

## Council votes to silence train whistles

On October 16<sup>th</sup>, by a 4-0 vote, City Council approved establishing a Quiet Zone in Milwaukie.

Once implemented, the zone will eliminate the routine sounding of train horns at three out of four crossings of the Union Pacific Main Line. The project will bring safer rail crossings, sidewalks at the crossings, and some measure of peace and quiet to Milwaukie.

A couple of concerns remain. An \$85,000 funding gap, and access concerns at one of the rail crossings need to be resolved before the project can be implemented. The City will work to identify the needed funds in its 2008-2009 budget process, which kicks off in January.

## Learning the land

At first glance the grounds of Lewelling Elementary look like most other grade schools. But after taking just a quick look around, it's easy to see there's a lot more that's going on.

There's the frog habitat pond in the courtyard sixth-graders built several years ago, the heritage garden in front of the gym, the butterfly and bird gardens outside the second and third-grade classrooms, the raised beds where the kindergartners and first-graders carefully tend their crop of vegetables and flowers.

Around nearly every corner there's another example of an environmental project that's been created and cared for by students for future learning experiences.

Yes, this is a different kind of school. This is an Environmental Magnet School, and has been since 2000 when it became a 4-H Wildlife Steward School.

Back then there were four volunteers who made up the Habitat Team that helped teachers develop projects and habitat areas for students to study. Today there's only one. Her name is Lisa Lashbrook, a resident of the Lewelling Neighborhood, and she donates hundreds of hours every school year working with Lewelling's teachers in providing Lewelling's students with new and exciting ways to study, care for, and appreciate the environment.

The citizen Safety and Security Task Force charged with recommending measures that will help create a safer Portland to Milwaukie Light Rail project will tour the proposed alignment at its next meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 7<sup>th</sup>.

Task Force members, and all who are interested in taking the tour, will meet at Milwaukie City Hall at 4 p.m.

The tour will follow the alignment

northward along the Tillamook Branch railroad, through SE Portland to the OMSI area, where a bridge would cross the Willamette River to the South Waterfront Area. The tour will pay special attention to potential station areas, which in Milwaukie includes locations at Bluebird, Washington, Monroe and Harrison Streets, Lake Road and the former

## A national mandate that hits home

Just recently I learned about federal legislation that could threaten our privacy, our credit, and could turn our licenses to drive into a card with a chip that could monitor everything we buy in the future.

The REAL ID Act was enacted in 2005. However, 17 states have already rejected the unfunded mandate with real concerns. This issue will impact Milwaukie residents.

Under the proposal, Americans will soon be turning over their license, upon renewal, in exchange for a new card. This card, which will link to a national database, will only be given to those who can prove their identity.

If you have lost your birth certificate you will not be granted a regular license to drive under the legislation. Your personal information, if you have it, will remain on file with the DMV. You'll be lucky if that identification stays safe. And, remember, when you show it to a merchant for identification they can keep that information on file at their stores and offices.

Oregon lawmakers are expected to debate the issue and whether or not they will go along with this legislation in February. The federal government, again, will not be sending a check to cover the full amount of the implementation. Seventeen states, including Washington, have already gone on record opposing the legislation.

Yes, we need national security but we also need a national debate on the best way to protect citizens without worry about losing our privacy, our credit, or our way of life.

Call or write your Congressional delegation and tell them you expect this issue to be reviewed now.

Southgate site in the North Industrial Area. The group will discuss the safety and security issues posed at each site and talk about which sites might offer the better environments.

## Open House to show what's in store for 99E

Work is scheduled to begin in November on a project to improve McLoughlin Boulevard from the Kellogg Creek Bridge south to Roethe Road, and ODOT is planning an Open House on Thursday, Nov. 15th from 4 to 7 p.m. at Oak Grove Elementary (2150 SE Torbank Road, Oak Grove) to offer area residents a chance to learn more about the project.

Those who attend will have the opportunity to ask about project design, potential construction impacts, and learn about the pedestrian and bicycle improvements that are included in the project.

The project will include repaving, adding a new traffic signal and intersection improvements at River Road.


## City has the holiday spirit

## The City Code Corner

As we head into winter we thought it would be a good time to remind you of a section of the Milwaukie Code that we do not look at very often, but is very important for us all to know.

### Section 8.04.100 Snow and Ice Removal:

No owner or person in charge of property, improved or unimproved, abutting on a public sidewalk may permit:

A. Snow to remain on the sidewalk for a period longer than the first four hours of daylight after the snow has fallen;

B. Ice to cover or remain on a sidewalk, after the first four hours of daylight after the ice has formed. Such person shall remove ice accumulating on the sidewalk or cover the ice with sand, ashes or other suitable material to assure safe travel.


Not only is this important for safety, but also minimizes property owner liability should someone slip or fall. If you have any questions, give me a call at (503) 786-7409.

## Drop leaves with City

Fall is in full force and the City of Milwaukie still has a number of collection dates coming up when residents can dump their leaves for free.

The drop site is at the City's Johnson Creek Boulevard facility (6101 SE JCB), and the remaining dates are Nov. 3<sup>rd</sup> & 17<sup>th</sup> and Dec. 1<sup>st</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup>. Residents can unload leaves bagged or loose anytime between 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. on these days.

By taking advantage of the City's leaf disposal program residents help reduce the amount of work that's needed to sweep and unclog the City's stormwater drains while also improving fish habitat by raising the quality of stormwater that's released to our creeks and rivers.
