Graffiti

Little did Mike Sheppard know that cleaning up a little graffiti outside his home in the Historic Milwaukie Neighborhood might lead to spending an entire Saturday spraying a pair of graffiti-covered walls the length of a couple football fields in the North Industrial Area.

"I didn't know what I was getting into," Mike laughingly says.

Mike called Code Compliance Coordinator Steve Campbell to get an okay to take care of the tagging outside his home, and as Mike tells it, weeks later he's heading a volunteer effort to eradicate graffiti throughout the City.

But don't let Mike fool you, battling back graffiti is something Mike's been involved with for more than 20 years. Mike explains that when he lived in the Mt. Tabor area in Portland he and a group of neighbors would patrol the streets on a Saturday or Sunday and cover-up any graffiti painted during the weekend. When Mike and his wife, Dion, moved to Milwaukie five years ago, he continued the effort.

"As long as we lived in (Mt. Tabor) we just took it upon ourselves to take care of our Neighborhood," Mike said. "So when we moved here, we've just been doing the same thing."

Mike says helping to erase the amount of graffiti in his City is just one way to help improve his community.

"It's just something you do," he said. "These are the kinds of things you do when you live in a community, you help out." ■

3 Bridges project gains enthusiastic support

The Milwaukie Planning Commission enthusiastically and unanimously approved Portland Parks and Recreation's application for the Three Bridges Project at its July 13th meeting.

With regional support secured, construction on the three bridges, two of which are in Milwaukie, and Springwater Trail enhancements will begin in November and will be completed in about two years time. Once completed, the project will connect from west to east: Portland's Eastbank Esplanade, the Oaks bottom Amusement Park, the Tideman Johnson Nature Park, the Powell Butte Nature Park and into Gresham Main City Park.

The two Milwaukie bridges will span McLoughlin Boulevard at the City's northern boundary and the Union Pacific Railroad. The Planning Commission was especially excited about the McLoughlin bridge which will create an attractive and unique gateway to Milwaukie.

Community Services Manager JoAnn Herrigel identifies the project as being of utmost importance to not only citizens of

99E project moves forward

With a new McLoughlin Boulevard (99E) design that takes less greenspace on the riverside of the roadway, City Council gave the green light to the consultants working the project to continue honing their plan at its June 15th meeting.

At the time of print the consultants had 70% of the design completed and were preparing for an August 10th Planning Commission meeting to illustrate how the project would comply with natural resource regulations governing Kellogg Creek, Johnson Creek and the Willamette River.

An Open House will be scheduled for September so residents have an opportunity to review the design before its completion. Council is scheduled to review the plan for potential approval in October. Please call (503) 786-7608 for details. ■

Utility bills reflect rate changes

Milwaukie utility customers will see a change in their next utility bill as result of the latest sewer winter average recalculation and the recently implemented water rate increase. Both the sewer volume recalculation and water rate increase took effect July 1st.

City Council adopted the water rate increase in January in order to keep pace with the increased costs associated with

the operations, maintenance, and improvement of the water system. The last increase in the water rate was in 1995.

The change in the sewer charge is a result of the latest calculation based on usage volumes recorded from December 2003 to March 2004 billings. As a reminder, summer water usage (watering your lawns and gardens, etc.) does not

Beginning July 14th (in conjunction with the Milwaukie RIVERFEST) the first clue was published in the Clackamas Review and subsequent clues were posted at the Ledding Library and on the City of Milwaukie website at noon daily.

The clues eventually led to the treasure, a 3" x 3" Riverfest medallion which was redeemed for a cash prize of \$250 for finding the medallion and another \$250 if the finder was a proud owner of a Ledding Library card. Thanks to the generous donations from Celebrate Milwaukie Inc. and Bernards Garage for making the prizes possible.

While the chance to win \$500 is exciting, the idea for having the hunt came from the desire to reacquaint Milwaukians with some treasures we have right here in our City. Through the clues of the hunt there was a lot of valuable information about our award-winning library; its location at 10660 SE 21st, that it is open everyday at noon, and that library cards are free to everyone in the Tri-County area.

Eighty-five percent of the library's funding comes from Clackamas County and we are in competition for those dollars with all of the other libraries in the County. The County divides the money between the libraries based on circulation, with the remainder of the funding coming from the City's general fund. So get down to the library and take a book home today.

By posting the clues on the City website the hope was to get citizens to learn what a wealth of information about their City is available on the website. Judging from the numerous phone calls the City received on Monday informing them that the website had crashed over the weekend, I would say mission accomplished.

The medallion was hidden outside of the Milwaukie Museum located at Adams Street and Railroad Avenue. If you haven't visited the museum, you should stop by (open weekends 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.). The price is right, free, and I guarantee you will not be disappointed.

Hopefully, those who took part in the hunt enjoyed the time spent searching just as my family enjoyed searching for the Rose Festival Hunt medallion in years past.

The RIVERFEST medallion was found on the seventh day by 12-year-old A.J. Locati who was searching with his family. There's no doubt that they will always remember the great time they had together searching for the treasure. 📧

Ballfields may become a reality with Parks' plan

The North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District Advisory Board (DAB) will hear public comment during its Aug. 12th meeting at 6 p.m. at the Milwaukie Center. Residents are invited to be a part of the meeting.

The District will also present the plan to the Neighborhood Leadership Group at its August meeting.

Clackamas County's Board of Commissioners authorized up to \$2.2 million as part of the 2004 -05 budget in a proposed concept plan for youth and adult softball fields, children's play equipment, parking and more at North Clackamas Park.

The plan provides four tournament-grade softball fields, children's play equipment, additional parking, a concession stand, rest rooms, landscaping and storage, among other amenities in the 45-acre park off Rusk Road in Milwaukie.

After considering community comments, the DAB will recommend action on the concept plan. Actions may include proceeding with the project, modifying the project or abandoning the project. Implementation of the concept plan or a modified plan will require approval of the City of Milwaukie through the land use approval process.

affect your sewer charge. The winter average calculation assures customers are charged based on how much they use the system. The rate you pay includes the cost of sewage treated at the wastewater treatment plant. The City's cost is based on the volume of sewage discharged to the plant.

Please refer to the insert that will be included in your next billing for more detailed information regarding both of these changes.

Library levy to be placed on ballot

In January of this year the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners decided to follow the recommendation of the county-wide library advisory committee to place a local option levy on the November 2004 ballot.

The levy, if approved, would provide additional funding intended to allow the County to sustain public library services at current levels for the five year period of 2005-2010.

Should the levy pass, it would raise \$8 million a year to be used for library operations. Should it fail, library directors say they would need to look at reducing and cutting staff levels, services and material acquisitions.

The proposed levy of 29 cents per \$1,000 would mean the owner of a house valued at \$150,000 would pay \$43.50 per year if the levy were approved.

How much the Ledding Library would receive from the levy's funding, should it pass, is dependent on an equation factoring service area and circulation, which is the way the county disburses all of its library funding. Fifteen percent of the formula is based on the number of people who live within the service area, s, and 85 percent is based on circulation numbers. ☐

Voters will decide upon fire annexation issue

In the early part of September Milwaukie voters will be sent mail-in ballots asking them if they wish to be annexed into Clackamas County Fire District No. 1.

If annexed, Milwaukie residents would gain the ability to vote and participate in Fire District matters such as Board elections and future tax measures.

By annexing to the Fire District, and thus terminating the contract under which services are currently provided, the Fire District would be able to establish long-range plans that consider a more permanent revenue source.

If annexed, the City would no longer be under the obligation to pay \$3,111,130 in the next fiscal year. The current City Council has pledged to reduce property taxes at a rate that is even to the Fire District's levy rate, so there would be no net increase for Milwaukie taxpayers should voters approve the annexation.

In past years, the Planning Commission has helped develop and approve the Downtown and Riverfront Plan, the Comprehensive Plan and Transportation System Plan, all of which guide how the City deals Neighborhood livability and the future direction of the City.

The City Code Corner

More and more Milwaukie residents are purchasing portable, inflatable pools to beat the summer heat, and although they're cheaper and easier to care for than a permanent pool, the City's Municipal Code requires they follow the same conditions of use.

- For example, any pool containing more than 18 inches of water need to be surrounded by a fence or other barrier so that unsupervised small children are not able to climb in.
- The fence or barrier has to completely surround the pool, and has to be greater than four feet. Gates into the pool's area need to be self-closing and equipped with a self-latching device so the gate is securely closed at all times when not in actual use.
- Finally, the fence or walls from an existing structure need to be constructed at least five feet from the outer walls of the pool.
