### Making a sound investment



Susanna Pai says she used to volunteer for a number of organizations in Portland, but then came to the realization that focusing her efforts here in Milwaukie might be a sounder investment.

"I live in Milwaukie so I should contribute to Milwaukie," Susanna said. "It's like taking care of your home. I needed to start taking care of my City, because that's where I live. That's part of my home. I feel like it's part of my responsibility."

Susanna began making her investments 15 years ago when she was appointed to the City's Budget Committee and began attending her Neighborhood Association meetings.

She served the Budget Committee for six years, and has been heavily involved in her Lake Road Neighborhood Association as its Treasurer and now as its Vice Chair.

Susanna believes the City's seven Neighborhood District

Associations (NDA's) play a vital role in how her local government goes about its business.

"We have the Neighborhoods so we become the voice for the City."

And because the NDA's receive an annual allocation of \$4,000 as part of the City's Neighborhood Grant Program, she believes people in the community have the power to create change.

"We need people from our Neighborhood to get things done," Susanna said. "It is our Neighborhood and we have to take charge."

## Citizen group begins looking at 'Town Center' lot

The Citizen Advisory Committee kickoff meeting for the Milwaukie Town Center Redevelopment project was held on Sept. 20<sup>th</sup>.

The nine-member citizen committee, appointed by both Metro and Milwaukie officials, is charged with advising project staff on redevelopment proposals for the city block across from City Hall, which is jointly owned by the City and Metro.

An agreement between Milwaukie and Metro envisions a four to five story mixed-use project and retail on Main Street and residences above. Developers will propose projects for the site later this year.

Committee members spent the first part of the meeting

sharing their visions and aspirations for the site and the audience of about 20 citizens also asked to participated.

Many expressed concerns about the agreement between the City and Metro and the future of the Milwaukie Farmer's Market, which uses the site on Sundays for about half the year. A handout clarifying the City-Metro agreement and other concerns raised regarding the redevelopment process was distributed, and has now been posted on the City's website. Those interested in obtaining a hard copy of the handout are encouraged to call (503) 786-7503 and request one.

## Kellogg Plant in the balance

On Sept. 20<sup>th</sup> the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) charged with developing a wastewater plan for the region formulated a recommendation to build another plant within Clackamas Service District 1 and to maintain the operation of the Kellogg Sewage Treatment Plant at its current level.

The CAC has been meeting since February to find an alternative to the Clearwater Plan, which was rescinded

by the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners in January. In part, the Clearwater Plan had called for the decommissioning of the Kellogg Plant, which sits on Milwaukie's Riverfront.

The CAC's formal adoption of a recommendation was slated for Sept. 25<sup>th</sup>, with the County Board of Commissioners scheduled to formally receive the recommendation at its Sept. 28<sup>th</sup> regular

At the Sept. 19<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting one of the agenda items being considered by the Council was a request proposing a name change for the Milwaukie Center.

The name change proposal did not come from the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District or the City of Milwaukie. It was brought before Council by the Center/Community Advisory

Board which is a volunteer board consisting of residents of the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District. Currently, the majority of the members are from Milwaukie.

The advisory board suggested changing the name of the Milwaukie Center to either the "North Clackamas Community Center" or the "North Clackamas/Milwaukie Center."

The C/CAB's motivation for the name change was to make the public aware that the Center serves all residents of the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District's geographical area. They thought that changing the name would increase the awareness that the Center serves more than just residents of Milwaukie in hopes that people outside the City limits would learn about and take advantage of the activities and services available. Located just off Hwy. 224, the Center offers health and nutrition services, support groups, transportation, leisure activities, classes, workshops, rental opportunities for parties or special events, and much more.

After listening to public testimony on behalf of the present name, the Council decided not to adopt the name change, agreeing with the Milwaukie residents who testified that the name Milwaukie Center has tremendous historical meaning to the City and that by changing the name, we would be losing a little more of our identity as a City.

However, the Council did agree to help in an informational campaign to spread the word that all of the great services provided by the Milwaukie Center are available to all residents of the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District.

## "3 Bridges" almost ready

The newly constructed "Three" Bridges of the Springwater Trail will open for public use after the dedication ceremony is held on October 19<sup>th</sup>.

This project will extend the Springwater Corridor Trail westward to SE 19<sup>th</sup> & Ochoco, with bridges crossing Union Pacific Railroad, McLoughlin Boulevard, and Johnson Creek.

The project picks up the Springwater Trail at Tideman Park just east of the Union Pacific Rail Road tracks and carries it westward to SE 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue.

"The Three Bridges project provides a crucial link

between the Springwater Trail segments in Milwaukie, Gresham and Portland," the City's JoAnn Herrigel said. "Now there won't be this huge gap in the trail in Milwaukie that prevents folks from moving east and west on the Trail."



## City seeking input on transportation plan

The City is about to embark on a nine-month process to update its Transportation System Plan (TSP), which was written in 1997, and is overdue for an update.

The TSP is the City's long-term plan for transportation improvements and includes a list of projects that could be implemented through the Capital Improvement Plan, development review, or grant funding.

This planning process is a great opportunity for the community to define its goals for transportation systems and improvements and to discuss how the whole transportation system can be improved to support the livability of our City. The project will emphasize opportunities for public input, with particular focus on access for freight, auto circulation, bicycle connections, sidewalk needs, transit facilities, traffic calming, and alternative approaches to designing street improvements in existing neighborhoods.

The City is hoping for broad and meaningful public involvement in the development of this plan. public hearing. **The Pilot** went to print before both of these meetings took place.

The CAC was considering five different options. A financial analysis commissioned by the CAC shows the forwarded alternative to be among the top two most expensive alternatives over the next 30 years. The Board of County Commissioners is expected to review the CAC recommendation in October. Please check the City's website for more information.



## City Council awards Riverfront Park contract

City Council unanimously approved awarding the design and engineering contract for Milwaukie Riverfront Park to David Evans and Associates at Council's Sept. 19<sup>th</sup> meeting.

DEA is expected to develop construction plans by March of 2007 so the City can begin applying for State and Federal funds that will pay for the park's construction. The City's contract pays DEA \$200,000, half of which was allocated by the North Clackamas Parks District.

Milwaukie's Riverfront Board and a stakeholder group consisting of representatives from ODOT, the Oregon Marine Board, the Department of State Lands and other interested groups will meet with the DEA project team at various points throughout the design process to ensure the highly anticipated park meets the objectives of the concept plan.

## The City Code Corner

Are you interested in building a shed for extra storage or to protect lawn equipment or gardening supplies. Wondering if you need a permit? Well, as is the case most times when you're dealing with the code, it depends on what you want to do.

Sheds over 200 sq. ft. in floor area or greater than ten feet in height (measured from the finished floor level to the average height of the roof) will require a building permit. There are also setback requirements.

While lots of great stuff is going on around Milwaukie, the City took a hit on Sept. 20<sup>th</sup> with the vote of the CCSD#1 Citizens Advisory Council to retain the Kellogg plant. It was an illogical decision, based not on the cost projections or citizen input, but by the desire to avoid a regional solution in favor of having a treatment plant all their own. There will be lots of

effort in October to try to convince the County Commissioners of the folly of their recommendation, so stay tuned.

On Oct. 10<sup>th</sup>, the Planning Commission will consider the Spring Park Master Plan. It's been twenty years in the making, and is finally nearly a reality. Please consider attending the meeting and speaking in support of the plan.

At our Oct. 19<sup>th</sup> Neighborhood meeting, we'll discuss the traffic calming measures for 22<sup>nd</sup> and for River Road (post-poned from September) along with the issue of the three street-level railroad crossings.
