More than half a century ago Milwaukie residents enjoyed warm summer nights by making their way to what is now the grounds of the Portland Waldorf School, throwing down a blanket, and taking in a movie projected against one of the sides of City Hall.

That tradition will be recreated on August 2nd, at that very same place, even though City Hall has since moved across the street.

Sharon Phillips is sponsoring the event with her husband Sonny, and she said they decided to organize the event to not only help celebrate the City's Centennial, but to rekindle that element of

Water rate may increase

City Council will consider a water rate increase at its Sept. 16th regularly scheduled meeting.

The seven-year phased approach is expected to match rate revenue to the cost of projected operating expenses and future capital needs, such as water line replacement, increasing water storage capacity, and well-head costs.

In April the City contracted the services of Donovan Enterprises to perform a Water Cost of Service Study examining the City's current revenue requirements and a review of the overall financial health, fiscal policies and operations of the water department. The consultants discovered the department had not been funding the cost of capital depreciation, contrary to sound financial practice. The City's water rates have remained unchanged for the past eight years.

Saving 'celebrations of community'

When Carlotta Collette learned the Ardenwald Concerts in the Park series was being canceled because of budgetary constraints, her response was swift and simple.

"I just said no way, these concerts are going to happen," Carlotta said. "The concerts are such an important rallying point for our community."

Soon after learning North Clackamas Parks could no longer support the concerts, Carlotta began organizing the talent and the sponsorships to make sure the incredibly popular series would return for its ninth season.

Being raised in what she described as a "tight and diverse" neighborhood, Carlotta said she enjoys trying to recreate some of those same characteristics in her Ardenwald/Johnson Creek Neighborhood.

"It's what I like to do," Carlotta said. "I like to make people feel like they're a part of a community." And for Carlotta, the concerts play a big part in that. "I really see the concerts as celebrations of community."

The concerts are held in Ardenwald Park every Thursday night in August. Performances start at 7 p.m. ☐

Councilor says history should be preserved

As our Centennial celebration extends to our waterfront, I am reminded of the importance of honoring our past as we look toward our future. The river has played an important role in Milwaukie's history. We envision the potential our waterfront holds for economic growth creating a vibrant commodity for our future.

How appropriate it would have been, in this our Centennial year, to honor and be witness to a piece of Milwaukie's history, the Sam Marino's house, being floated down this waterway on a barge destined for a future that would embrace its past. A reputable historic preservationist testified at Council on June 30th wanting to do just that. Public testimony at Council meetings overwhelmingly supported saving this house. In the final analysis, proposals were not acknowledged and voices went unheard by City decision makers. I feel a profound sense of loss that this well-known landmark in our community was neither salvaged nor saved from demolition. Instead, on July 3, this 81 year-old link to our past was destroyed.

By definition of Milwaukie's Charter, our rules for governance of our City, this house was declared a nuisance. Nevertheless, it should have been abated by relocation, not demolition. In the process, we lost sight of our Mission statement (*...a commitment to achieving and maintaining the sense of place, history and future that defines Milwaukie and distinguishes it from other areas*) and our Community goals (*...support preservation of historic and architecturally significant structures*) the values and principles which guide our decisions and give rise to what is important, to what we believe. They speak volumes about who we are as people and as a community.

I ponder whether the political fate of this 81 year-old house would have been markedly different had the structure been 100 years old in this our Centennial year. As stated by John Greenleaf Whittier, "Of all sad words of tongue or pen, the saddest are these: It might have been."

In June the consultant team shared the study's results and proposed rate options with the Citizens Utility Advisory Board, a citizen-comprised board that reviews such rates.

The Board recommends Council implement an approximate 4% increase each year for the next seven years.

Johnson Creek Blvd. project gets underway

Work began on the stretch of Johnson Creek Boulevard between SE 36th Avenue and SE 45th Avenue on July 22, 2003, and is expected to continue for approximately four months.

During construction Johnson Creek Boulevard is closed to through traffic, but will remain open for residential and business access. The suggested detour routes include using 32nd Avenue., King Street, Harrison Street and Linwood Avenue.

The project includes the full reconstruction and repaving of the street and the addition of bikelanes and sidewalks. Once completed, the project will provide a critical link for bicycles to the Springwater Trail and provide sidewalks for local residents.

North Main Project refining designs

North Main Street looks decidedly different now that the old Safeway structure has been completely torn down, but things will change even more dramatically next summer when work begins on the new mixed-use development project currently being designed by Peak Development.

Throughout the month of August Peak Development will work on refining four basic options proposed for the site. Milwaukie Project Manager Jeff King explains the option that best complies with safety requirements, meets zoning requirements, addresses Ledding Library access issues and meets cost expectations will be the option forwarded to the public and other interested parties for further refinement.

Jeff expects to showcase the proposal at an Open House in September, where those in attendance will have a chance to review the plan and submit their comments and opinions. Jeff said a series of smaller meetings will follow the Open House.

Sewer rate changes

In September 2001, City Council adopted a new volume-based sanitary sewer rate structure. The purpose of the new structure is to charge customers in proportion to their usage of the sewer system rather than charging everyone the same fixed rate.

The new structure has been implemented in three different phases; Phase I in January 2002 and Phase II in July 2002. The third and final phase is reflected on bills prepared after July 1, 2003. The sewer charge is based on a fixed charge plus a volume charge. The volume charge is calculated by using the winter average of water used during the months of December-March and is calculated in July. Summer water usage (watering your lawn, washing your car) does not affect your sewer charge.

Brochures further explaining Phase III of the volume-based sewer rate structure are being included with Utility Bills. If you have questions, please call (503) 786-7525. ■

'Trolley Trail' DRAFT Plan at Library for review

The North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District and Metro Regional Parks and Greenspaces Department have made a draft of the Trolley Trail Master Plan available at Ledding Library and both agencies strongly encourage Milwaukie residents to review and comment on the document.

This six mile "rail to trail" project will link with the Springwater Corridor Trail

at the north end and to the cities of Gladstone and Oregon City at the southern terminus.

Written comments concerning the draft plan will be accepted until 5 p.m., August 18, 2003, and should be directed to Jane Hart, Metro Regional Parks and Greenspaces Dept., 600 NE Grand Ave., Portland, OR 97232 or hartj@metro.dst.or.us.

Comments will be summarized and presented at public hearings when the draft plan is brought to decision-making authorities later this summer and fall. In addition to the public hearings, a series of open meetings will be held to collect public input.

The City of Milwaukie approved the use of some of our Neighborhood Grant Money to pay for sound equipment and promotion. Celebrate Milwaukie, Inc. came through with a grant, too. The Milwaukie Garbage Haulers and Providence Milwaukie Hospital also are co-supporters, along with Johnson Creek Boulevard residents Jeff and Chris Davis. Rachel Teige, from North Clackamas Parks, helped me pick up where she and the County left off. She provided all the necessary phone numbers and was always ready with advice.

All of the bands are familiar to longtime concert goers:
 August 7 - Dr. Jazz and the Interns (traditional, Dixieland jazz)
 August 14 - The Polka Beats (they get us all up and hopping)
 August 21 - Kukuva Marimba (hot music for hot summer nights)
 August 28 - Bill Oliver's T&O Railroad and

Hawaiian Band (music for kids of all ages).

Volunteers raising money for the Milwaukie High School Grads Party will sell soft drinks, snacks and Bento. We'll have free watermelon and special raffle prizes at the first concert, as part of our celebration of National Night Out.

The concerts start at 7 p.m. and run

until dark. Join us. Bring a picnic or buy food there. Our park, on 37th Avenue and Roswell across from Ardenwald Elementary, with its built-in bandstand, is the perfect setting.

Help us celebrate our community's "Can Do" spirit.

Even if you don't use water (i.e. vacant house) there is still base or service charges as well as stormwater charges. Milwaukie bills every two months, while Portland bills approximately every three months. For a 60 day comparison of all base charges, the following figures are approximates only. Portland's base charge is \$35.38 and Milwaukie's base charges for water/sewer/storm is \$32.95. The larger difference is in the water and sewer volume charges between the two entities. While Portland charges \$1.64 for water per ccf (approx 748 gallons), Milwaukie's is \$1.35 per ccf.

Now look at the sewer volume charges. Portland charges \$4.74 per ccf and Milwaukie's charge is \$2.10. The City of Milwaukie bases your sewer volume charge during the winter water usage (December through March). That's why it's so important not to have any leaks during the wintertime and to be conservative during this timeframe. When I figured in my own bill I estimated I was saving \$37 per bill, or every two months, compared to Portland rates.
