

Mayor to build relationships

Jim Bernard will take the oath of office on April 17, 2001 and become Milwaukie's 27th mayor.

Jim won the March 13, 2001 election by a fairly wide margin, and is anxious to begin pursuing the objectives he ran on throughout the campaign.

The day after his victory, Jim explained his primary goal is to repair what he perceives to be the strained relationships that have developed between the City and its citizens. In fact, Jim says the fractious climate in the City is what drew him to run in the first place.

Mike Swanson, City Manager Pro Tem and acting Budget Officer, wants to uncomplicate the process so the Budget Committee and citizens can draw relationships between the figures and the City services the figures support.

Safety Patrol keeps students safe

Every morning and every afternoon members of Ardenwald Elementary's Safety Patrol take to the intersections surrounding their school to make sure their peers have safe passage to school.

There are more than 40 members of the Patrol. They're from the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades, and all of them have passed an application process requiring signatures from their parents and teachers.

For good reason, members of the Patrol seem to take a certain amount of pride in their positions. Asked what the attraction was to become a crossing guard, loanida Costache said it was helping protect others.

"I saw the older kids doing it and I thought it was really cool how they were helping other kids," loanida said.

Joey Kulm said he joined the ranks for similar reasons.

"I just wanted to help people get across the street so they have to someone to help them." Joey said.

Of course, participation isn't hurt by the fact that members who complete their week rotation are treated to ice cream, and by the fact that safety patrollers are rewarded with an all-expense paid trip to Oaks Park at the end

of the school year.

But after talking with a handful of Safety Patrol members, it's clear that holding the responsibility of providing safety for others is its own reward.

"I'm proud (to be on the patrol) because you have to take care of people," Cassy Beaulieu explained, "so that makes you feel special."

City Manager search moves on

City Council has sketched a picture of Milwaukie's next City Manager and now it's up to the recruiter to find candidates matching the description.

Council submitted a brochure to Murray & Associates, the City's hired recruiter, outlining the challenges and opportunities facing our community and the characteristics the next City Manager should possess in order to best lead our community.

Managing traffic, gaining financial stability, and implementing the Downtown and Riverfront Plan were listed

among the primary issues facing the City, while "excellent communicator", "problem solver" and "facilitator" were among the terms describing the desired traits.

Now that the brochure has been submitted, the position will be advertised in national publications, and Murray & Associates will conduct a focused search. The recruiter will present a short list of candidates for Council's consideration, with interviews to be held in spring.

The new City Manager is scheduled to be in place by June or July. □

Results of citizen survey reported

At the March 12, 2001 work session Public Information Officer Michelle Gregory presented Council with the mountain of data collected from last September's citizen survey.

The survey was sent to every mailing address in Milwaukie, and of the 16,000 sent out, 673 were returned.

The survey was designed to find out how citizens judge the quality and the importance of a variety of government services. Respondents were asked to assign a value of 1 to 5 to each category, 1 being the lowest quality and importance, and 5 being the highest. This information will help City Staff, the Budget Committee and Council as they allocate public resources in the future.

More than 60 categories and subcategories were surveyed. With each primary category we show the average quality and importance, as rated by the respondents.

Overall, responding citizens rated the City's services as above average. By comparing each categories' quality level with its rated importance, the data tells us what citizens value and where they would like to see improvements.

The most important services included 911, Police, Fire, Waste Disposal, and Public Works functions. People indicated the City needs to improve its street maintenance, and increase the number of sidewalks, open spaces and natural areas.

Respondents also reported a need for improved building services and more nuisance control, especially with regard to noise reduction.

There were also several comments concerning long term growth issues such as traffic, transportation, and the Downtown and Riverfront Revitalization Plan.

The City would like to thank everyone who participated in the survey. Your feedback, both positive and negative, is important.

McLoughlin project receives \$1.9 million in funding

The City has received a grant from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) for \$1.9 million worth of boulevard improvements for the stretch of McLoughlin Boulevard that currently separates Milwaukie's downtown core from its riverfront.

Improving pedestrian access, slowing down traffic and sprucing up the boulevard between these two areas are key components of the Downtown and Riverfront Plan, which was adopted in August of 2000.

This grant will help realize the Plan's goals by making the public riverfront more accessible and safer to get to.

Planning, design and right of way acquisition for the project is in progress. A project team of staff from Milwaukie, ODOT and the transportation consulting firm of DKS will be meeting with affected property owners this spring to work out access management concerns.

Construction is projected to begin in the summer of 2003.



Tri-Met discusses moving the Transit Center

Tri-Met is planning to relocate the Milwaukie Transit Center to a new location to improve traffic flow and enhance Milwaukie's downtown livability.

The project, a key component of the Milwaukie Downtown Plan, involves moving the existing on-street facility at Jackson Street and 21st Avenue to a more centralized location to address growing concerns about traffic congestion and enhance prospects for future development in the area.

The new transit center is proposed for the former Safeway site at Main Street and Harrison Streets. The existing on-street transit center has poor pedestrian access, lacks adequate rider amenities, and negatively impacts local traffic.

Moving the transit center to its new location will also return parking along Jackson and 21st Streets. For the more than 4,000 riders that use it each day, the transit center will serve as a major hub, connecting 12 bus lines from four major areas including Clackamas Regional Center, Oregon City, Portland and Milwaukie.

Tri-Met is waiting for federal funding approval before moving forward on the design phase of the project. When funding on the project is secured, Tri-Met will be working closely with local organizations, neighbors and businesses to design a transit center that is functional, attractive and also minimizes impacts to the adjacent users, such as the Ledding Library and Masonic Lodge. The initial design plan includes:

- 14 bus bays
- Landscaping, lighting
- Sound "buffering" treatments
- Covered shelters
- Better visibility of Scott Park
- Public art

Starting later this spring, you can expect to see more information on the Milwaukie web site, in [The Pilot](#) and on display boards at the Ledding Library and City Hall. Tri-Met will also hold public open houses, and make presentations to local neighborhood and business associations.

Milwaukie Pool gets ready for summer splash

For the past 75 years the Milwaukie Pool has been the place where many of the City's children have learned to swim. This summer won't be any different.

Maybe it's the pool's rich history that has made it such a Milwaukie landmark and has established it as one of the community's most valued resources.

"There's a lot of emotion attached to that pool," said Dave DeVore, a Milwaukie resident and member of the Friends of the Milwaukie Pool. "It's a well-loved place, it's pretty amazing."

The Pool will conduct more than 3,500 lessons throughout the summer, but it's surprising how quickly the classes fill-up. Each session lasts for 2 weeks of 10 lessons, and cost \$35.

There are beginner, intermediate and advanced classes, and quality,

individual attention is assured as class sizes are limited to about eight people. To register call Laird Prouty of the North Clackamas Park District at (503) 653-3834.

While class revenue generates a good sum of money, Dave is looking for donations to ensure the Pool will be able to cover operation costs and any unexpected maintenance costs.

Dave is hoping to raise \$20,000 and he's already made some good headway, thanks in large part to the \$3,000 the Neighborhood Associations have donated in grant money.

"I felt that I could help resolve some of the negative attitudes that have developed between the community and the City," Jim said. "I love this town, and this was an opportunity I couldn't pass up."

In Jim's opinion, establishing open lines of communication is the key to improving the ties between the City and citizens.

"I'm going to make an effort to really get out there as a mayor and as a

City Council for some face to face communication ... to find out what the community wants," Jim said.

Jim's term runs until December of 2002, and in that time he hopes to hold eight Town Hall meetings, improve relationships with regional partners and lay the groundwork that will lead to the removal of the Kellogg Sewage Treatment Plant. Terry Marthaller, recently retired from the Police Department, talked about the new community policing program.

Volunteers are trained by the retired police officers and learn specific tactics and procedures to get rid of certain problems. If there's an abandoned car in your Neighborhood, there may be a solution for you if you take the time to be a volunteer.

John Kauffman, our Clackamas County Clerk, talked about the elections and the process involved. Oregon is much better than Florida for numerous reasons. Oregon has 20 days to certify the election results while Florida has about a week. Each ballot is looked at to see if there are handwritten notes, crossed out items, or anything else out of the ordinary. The machines can't count these items, so these ballots are recast to reflect the wishes of the voter.

I was very impressed at the amount of time the County spends on each vote to assure accuracy. The signature on the envelope is even compared to the voter registration.
