A friend of Furnberg Park

Laura Herbon, an environmental designer for the landscape architecture firm William Macy, says she has seen too many projects fall into disrepair after the contracted work has expired.

For that reason, Laura decided her work on Milwaukie's Furnberg Park would be different.

Furnberg Park is located as SE 70th Avenue and Furnberg Street in the Linwood Neighborhood.

Laura developed the park's Master Plan in 1996 and has overseen its implementation. The City's maintenance contract for the park recently expired, and in order to preserve the wetland restoration efforts and native species plantings that have been invested over the past six years, Laura has volunteered her services and has organized a series of work parties with Biology students from LaSalle High School to protect and enhance the site's wetlands.

The partnership began when Laura visited LaSalle High's Biology class and gave a presentation about the natural functions of wetlands, and why their restoration is so important. Students eager to learn more

about wetlands, not to mention fill a community service component of their curriculum, joined Laura's work parties and have weeded the area and will begin planting native species.

Two work parties were held in April, and two more are scheduled for May 11, and May 18, 2002. Those interested in participating are asked to call Milwaukie Program Services Coordinator JoAnn Herrigel at (503) 786-7508.

Laura hopes the partnership continues with LaSalle High School, and interested community members form a stewardship group that continues to protect the park's fragile habitat. Those interested in such an effort are also asked to call JoAnn. ☐

Commission studies Title III

City Staff and a Wetland Specialist organized two Saturday field studies in April to provide members of the Planning Commission a firsthand perspective of how Metro's Title III regulations aim to protect Milwaukie's water resources.

Commissioners learned how to identify wetlands, learned what makes wetlands and waterways worth protecting, and took a tour of two of the City's more significant resources.

On April 20, 2002, the Commission visited Roswell Pond and Minthorn Wetland. Roswell Pond and a portion of the Minthorn site are owned by the City. The remainder of Minthorn is owned by the Wetlands Conservancy, a local conservation organization, which has also made restoration improvements at

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Sweep increases awareness

In an effort to get more people to use their seat belts and protect themselves from injury, the Milwaukie Police Department will conduct a seat belt enforcement blitz over Memorial Day weekend, from May 17 to May 27, 2002.

Extra officers will be on shift to target seat belt violators, speeders and those driving under the influence.

Milwaukie's effort is part of The Three Flags Campaign, a cooperative international safety belt campaign involving hundreds of law enforcement agencies from Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia.

Grant money will fund the extra officer hours and overtime accrued during the sweep. ☐



Citizens guide committees for Corridor Study

The South Corridor Transportation Study is now in the fourth month of a nine month study of the various alternatives and alignments under consideration. The options include Bus Rapid Transit, Busway, Light Rail and No-Build.

The study is expected to be completed in November of 2002 and will be followed by an official public review and comment period.


The technical information gathered from this study will then be coupled with public comment and reviewed by the project's policy group and local jurisdictions, who will begin the process of selecting a locally preferred alternative.

The locally preferred alternative decision should be made by January or February 2003.

Local decisions in Milwaukie will ultimately be communicated to Metro by the City's Representative on the project's Policy Committee with consistent input over the duration of the study from citizens, the Project's Advisory Committee, the Local Advisory Group, and the Technical Advisory Committee. Trail team to be selected

Consultants interested in taking on the Trolley Trail project gathered in Milwaukie's City Hall on April 12, 2002, to listen to Metro and North Clackamas Parks District representatives outline the project and describe what will be expected from the chosen team.

Metro purchased the corridor in December of 2001 from the Union Pacific Railroad Company, and now in partnership with the Parks District, is looking for a consultant team to conduct a Trail Feasibility study for the six mile long (approximately 40 foot wide) former streetcar line corridor between Milwaukie and Gladstone.



The study will examine accessibility issues, address environmental concerns, and involve a traffic engineering element.

The Trolley Trail is a valuable asset in that it links with the Springwater Corridor Trail at the north end and to the cities of Gladstone and Oregon City at the southern terminus. A trail "Open House" is scheduled for June 8, 2002. Check the Pilot for details.

City Manager foresees budgetary troubles

On May 6, 2002 City Manager Mike Swanson will present a balanced budget and his budget message to the five citizens and five City Councilors that comprise the Budget Committee. The meeting will be held in City Hall and begin at 5 p.m.

The budget message outlines Mike's budgetary philosophy, explains changes from previous years, and addresses the challenges that lay ahead. In an interview held in late April, Mike explained the challenges are significant. Without finding any revenue measures to boost the City's receipts, Mike foresees an approximate shortfall of \$700,000 in Fiscal Year 2003-2004.

Mike points to a number of factors responsible for the deficit; top among them the passing of tax limiting measures 5, 47, and 50. With significantly less money coming into the City's coffers, and with costs on the rise, Mike is looking for ways to reduce expenditures.

"Do we cut personnel now? If we were a fat organization that would surely be the answer," Mike said. "But were not, which makes the decisions all the more difficult."

The City is looking for citizen input, and there will be opportunity to provide this input at the May 6, 15, and 16, 2002, Budget Committee Meetings. All meetings begin at 5 p.m. and will be held at City Mall.

Centennial news and new quiz question

On May 1, 2002, the Centennial Committee presented their strategic plan for the 2003 Centennial Celebration to the budget committee.

The plan describes an 11-month celebration beginning with a kickoff ceremony in February 2003, a summer centennial celebration on the waterfront, a centennial tree-planting project and much, much more.

A major focus of the centennial is highlighting and encouraging volunteerism in the City. The Committee has requested a small amount of seed money for the yearlong event with the majority of resources used for the celebration being donated funds and in-kind services.

The Committee stressed that ideas for programs or events for the centennial will continue to be welcomed.

The City Code Corner

The City of Milwaukie supports home businesses, but the City is also careful to protect the residential character of its Neighborhoods.

To provide this protection, the City's Municipal Code sets up a number of conditions governing home occupations:

- Any outside display or storage of merchandise, materials or equipment at the home or adjacent to its right-of-way is not permitted.
- Noise, odor, smoke, gasses, fallout, vibration, heat or glare that is detectable beyond the limits of the property is not allowed.
- In the case of on-premise instruction, no more than five enrollees can take a class at the same time.
- Motor vehicle, boat or trailer repair is not allowed as a home occupation.
- And only one home occupation sign is permitted on the property.

In order to establish a home occupation, the City's Planning Department needs to okay the application, and like all businesses operating within City limits, a business license needs to be obtained. Fines for operating without a license can be pretty expensive – up to \$500 a day for a home occupation, and \$200 a day for a business operating in an Industrial, Commercial or Downtown Zone.

To get a home occupation application, call the Planning Department at (503) 786-7630, to obtain a business license, call the Finance Department at (503) 786-7521. If you feel a home occupation may be operating illegally or if you think an approved home business is creating impacts, please call the Code Compliance Division at (503) 786-7545. ☒

Although the April meeting suffered from a low turnout, those in attendance discussed a variety of issues that have the potential to greatly improve the Neighborhood.

Spring Park was also discussed, and residents talked about the next steps to be taken in the under-utilized space. The City recently okayed improvement projects that have a minimal impact on the natural habitat, which means work can begin on clearing areas for temporary structures such as park benches.

Discussion on these topics will be continued in May, and Chair Rick Farasy strongly encourages Island Station residents to attend the meeting so they can become more involved in enhancing their Neighborhood.

SOLV event restores riverfront

In February more than 150 trees, shrubs, and small plants were planted at the confluence of the Willamette River and Johnson Creek as part of the Johnson Creek Watershed Council's Watershed Wide Event.

To ensure these plants have a chance to take root and prosper, we're going to revisit the site as part of a statewide event sponsored by SOLV called "Down by the Riverside" on Saturday, May 18, 2002.

The project will involve the removal of any invasive species that have resurfaced, the placement of a fresh layer of mulch around the newly planted trees and plants and the removal of any litter in the area.

Roswell. Both the City and the Wetlands Conservancy have been instrumental in helping restore and protect the values of these resources, which includes wildlife habitat, stormwater control and treatment, protection of sensitive species, stream flow and ground water stability, and education.

The City will now look at ways to protect these functions for all local stream and wetland resources. The primary method to be investigated is ensuring adequate vegetated corridors are maintained along streams and wetlands.

Staff will contact affected property owners to ensure their concerns are known before making recommendations to the Planning Commission and City Council.

Public outreach on this project will begin within the next month but concerned individuals are invited to contact Interim Planning Director John Gessner at (503) 786-7652.

An important upcoming project for our Neighborhood is a fund-raiser for the development of Lewelling Community Park at Stanley and Willow. This fund-raiser may become an annual event until we're able to secure enough financial assistance to complete its development.

Budget shortfalls at all government levels deprives us of the dollars necessary to complete this project. However, we still intend to actively pursue grant monies for the development, but the possibilities are slim. EARLY TIME!

The May 8, 2002 agenda includes election of officers, update on the Centex development, representatives from the Waldorf School and City Manager Mike Swanson.

We will start the meeting at 6:45 p.m. because we need to discuss how to keep the Lake Road Neighborhood Association alive and well. I will be stepping aside and we need to thank our past officers and Kathy Wilke for their hard work and involvement.

I have a few ideas on how to divide up the various job duties, so noone is overburdened. The Neighborhood

meetings allow communication with the City and elected officials to affect positive change.

Mike Swanson will address our concerns on three issues in our Neighborhood. These are: a request for a speed limit change from 40 to 30 m.p.h. on a three block stretch of Lake Road, a sidewalk request on the south side of Lake Road west of Rowe Middle School, and a park request.

We want to thank John Gessner, Interim Planning Director, for explaining the Metro's new Title III Erosion and Flood Control standards. These are very important because it gives clear standards and enforcement procedures for developers who cause erosion and drainage problems in new Neighborhoods as well as existing nearby homes.

When the Pennywood and Creekway

Estates subdivisions were developed about 10 years ago, drainage was not planned out as well as it should have been. The extra care to prevent drainage problems that later became the homeowners' nightmare wasn't done.

With the new proposed development by Centex between Vernie and Where Else Lane existing neighbors can call the City and expect satisfactory resolution.

The City hired a wetland specialist who advised both wetlands on the site should be left intact with adequate buffers. So Centex is redoing their proposal.

If neighbors read the Oregonian, they'll realize it's much better to be inside Milwaukie rather than in unincorporated area of Clackamas County. Be thankful for the efforts of the City employees to do things right. I am!

Our April 8, 2002 meeting featured a presentation by Clackamas County District Attorney John Foote and Sheriff Pat Detloff regarding the proposed public safety levy to be presented on May's Ballot.

The Levy will seek a property tax addition of .59 cents per thousand assessed value, which translates to \$88.50 for a \$150,000 home. If the levy were to fail, they claim the County faces serious cutbacks in both policing and prosecutorial manpower.

In the coming months Milwaukie faces both a unique challenge and a golden opportunity. February 3, 2002, will mark the 100th anniversary of our incorporation as a City. On that date we'll kick off an 11-month celebration, one that will spotlight Milwaukie as a place to visit, live, or locate a business.

At the present time there are many exciting events looming on the horizon that will shape our City for decades to come; the development of the North Main Street site, the North Industrial Area Development, the resurrection of our Riverfront – all of these will add to

the desirability of Milwaukie.

What better way to jump-start these projects than a yearlong celebration?

In the meantime, there is a lot of work to be done. A committee has been selected, a consultant has been acquired to give us some initial direction, a budget has been prepared, and a plan of action has been formed.

As the plan progresses the committee will need dozens of volunteers to make our dream a reality. Once a direction has been firmly determined, the main committee will develop several subcommittees to handle different projects, all of which will need extra hands to make them happen. A volunteer hot line or contact numbers will be published at a later date.

The Milwaukie Centennial will be an exceptional happening, and we should take this opportunity to put our City on the map in a positive manner.

After all, this is something that only comes along once in a while – like every hundred years.

Information regarding the feasibility of annexation of certain parts of North Clackamas County that abut the Milwaukie City limits was not yet available at meeting time.

Milwaukie Interim Planning Director John Gessner had expected a study commissioned by the City, and done by a Portland State University business graduate class, to have been ready for discussion but John reported the study won't be completed until mid-May.

In another matter, Mr. Gessner said he anticipated the City Council's acceptance of new regulations regarding flag lots, which call for increased setbacks and access points.

Other meeting activities:

As an update to last February's meeting with LaSalle Prin-

icipal Bill George: "The Friends of Furnberg Park" club has been created at the school; a neighbor present at our meeting stated he had seen a group of students (a biology class) cleaning up the wetland portion of the park last week. Good work, kids!

Grants: Due to the City's budget shortfall, some budgeted Neighborhood grant money was returned to the City to help alleviate the problem. Funds were allocated to provide pet cleanup bags for use in Stanley Park. We still need a volunteer electrician in order to complete the lighting of the Neighborhood signboard at Linwood School. We are awaiting county response in order to plant trees in Stanley Park (grant money awarded last fall).

At our May meeting a representative from the County Correctional Department will tell us Clackamas County's response to Senate bill 444 (the sexual predator notification law). We will also talk about the fall Neighborhood picnic and hold elections for the four officer positions for the next year. See you there!
