### "Finding pride in their stride"



Wendy Geber had never written a grant before. "It was very intimidating," Wendy said. "I don't consider myself a writer. I'm more into math and accounting, I wouldn't consider writing my forte."

But that didn't stop Wendy from volunteering to submit an Ann & Bill Swindells Charitable Trust grant application on behalf of the Milwaukie High School's music program. Wendy's a band booster and her son, Jared, plays percussion. Jared and his band mates have been performing in uniforms that are more than 15 years old. Other programs typically renew their uniforms after five.

"Kids have to pin them, tape them, practically duct-tape them in order to fit into them," Wendy said with a laugh.

Last winter Scott Martin, then a senior at Milwaukie High, raised about \$17,000 towards new uniforms - a tremen-

dous achievement. Problem was, at over \$500 a piece, and needing to replace about 90 uniforms, the program was still \$25,000 short

It was at a booster meeting last fall when it was asked if someone would volunteer to write the Swindells grant. No one stepped up. More time passed before Wendy decided to give it a shot. She wrote the grant with the help of the School District and titled it "Find Pride in Their Stride."

The grant was awarded, and now the Mustang marching band will be doing just that, performing with pride.

## Get rid of your junk at popular collection event

On Saturday, May 5<sup>th</sup> the City of Milwaukie and your local waste haulers will host the 23<sup>rd</sup> annual Down to Earth Day. Sites for the collections will be located at **Linwood Elementary at 11909 SE Linwood**, **Ardenwald Elementary at 8950 SE 36<sup>th</sup>**, and **Seth Lewelling School at 5325 SE Logus**. Collection sites will be open to the public from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Cars arriving at the sites after 1:30 p.m. will be turned away.

Hazardous materials, including paint, will NOT be accepted at the clean up sites.

## Workshops focus on improving bike routes

Of all transportation modes addressed in the Transportation System Plan (TSP), bicycling is the most under-served in Milwaukie. Although a few arterial streets include bike lanes, the City has a general lack of designated bicycle routes, especially ones that connect north to south.

Despite these conditions, however, many Milwaukie residents use their bikes to get around. Several of them attended the Working Group Kickoff meeting on February 24<sup>th</sup>, where an energetic and engaged group gathered at the Bicycle and Pedestrian Solutions table. They began to identify the existing barriers to bicycling as well as ideas for improvements, and they reviewed some of the City's current policies on bicycling.

## Light Rail project plans next step

Staff from Milwaukie and Metro addressed City Council at its March 20<sup>th</sup> meeting to recap the results of the March 5<sup>th</sup> Light Rail Open House and to discuss future outreach efforts.

Metro distributed a report on the Open House's findings, and Milwaukie staff talked about a series of meetings to be scheduled in April that will more closely examine three segments of the

proposed Milwaukie alignment: the southern portion that includes the Island Station Neighborhood and the Oak Grove area, the middle portion which focuses on the Historic Milwaukie Neighborhood, and the northern section that focuses on the Ardenwald Neighborhood and the North Industrial Area

## New park a home run

In 1994, Milwaukie entered an agreement with the newly created North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District to have them provide park and recreation services for the citizens of Milwaukie.

Since that time, the NCPRD has kept our parks well maintained and our citizens have enjoyed the numerous recreational programs offered. Many seniors have received much needed services through the highly acclaimed

Milwaukie Center and the North Clackamas Aquatic Park continues to serve as the place for Milwaukie residents to enjoy indoor swimming and other water activities.

One area, however, that continues to be a challenge is in providing an adequate supply of athletic fields for community use, but that situation is improving. Recently, the NCPRD partnered with the North Clackamas School District and installed an "all-weather turf" field at Alder Creek Middle School; completed major renovations on two school district soccer fields; and has budgeted to partner with the school district to install "all-weather turf" fields at three local high schools. These fields will be for both school and community use.

To further address the needs of the community, the NCPRD has been working toward completion of a showcase youth baseball and softball complex located here in Milwaukie at the North Clackamas Park. In the more than 25 years that I've been associated with youth sports, I've never seen a more beautiful park anywhere! You have to see it to believe it.

Please join Mayor Bernard, the Milwaukie City Council, and hundreds of local youth ballplayers at the grand opening of the ballpark on Saturday, April 21<sup>st</sup> at 11 a.m. You'll be proud.

## Neighborhood grants make a difference

Milwaukie Center was the recipient of several City of Milwaukie Neighborhood grants this year. The Lewelling, Linwood and Lake Road Neighborhoods provided grants in support of the Center's Nutrition Program, which provides over 70,000 meals annually for older adults and people with disabilities. The Hector Campbell Neighborhood provided grants for both the Nutrition Program and the Transportation Program, which provides over 12,000 rides in our community for folks who do not drive so they can access services.

Both of these programs receive no direct tax base support, therefore they are dependent upon donations and fund-raising to meet rising expenses.



City Council declared the week of April 15<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> as a fine amnesty week at the Ledding Library.

## Town Center plans get a look

About 100 citizens attended a March 13<sup>th</sup> Open House to take a look at the three proposals submitted for the Town Center Project planned for the one-acre site across from City Hall.

Each of the proposals would add from 63 to 76 condominiums and town homes in buildings ranging from three to five stories and introduce more retail to Downtown.

The Project Management Group (PMG), comprised of staff from the City of Milwaukie and Metro, will consider the comments from the Open House as well as the discus-

sions with the nine-member citizen committee advising the selection process, before delivering a recommendation to Milwaukie City Council on April 17<sup>th</sup>.

## Help Harmony Road

A group of 26 citizens, six of whom are from Milwaukie, has begun meeting to discuss what the Harmony Road Corridor Transportation Improvement Project should look like. Citizens are encouraged to attend future meetings of this Public Advisory Committee to voice their opinions.

The project spans from 82<sup>nd</sup> Avenue to Highway 224. The project addresses the Harmony/Linwood intersection by proposing a bridge over the railroad tracks and suggests improvements to Harmony Road along Milwaukie's City limit.

A Public Open House will be held in May where participants will be asked to help identify potential transportation improvements and issues that need to be addressed in the environmental impact statement being prepared for this project.



## The City Code Corner

While Milwaukie's code doesn't speak to the number of vehicles allowed on a property it does address their condition and where those vehicles can be stored.

The code is designed to maintain the appearance of Neighborhoods and to make sure City streets don't look like a giant used car lot or auto repair shop.

All vehicles must be parked on approved surfaces, like asphalt, concrete or gravel, not grass or dirt. Vehicles can include utility trailers, boats, cars, or motor homes.

Furthermore, inoperable vehicles can only be stored in garages. An inoperable vehicle is classified as something that cannot be legally driven on the street.

First and foremost – please try to patronize downtown businesses.


