



Utility bills to reflect increase for streets

Beginning in July residents will see a new line item on their utility bills and a slight increase in their electricity bills to fund the City's newly created Street Surface Maintenance Program.

Single-family homes, which includes condos or row houses, will be charged \$3.35 per month on their utility bills under the line item "**STREET MAINTENANCE FEE.**" Apartment buildings will be billed \$2.10 per month per unit.

A 1.5% "Privilege Tax" will begin being assessed on July PGE statements. The average electric bill in Milwaukie is \$70. This new tax will raise this average bill by \$1.

In the program's first fiscal year of implementation, the program will fund a pair of overlay projects this construction season, and a pair next spring when the weather clears up.

Planning Commission to consider light rail track

Light rail planning has reached an important juncture. Metro is about to begin a Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Study on Phase II of the South Corridor light rail from Portland to Milwaukie.

Three possibilities for the Milwaukie segment alignment have been recommended for further study.

- **The 2003 "Locally Preferred Alternative" (LPA) which utilizes Main Street from Tacoma to Milport, crossing over to the Tillamook Branch tracks between Mailwell and Hanna Harvester, terminating at Lake Road.**
- **The same alignment, but terminating at Park Avenue (using the west side of McLoughlin for the last half mile.)**
- **The 2004 Milwaukie Working Group recommended alignment, which follows the Tillamook Branch beginning at Tacoma, termi-**

"I'm just one of many volunteers," Gary said. "I'm tickled to be recognized, but it's for all the volunteers."

Gary says he finds his work on Johnson Creek rewarding.

"I just enjoy doing it," Gary said. "It's good for the creek, it's good for Milwaukie."

"Public reviews transit options", "Regs to deal with traffic impacts", "McLoughlin project funding set".

Those are just some of the headlines from **The Pilot**, back in 2001.

Just six years ago, leaders from all of the Neighborhood Associations worked together to come up with the so-called "14 Points". The NDA leaders outlined conditions under which they would support light rail, busway, or any other transportation system.

The points included many of the same points being discussed today: "no light rail through the neighborhoods", "no park and ride at Linwood and Harmony", "ODOT, Metro and Tri-Met should collaborate and coordinate their efforts", "consider a light rail station behind the Milwaukie Junior High and help cultivate funding to support its purchase".

There are other points as well: "consider connectivity within and around Milwaukie for future extensions", and "recognize and address the fiscal impact of long-term parking generation".

Neighborhood leaders in 2001 included: Dolly Macken Hambright, Ed Zumwalt, Art Ball, David Aschenbrenner-Kathy Buss, Peter Koonce, and Teresa Bresaw, among others. Transportation issues were challenging then. They are challenging today.

Finally, it was David Aschenbrenner's column in **The Pilot** that summed things up in 2001 and rings true today:

"No decision has been made at this time as to which transit alignment and at what cost." That decision will come later after the environmental impact study is completed.

The NDA leadership, the City, Metro and Tri-Met need to hear from you.

City getting 'greener'

On June 5th Operations Manager Paul Shirey will present City Council with a proposal committing our City to pursuing greater environmental sustainability.

As part of this program, the City has created an internal committee comprised of representatives from all of the City's facilities in order to coordinate a holistic approach to better environmental practices and procedures for City operations.

In fact, steps have already been taken. The City's fleet of vehicles is now using a mixture of bio-diesel fuel and a Prius hybrid car has been purchased for staff to use on long-distance trips. The committee is also evaluating and enhancing its existing recycling program and Paul is planning an energy audit to find greater efficiencies.

This summer crews will resurface 37th Avenue between Lake Road to Wister Avenue and 42nd Avenue between Harvey Avenue and Johnson Creek Boulevard. In the spring crews will tackle Oak Street between Highway 224 and Monroe Street, and Washington Street between McLoughlin Boulevard and Oak Street.

nating at Park Avenue (rather than at Kellogg Lake as originally proposed by the Working Group.)

In May, a number of citizens requested that a fourth option be added to the SDEIS: an alignment that would enter Downtown via Main Street or McLoughlin Boulevard.

Mayor Bernard has asked the community to consider this alternative to see if there is community consensus for including it in the study. To gauge interest, the topic has been placed on the Planning Commission's June 12th agenda, and all are encouraged to provide public testimony. June 14th has also been reserved for additional testimony if needed.

The Planning Commission meets in City Hall at 6 p.m.

Riverfront Park moves forward

Last summer's McLoughlin Boulevard Improvement Project, with its new plantings and creation of new views of the Willamette River and Elk Rock Island, has shown the community, and the region, the potential of our riverfront.

Work is being done right now to fully realize this potential - to create Milwaukie Riverfront Park.


In December 2006, the City hired David Evans and Associates to de-

velop a design for the park. After an open house was held in January of 2007, the plan was modified and now its being shaped into construction documents. The design includes a boat ramp and dock, restrooms, paths, a play area and a transient dock for temporary boat tie-ups.

Land use and permitting applications are being developed and these processes should be complete in the fall of 2008. Final design should also be complete by that point.

Staff hopes to submit applications for grants to construct the park in spring 2009.

Citizens prioritize pedestrian improvement projects

As part of the City's Transportation System Plan update process, a group of citizens concerned with improving pedestrian options met at a pair of workshops to first identify trouble spots and then to develop and prioritize a project list.

All told the group prioritized a list of 34 capital projects to address intersec-

tion and walkway improvements and a list of 12 operational projects. The top operational projects include: improving signage for safety at crossings and along identified walking routes, providing maps and signage on streets to identify City walkways, and clearing overhanging vegetation and other obstructions from sidewalks and repairing hazards

on existing sidewalks.

The top capital projects focusing on intersections all pinpoint the side streets that intersect Highway 224 - calling for crosswalk upgrades, ramps at curbs, and curb extensions.

The top walkway projects call for sidewalks on SE 17th Ave. and McLoughlin near the Island Station Neighborhood.

Tom Kemper attended our May meeting and provided an overview of the Town Center project planned for the Texaco site. He answered questions about design and the lack of parking which are of continuing concern.

Tom also shared some late breaking news - he's close to finalizing a lease for one of the retail spaces for a restaurant at the north end of North Main Village.

You may have noticed that the building on the corner of Main and Monroe is being worked on. Ed Pareki, owner of the Spring Creek Coffee House, just purchased the building and is planning on renovating it for a restaurant on the first floor and possibly a medical clinic on the second floor. He showed us a preliminary sketch of what the building would look like when it's renovated and we're very excited to see he's planning on adding historic architectural details to the building.

On a more serious note, the recent light rail alignment meeting on April 26th with the City, Metro and TriMet for the Downtown segment provided an overview of possible station locations through our Neighborhood.

The majority of those attending, while being generally supportive of light rail, had grave concerns about the proposed alignment and its impact to the safety and livability of the Neighborhood, schools, and our Downtown.

The Historic Neighborhood along with the Lake Road Neighborhood, Portland Waldorf School and St. Johns Catholic Church requested that alternative alignments be considered as part of the Supplemental Environmental Impact Study (SDEIS) which was scheduled to begin in May.

A meeting to take public comment is scheduled with the Milwaukie Planning Commission for June 12th.
