A collective effort

For more than 20 years, the City of Milwaukie and the City's franchised haulers have sponsored a collection event for Milwaukie residents.

The City organizes the sites, gets the volunteers and provides snacks and lunch. The seven garbage companies that provide service in the City provide drop boxes and staff for each of three collection sites, each of which see about 200 cars on that one day. In addition, these companies provide the hauling of the Dumpsters to the transfer station or yard debris facilities. The haulers do not charge the City for these services.

Our thanks go to: Mel Deines, Waste Management, Deines Brothers, Pearl Deines, Wichita Sanitary, Oak Grove Disposal and Clackamas Garbage for their support for Down To Earth Day.

Notable volunteers for this event are David Aschenbrenner, Art Ball, Sherri Campbell and Sherri Dow who have taken such ownership of the sites they work at that they now tell City staff how to organize the sites so they run smoothly.

Not to be forgotten are the folks that help with the curbside collection for elderly and handicapped folks (about 30 folks sign up to be picked up every year). Among these, Donald Hammang, Joe Loomis and Mayor Bernard are to be thanked for years of help with this effort.

This year's event is set for Saturday, May 6th, from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Collection sites will be located at Linwood Elementary (11909 SE Linwood), Ardenwald Elementary (8950 SE 36th), Lewelling School (5325 SE Logus). This year's event is only open to City residents, and cars arriving at the sites after 1:30 p.m. will be turned away.

Funding for streets draws close attention

In the month of May staff will be attending the City's seven Neighborhood Association meetings to talk about the state of the City's roads.

Milwaukie's streets are in a state of rapid decline, some have already failed, and funding is not available to turn the situation around. If nothing is done, the roads will continue to deteriorate and the cost to remedy the situation will skyrocket.

The problem is that Milwaukie's current funding only provides for temporary fixes and emergency patching, and these only act as band-aids for the much more serious condition many of our streets are in. Funding does not exist to treat these deeper problems, and in the meantime, more and more of our roads will fall into this state of disrepair.

Before being elected as City Councilor, I served the City as a member of the Milwaukie Parks and Recreation Board.

As a member one of the things I enjoyed most was working with the other board members to organize community walks.

The walks, besides being fun and a chance to get out and stretch our legs, had other purposes. It was an opportunity for you to meet and chat with your neighbors and elected officials and learn more about the past, present, and future of your great City.

Many folks have told me how much they enjoyed the walks and were hoping we would start doing them again. So back by popular demand, our first walk of 2006 will be Sunday, May 28th. We will gather on Main Street in front of Milwaukie City Hall at noon. There will be a short presentation on the history of the Milwaukie Farmers Market, which will be bustling with folks just across the street from us. We will proceed west on Harrison Street to Milwaukie Riverfront Park to enjoy the improvements made as part of the \$4 million dollar McLoughlin Boulevard Project. There will also be an update on the progress of the future development of the park. From there, we will proceed north on 17th Avenue.

Our Community Development staff and Community Service staff are working together in an attempt to secure a \$1.5 million dollar grant from ODOT to bring nearly a mile of new sidewalks and bike paths along 17th Avenue from Harrison Street to Ochoco Street. The project would connect two major regional bike and pedestrian paths, the Trolley Trail (which ends in Milwaukie Riverfront Park), and the Springwater Trail.

We will continue up 17th Avenue to the Milwaukie Pioneer Cemetery where we will learn more about Milwaukie's past. Members of the Milwaukie Pioneer Cemetery Association will be there to answer questions. We will head east down Milport Avenue to the proposed Park & Ride at the old Southgate Theater site. From there we'll head south on Main Street, stopping at the \$14 million dollar mixed-use commercial and residential North Main Village construction site. There will be updates and time for questions at all of stops along the walk.

I encourage you to come and learn more about Milwaukie's exciting past, present, and future.

Unload that computer

A residential computer and TV recycling event will be held on Saturday, May 13th from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the parking lot of Clackamas County's Sunnybrook Service Center between 82nd Ave. and I-205.

This event is designed to take advantage of the fact that computer components are reusable and recyclable, which helps keep these items that contain hazardous materials out of our landfills.

Computers: \$10 per car, includes one monitor, \$8 for each additional monitor

We need to find a funding solution sooner rather than later. Maintaining a road that's already in good condition only costs \$1.25 per square yard to maintain. Roads in poor condition can cost as much as \$50 per square yard to repair.

Staff is examining a number of options to raise the funding necessary to adequately preserve the City's street system, which is valued at more than \$65 million. Options include a property tax levy and a street utility fee, just to name two.

These options will be reviewed and discussed at the Neighborhood Association meetings and all are strongly encouraged to attend. For more information, call (503) 786-7503.

City budget takes shape

City Manager Mike Swanson presented the annual budget message to the Budget Committee on April 13th and explained this year's budget provides funding to retain existing services while "focusing energies on increasing the value of the community."

The budget also provides resources to continue providing opportunities for public input and participation. Mike says building a unified community "is essential if we are to attract new investment." While saying change will be inevitable due to Milwaukie's location in a growing region, he said we must manage that change in a manner that not only maximizes values but also allows us to retain our small town livability.

The next budget meeting is set for Thursday, May 18th at 6 p.m. and each meeting provides time for public testimony for those who are interested.

In April Oregon Department of Transportation crews began an improvement project on Highway 224 spanning from SE 17th Avenue to the I-205 interchange. The \$5.9 million preservation project covering the 4.4 mile section is expected to be completed by year's end.

The project includes the following upgrades:

Pave and stripe all lanes of OR 224 • Replace median barrier & guardrails • Upgrade traffic and pedestrian signals • New sidewalk from Harrison to Oak Additions or improvements to curb ramps throughout the project • Two new water quality swales

With elections just around the corner some of us may feel the need to voice our opinion on ballot measures or candidates, as is our right.

However, be careful where you place your political signs (and other signs, for that matter.) In short, you may not place signs in the right of way, or where they might obstruct a motorist's view. Signs in the right of way may be removed without notice. On your property, signs may not exceed an overall face area of 16 square feet or be permanently installed. Such signs shall only be posted for the duration of the activity.
