of these things. As a result, City Meetings began to be electronically recorded, meetings were better publicized and held in more public places as opposed to the restaurants they were sometimes held in, and the Council Chambers was outfitted with microphones so people could hear what was going on.

Over the years, Bill has invested countless hours in his community, and he thanks Ann, his wife of 60 years, for being so supportive and understanding of everything he's done through the years.

## Urban Forestry Program begins public review

Last month, an article in the *Pilot* detailed plans of an Urban Forestry Program and ordinance. A public outreach effort for the ordinance is underway and will likely extend through March.

Now is the time to give the City Council your ideas and opinions about this ordinance that aims to preserve the trees

and Neighborhood livability in Milwaukie.

Here are some of the elements of this proposed ordinance that will help the City reach these goals.

Permits would be required for tree removal and major pruning on properties that met the following criteria:

- Four or more trees six inches or

greater in diameter removed per calendar year on private property greater than 10,000 square feet.

- Four or more trees six inches in diameter or greater removed on private property concurrent with building permit applications or Planning De-

## City looks to adjust storm rate

In Oregon, we can't ask our rain to "come again some other day." Managing the impact of rainwater is a major responsibility of the City's stormwater division.

The stormwater division has two major functions. First, every day, they make sure our drainage system works and meets environmental standards. Second, they build projects. Some recent projects include large drywells at Home and Monroe Streets and a new storm pipe on Brookside Drive.

The City pays for the stormwater pro-

gram through a utility fee. Each residential customer pays \$4 a month. Businesses are charged based on the amount of square footage of pavement and buildings on their property.

In June of 1999, the City's Citizen Utility Advisory Board recommended that the City Council increase the utility fee from \$4 to \$6 per month. The fee has not been increased since 1994, and inflation has decreased the buying power of these fees.

The proposed rate increase will help

## City Manager addresses some common questions

The Mayor, City staff, and I met with several downtown business owners and citizens on September 30, 1999, to discuss concerns about how the City works with businesses in Milwaukie's downtown. I believe this meeting will help the City improve its working relationship with every business in Milwaukie.

Several questions were asked at that meeting, and those same questions have been asked at subsequent meetings. So I'll use this space to address some of these common concerns.

**What is the status of the Safeway Building/Transit Center?**

Milwaukie is one step closer to relocating the transit center to the old Safeway site. This would move the transit center from an unsafe on-street location to an off-street location designed for safer transfer of riders between buses.

Tri-Met has allocated funds for the first phase of the transit center construction. This will allow Tri-Met to purchase part of the site and begin planning the next steps in designing the transit center.

The total estimated cost of the transit center is \$3.3 million. Milwaukie, Tri-Met, and Metro are committed to completing this project. Milwaukie has already made a significant contribution to this project's success by leasing the Safeway building for two years.

**Why is the sign code enforced in some cases and not in others?**

Milwaukie conducts code enforcement on a complaint basis. This allows staff to respond to those violations and issues that are causing immediate concern to citizens. We do initiate enforcement actions without a complaint when there is an issue of public health, safety, or welfare.

**Why was parking removed for buses, how much was removed, what was the process and were downtown**

**businesses notified?**

Seven parking spaces have been removed in downtown Milwaukie. Tri-Met, in response to hundreds of requests from citizens throughout Clackamas County, dramatically increased the frequency of service on one of its weekly routes from once every thirty minutes to once every fifteen minutes. This more frequent service required additional space for buses to stack and wait.

Usually the City confers with the Downtown Association when a citizen or a downtown business requests a change in downtown parking. We did not make contact with the Downtown Association in this case due to time constraints. I apologize for the notice not being as timely as it should have been.

# Finance Director set for budget

January marks Finance Director Jan Gehlen's first year anniversary with the City, so the Pilot thought it would be a perfect time to catch up with her and get to know her a little better.

## Q. What is it that got you interested in Finance?

A. I think I'm more of a generalist than a specialist, and as a generalist you have a little bit of knowledge in a wide variety of areas. And being in Finance, if you keep your eyes open and your ears open and take advantage of every learnable moment, you can learn a lot about how City's function, and I like that.

## Q. The Budget process is heating up, isn't it?

A. It's moving right along. We've already had a budget committee meeting and we've set some meeting dates for the spring. We're looking at Feb. 7, April 3 and May 15, at a minimum.

# Learn how to treat your river right

The Oregon Environmental Council has produced a nifty flier called "50 Ways to Love Your River" with hot tips on how to help protect the Willamette River for recreation, healthy wildlife and drinkable water. If you're interested in one of these fliers, compliments of the City of Milwaukie, call Program Services Coordinator JoAnn Herrigel at 786-7508. Here are some sample tips:

- Sweep patios and sidewalks rather than hosing them. Hosing wastes water and carries contaminants into rivers.
- If you wash your car at home do it

on the grass instead of in the street so your grass and soil can filter contaminants from the runoff.

- If you live on a creek or river your stewardship is especially important. Plant native trees and shrubs along the banks to provide shade and habitat for birds, bugs and wildlife.

## A heads-up on Measure 56

On Jan. 7, 2000 the City will be sending property owners a notice that might raise a few eyebrows.

The notice, required by State law as a result of the passing of Ballot Measure 56, will include the following mandated language: "The Milwaukie Planning Division has proposed a land use regulation that may affect the permissible uses of your land and may reduce your property value."

The regulations the notice will reference are those introduced by the Urban Forestry Program.

Despite such cautionary language, the City of Milwaukie has not determined that property values will be affected as a result of the Program's regulations.

In addition to complying with Ballot Measure 56, the notice will provide citizens with details concerning the Urban Forestry Program as well as important public hearing and Open House information.

partment review.

- Removal of single trees, 18 inches in diameter, or greater.
- The City would complete an inventory of Significant Trees and would require owner consent.
- Tree Removal of any size tree in the public right-of-way and on City-owned property.

In the first week of January a notice describing the ordinance will be mailed to every property owner in the City. This notice will also detail the Open House and public hearing dates and times. (see story to the left for more details)

This Open House is currently scheduled to be held on Jan. 19 at 6:30 p.m. in the Public Safety Building Community Meeting Room. Maps, display boards and brochures will be on hand, and citizens will have a chance to speak directly to City staff about the ordinance.

In February there will be Planning Commission public hearings, and in March the City Council will hold a public hearing discussing the ordinance.

Milwaukie meet three goals:

- **Operate and maintain our existing system.** Our day-to-day activities include cleaning and clearing drywells and catch basins, testing the quality of water, and limiting erosion.
- **Build projects to solve drainage problems.** Much of Milwaukie was built without adequate drainage systems. The Stormwater Master Plan identified \$15 million in projects needed to improve drainage in Milwaukie.
- **Protect the natural environment.** The listing of several species of salmon and steelhead as "threatened" under the federal Endangered Species Act changes how we manage rainwater. We will need to do even more to reduce pollution in our stormwater.

The Milwaukie City Council will hold a public hearing at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 1, 2000 in the City Council Chambers of Milwaukie City Hall to hear your thoughts on the proposed fee increase.

The City Council will make a decision about the proposed rate increase on Feb. 15, 2000. You can call 786-7600 with questions about the City's stormwater program. ☐

Willow Streets.

The acquisition marked the first time the City implemented its Parks, Open Spaces and Trails (POST) Program, a program that helps the City compete for available lands by affording the City Manager more latitude in entering the negotiating process in areas of the City that are currently under served by parks and open spaces.

Assistant City Manager Charlene Richards oversees such park acquisitions, and she says the POST program really played a role in taking advantage of the available land.

The land obtained is just under an acre large, and the City is currently in the process of clearing the site so that it's more visually appealing and easier to maintain.

The land was identified through a combination of efforts made by Lewelling's park subcommittee and Steve Campbell, the City's Code Compliance Officer. The committee had alerted the City of some of the parcels, and

through Steve's work with Clackamas County, he was able to alert the City when the final pieces of the puzzle became available.

The site will undergo the Master Planning process, which defines future uses that can be phased in over a period of time. Charlene said the city would work with volunteers to expedite the planning process and to conduct some smaller projects on the properties.

The year is winding down, and if we all survive Y2K and wake up alive on New Year's Day, we have a lot to look forward to. The City Council is racing along on a fast track to completely renovate old river city, from the Riverfront up to and including the Milwaukie Middle School.

The Riverfront Project is great: connecting the City to its original historic roots, the river, is long overdue and most welcome. Deciding on the final plan will be a painstaking task, because there are so many positive natural attributes on the waterfront and there has been such an outpouring of ideas from the Riverfront Committee and the public at large.

The Milwaukie Middle School is a completely different story. It is at this

point that the people who are ramrodding this project had better sit down and take a long hard look at what they are doing.

First, the site is going to be overloaded with residential and business development. Where are they going to park the hundreds of cars associated with such large projects? Second, not one person, from the Mayor to the City Manager or the Planning Department, can tell you how they can possibly handle all of the traffic that will be generated by this huge complex.

Harrison, Monroe and Washington Streets, and collectors from Highway 224, already present problems for the City, and will be overloaded to such an extent that our neighborhood will be completely overrun, and eventually, cease to exist as it is today. The infrastructure and transportation alternatives are not in place at this time to accommodate such change.

This whole scenario: forced density, the overwhelming of our infrastructure, the lack of sensitivity to neighborhood

concerns by our civic leaders, is reminiscent of Metro's attack on our City with Light Rail.

Hector Campbell's meeting on Dec. 13 was quite busy and featured some great presentations.

Susan Finch of Metro's transportation department got the meeting started by giving a presentation about the kick-off of the South Corridor Transportation Study. She indicated that Milwaukie is an important player in this process and encouraged involvement and input from neighborhood groups. She informed residents that the citizen working groups would begin their work soon, and that she would keep the neighborhood informed about their progress.

Milwaukie Planning Director Alice Rouyer then addressed the residents and presented the proposed elements of private property regulation in the
