

## Milwaukie's Local Leaders

### It's all about the give and take

Rick Farasy is the Chair of the Island Station Neighborhood Association and as he explains it, he didn't always have that much time for volunteering.

"When I first started having kids I was real busy getting my business started and figuring out how to support my family," Rick said. "And other people were coaching my kids, organizing community gardens, all kinds of stuff all the time. And I just wanted to start giving back because you really shouldn't take more than you give."

Rick's been giving quite a bit. He's been the Chair of Island Station for three years now, and is actively involved with coaching youth soccer and basketball.

He says contributing, this giving back, makes him feel good.

"I know I pay taxes and donate through my business, but it's not the same as doing it yourself," Rick said. "You know what? It just feels good."

Rick says being a part of the Neighborhood Association gives him and other residents the opportunity to

plug into their local government and influence the decisions being made at the most local level.

"I'm really gung-ho about our Neighborhood," Rick said. "I think it's a pipeline to our City government. A lot of times I hear, 'Those guys at City Hall are going to do whatever they want.' (These residents) feel isolated. Now here's an opportunity to have your voice heard."

Rick is hoping more Island Station residents speak up. The Neighborhood Association is currently looking for a Cochair, a Treasurer, and a Secretary.

"I just think it's time to get more people involved," Rick said.

### Council considers Dispatch move

In a move to improve dispatch services and realize considerable cost savings, City Council authorized the Chief of Police and the City Attorney to draft an agreement with Lake Oswego to relocate Milwaukie's police dispatch services to the Lake Oswego Communications Center.

Chief Kanzler estimates the move to Lake Oswego Communications Center (LO-Com) would save the City about \$200,000 a year, and give his department access to Lo-Com technology that enables squad cars to be outfitted with on-board computers. This allows officers to conduct criminal investigations and write crime reports while remaining on patrol. Chief Kanzler suggests it would cost the City \$361,000 to install such technology on its own.

Chief Kanzler also points out the move conforms with a state law passed in 2001 which mandates the consolidation of emergency dispatch centers and the development of a plan for county-wide consolidation.

Once the agreement is drafted, Lake Oswego's and Milwaukie's City Councils will consider it for approval. Chief Kanzler is hoping to have the agreement drafted by November, with possible implementation following in January.

In its early form, the agreement calls

Your City Council is commonly defined as an elected body acting in an administrative, legislative or advisory capacity in your local government. We are seen as the leaders of the City.

It is important to remember this dedicated group derives its authority from you, the citizens, and should accurately reflect your opinions, desires, goals and values. But in order to truly lead, it's important to understand the dynamics of leadership.

Leaders move people beyond preoccupation with self and the mundane elements of everyday life, to a heightened sense of awareness and the potential to make a difference about issues that really matter to them and their future. This means engaging people on issues that really matter. Inspiring a worthwhile vision, and showing a commitment to create the desired futures.

Leaders focus on the future, getting agreement on common vision, goals, priorities and direction. They create change that might not otherwise happen and prevent things from happening that might ordinarily occur. This is done by getting people to work together toward a common goal and creating a process to help people transform intentions into positive action, and visions into reality.

## What happens next in the South Corridor

The City of Milwaukie and Milwaukie Neighborhood Leaders have been working with Metro and other jurisdictions on the South Corridor Project since 1998. The South Corridor Project includes light rail, busway and bus rapid transit options to serve the southeastern portion of the region.

Initially, options ranging from carpool lanes to river transit were considered. After an extensive public process, the bus and light rail options were selected for study. Busway, a roadway exclusively for buses is under consideration between Milwaukie, Portland and Clackamas. Light rail is under consideration between Milwaukie and Portland as well as between Clackamas and Gateway. Bus rapid transit, an express bus line with intersection improvements is under consideration between Milwaukie, Portland, Clackamas and Oregon City.

Here is a timeline of when Metro expects milestones to occur during the next phase of the project:

### December 2002

**Publish SDEIS.** The Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement (SDEIS) will compare the benefits and impacts of each alternative.

**Begin Public Comment Period.** The public comment period will last at least 45 days and begins immediately after the SDEIS is published. It will include open houses and public comment meetings as well as meetings with community groups. An open house will be held in Milwaukie. Comments will also be accepted in writing, regular or email <http://www.metro-region.org>, or by recording them on Metro's Transportation Hotline ((503) 797-1900).

### January 2003

**End Public Comment Period.** A report of all comments received during the public comment period will be compiled and shared with decision makers.

**Policy Committee recommendation.** The South Corridor Policy Committee (Councilor Newman represents Milwaukie) will review public comments, technical documents and financial information and recommend a Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA), or strategy for moving forward, for the corridor.

### February 2003

**Consideration of LPA.** Each project partner, including Milwaukie's City Council, will consider the recommended LPA and forward their recommendations on to the Metro Council.

### March 2003

**Metro Council.** After each jurisdiction makes their recommendation, the Metro Council will make final determinations about what project should move forward in the corridor. ■

The Market features the same staples now as it did then: the finest and freshest locally grown produce, great live music, handmade garden crafts, plants and flowers, and the opportunity to meet and socialize with friends and neighbors.

Brendan Eiswerth heads the market, and he says that on a good day the Market can draw as many as 1,200 people. The Market's held on Sundays, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. across from City Hall.

"We continue to grow at a good pace and we're always surprised by how much we grow every year," Brendan said. "It's just a lot of fun for everyone." 📍

## Library sets records, expands hours of operation

Leading Library's Circulation Department Supervisor, Nancy Wittig, announces the Library has just completed a year of remarkable accomplishments.

For the previous fiscal year, which lasted from July 1, 2001 to June 30, 2002, the library checked out 463,800 items.

This was an 8% increase over the previous year's figure and the first time in Leading Library's history the 450,000

barrier was surpassed.

And that's not all — Leading borrowed over 54,000 items from other libraries for its patrons and loaned out more than 77,000 to other area libraries.

Nancy would also like to thank their patrons for all the fines that were paid last year — \$31,190 was added to the Library's coffers. During the past year, the Library registered over 2,500 new patrons and received over 3,400 hours

of help from its dedicated volunteers.

With circulation numbers on the rise, the Library has expanded its hours of operation by six hours. By using creative scheduling techniques and not spending any additional funding, the Library is open from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and on Friday and Saturday, from 11 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.. Sunday hours are from noon to 5 p.m. 📍

## The City Code Corner

Abandoned vehicles clutter Neighborhood streetscapes and create hazardous site obstructions for motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians.

In order to expedite the removal of abandoned vehicles, the City of Milwaukie Police Department has modified its Abandoned Vehicle Ordinance.

Using the process of the past, it could take several weeks to remove a vehicle, but now citizens will see a much swifter response.

Under the new Code, once the Police Department receives a complaint about a potentially abandoned vehicle, an Officer will check the vehicle, put a sticker on it, and mark it. The Officer will try to make contact with the registered owner so they can be notified their car has been identified as an abandoned vehicle. Once posted, the owner has at least 24 hours to move the vehicle before action is taken.

Officers point out that if the owner can be contacted, solutions are often reached before vehicles are towed. For more information, please call (503) 786-7500. 📍

## Motorists not stopping

Milwaukie Police Officer Larry Giddings wants Downtown motorists to stop.

Officer Giddings says more and more drivers are disregarding Downtown stop signs and are blowing through intersections. Apparently, he's got the tickets to prove it. In an average two week span, the traffic officer says he's writing anywhere from 30 to 40 citations. The base fine of each is \$365.

Officer Giddings explains rolling through Stops is dangerous for pedestrians trying to cross and often

leads to traffic accidents. He said he'll maintain active enforcement of Downtown intersections until people start paying more attention to their stop signs. 📍

## Music accents dedication



The Ardenwald Johnson Creek Neighborhood is looking forward to an August filled with music – free concerts in Ardenwald Park every Thursday night – and revelry – Neighbors Nite Out will be celebrated at our August 8<sup>th</sup> free concert. But there are several issues we need to keep our eye on, as well. Here's the rundown:

**Providence Milwaukie Hospital** is planning to build a new Emergency Department. It is seeking Neighborhood and Milwaukie approval for the plan. Dorothy Snowhill, our Association Secretary, has worked for more than a decade to reduce hospital impacts on the Neighborhood, especially on traffic using 36<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Dwyer Street to gain access to


the hospital. Providence is now proposing to close the 36<sup>th</sup> Avenue entrance to Dwyer, which will cut traffic a lot. Thanks Dorothy for your persistence.

**Johnson Creek Boulevard's** planned reconstruction is still a big concern for the Neighborhood. The street will be double in width between 36<sup>th</sup> and 45<sup>th</sup> Avenues to add bike lanes, sidewalks and wider traffic lanes. Neighbors along the boulevard are worried about the increase in traffic, noise, vibrations and runoff to the creek that expansion might cause. We continue to meet with the project manager to find ways to keep the street as Neighborhood friendly as possible.

**South Corridor Study** is going to become a bigger topic this fall when key studies are released for public comment. The proposed light rail service would run alongside McLoughlin Boulevard following the existing train tracks. For Ardenwald residents, the big issue may be the size of a proposed park and ride at the Goodwill site on Tacoma Street. Originally planned for 1,000 cars, the lot now looks like it will hold 400 to 600 cars. Still a large number of cars cutting through our Neighborhood every day.

**Three bridges** have been approved and funded to extend the Springwater Corridor multiuse trail into Sellwood. This will be a great asset to the Neighborhood as well as to folks all around the eastside. We'll have a progress report at one of our first meetings this fall.

**Johnson Creek Watershed Council** activities are also continuing to benefit the Neighborhood. It's clear that Johnson Creek, one of the few free-flowing tributaries of the Willamette in town, will be critical to salmon survival. We're watching to see how the storm drain/sewer running through the creek just downstream from the 45<sup>th</sup> Avenue trailhead will be replaced. We'll work with the watershed council to make sure the stream is protected.

Looming just down the road, sooner than we can hardly comprehend, are the November elections. This year at Council level, there are two and possibly three openings. Councilors King and Marshall have indicated they are not running for reelection, Ms. King citing she may have had enough, and Mr. Marshall stating that he's accomplished all of the political goals he had set.

Deborah Barnes, an educator, and Richard Cayo, contractor and activist will compete for Mr. Marshall's seat, and Ayla Thompson, a native of Milwaukie, is running for Ms. King's spot. Mayor Bernard, who is finishing an interim term of two years replacing Carolyn Tomei, is now running for a full term, and is as yet unopposed.

Another opening could occur if Councilor Brian Newman wins a seat on Metro Council, as is anticipated, which would mean a special election next spring to fill that seat.

This could certainly cause a direction change for the City, which has had a fairly steady Council for the last few years. There are many large projects in the offing, such as the North Main Street Project, North Industrial, Riverfront, and South Corridor Transit.

It will be interesting to observe the political and philosophical ramifications the election will have on these projects.

It should be a great chance to meet people not only from our Neighborhood, but from throughout the City. It will be held on August 6, 2002, at 6 p.m. in Lewelling Park.

In the coming months we'll hear more and more about the idea of annexing to the Fire District in order to meet next year's budget shortfall. While this strategy would help the City provide the current level of services and help address

long overdue infrastructure improvements, it will also raise our taxes.

The South Corridor Light Rail Study is slowly coming out and a public comment period will take place this fall or winter. The Neighborhoods have been tracking the process and will continue to do so. If you have an opinion as to how the region should address our mass-transit needs, please let me know.

We should soon have a second code officer at work to help maintain our Neighborhoods, and elections for two City Council positions and the Mayor will take place in November.
