

## Riverfront Board forging ahead on park

On March 14<sup>th</sup> the Riverfront Board sat down with a panel of experts to talk about design ideas for Milwaukie Riverfront Park. Members of the panel included accomplished landscape architects, planning professionals and members of the Oregon Marine Board.

The objective is to arrive at a plan that provides a variety of uses for a variety of interests and integrates the data collected from the citizen surveys collected last winter.

The Riverfront Board will tour several parks in the area with boat ramps within the next month to gather ideas for integrating boating facilities into park spaces.

A Riverfront Board report is expected to be delivered to Council in May regarding a final concept plan for the park.

## McLoughlin project still ahead of schedule

The McLoughlin makeover will reach a major landmark in the beginning of April when the new signalized intersections at Washington, Monroe and Harrison Streets are activated.

Once completed these intersections will feature wide pedestrian walkways that will go a long way in connecting the Downtown with our Riverfront.

Also in April work will begin on the raised medians of the project and the planted pedestrian refuge islands that will be constructed at the Monroe intersection. These features will help slow traffic and create the boulevard feel that will hopefully alert drivers they are traveling through a burgeoning downtown district.

## Answering the call

For years the Island Station Neighborhood has been working to raise interest and resources to make Spring Park, the natural area that's linked to Elk Rock Island, a reality.

Much work has been done, but developing a final design from which construction can follow is an expensive proposition. Looking for help, looking for some charity, the City sent an e-mail to landscape architects of the area.

"I received an e-mail looking for someone to participate," Pat Lando of Lando and Associates explained. "And I answered the call."

The City and the Island Station Neighborhood are lucky he did. JoAnn Herrigel oversees the City's parks, and she estimates Pat's pro bono work could be valued at about \$30,000.

Pat says the project appealed to him because the project seemed to call for a design that's of special interest to him and his firm.

He explains the design he developed with the Neighborhood's input illustrates a less-manicured approach that puts emphasis on creating conditions that will allow the park to return to a more naturalized state as it grows and matures.

He also says the project drew his interest because he felt the project would be in caring hands once the park was constructed.

"I like little projects like this when there's a group committed to making sure people will take care of it," he said.

It's equally great to speak of the integrity, vision and leadership citizens in our community have shown as they partnered with those who had opposing views on the issue of building the North Clackamas Park ball fields.

Both sides came together and persevered to work toward a solution that brought forward what I think is an overall better project that everyone could embrace. In the process, they reaped the benefit of fostering a renewed sense of trust and collaboration in the community. ## Keep eye out for signal

The busy intersection at International Way and Harmony Road features what's called the "Protected/Permissive Left-Turn Control" traffic signal. Motorists are going to start seeing more of these signals in and around Milwaukie so here's some information that will hopefully result in safer travel as residents encounter these new and sort of strange looking signals.

The new signals add additional left arrow lights that shine green and then flash yellow for a dedicated left turn. The idea is that motorists making a left against the grain of oncoming traffic will often try to make their turn as the light turns from yellow to red. Problem is oncoming traffic often speeds up to make that yellow light, and a crash results. These new signals offer a more protected left turn.


## North Main taking shape

## ODOT project focuses on improving Highway 224

The Oregon Department of Transportation will start construction on a project to improve Highway 224 from SE 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue to I-205 in April. Construction is expected to be completed by the end of 2006.

While the primary purpose of the project is to preserve and repair the roadway, additional funding from the ODOT Bicycle and Pedestrian Program and Transportation Safety has allowed the project team to add substantial ad-

ditional features to this work.

Contractors will upgrade the signal at the intersection of Monroe and Edison, add two water quality swales in the project corridor and new pedestrian amenities also are on the way.

A new sidewalk will be added from Harrison to Oak and throughout the project corridor you'll soon see new and upgraded curb ramps in construction. ODOT will strive to provide advance notification of work to

project neighbors and a 24-hour project hotline will soon be established.

While some intermittent lane closures will be required, ODOT will implement traffic control plans to minimize any congestion or inconvenience.

**A preconstruction open house has been scheduled for Thursday, April 6<sup>th</sup>, in Milwaukie City Hall, from 5 to 7 p.m.**

## The City Code Corner

Now is the time to start thinking about pruning our trees and/or shrubs back before they become an issue. According to City Code property owners are required to maintain trees along the right of way abutting their property to minimum heights. Section 12.12.010 specifies that trees, shrubs or other fixed objects are to be at least 12 feet above any traveled portion of any street and at least 8 feet above any sidewalk.

Hopefully the groundhog was incorrect and the weather will turn nice soon so we can all get outside and enjoy the weather and getting our properties back in shape after a long winter.

Neighbors were given an overview of the bridge history, the current bridge condition, and informed about the up-


