### Hatz off to Bob


"I just love Milwaukie," Bob Hatz says with a sincerity and conviction that makes it easy to believe him. He'll turn 90 in August and he's lived almost every single one of his years here in Milwaukie.

Matter of fact, the only time Bob's lived elsewhere was when he was training for the Army or was serving overseas. Bob's a decorated war veteran, having fought in the Battle of the Bulge. To speak with him, it's hard to imagine such a gentle man having experienced something so terrible. But in speaking with him, it's also easy to imagine him a leader of men. Bob was a sergeant in the army and was awarded three battle stars and the bronze star.

Bob's been a leader here in Milwaukie too, albeit in a much different kind of way. He recently stepped down as the chair of the Citizens Utility Advisory Board (CUAB), a group that advises City Council on the methods and manner in which city utility rates and capital improvements are scheduled and carried out.

Bob got involved back in the 90's when he felt the City wasn't working the way it should. He was frustrated the City was relaxing its planning codes and allowing too many flaglots.

"If you don't like the way things are, then get involved," Bob says.



Bob became the Linwood Neighborhood land use chair and worked to tighten up those regulations, and once he'd done that, he looked to stay involved with City affairs. A spot was available on the CUAB, so he applied and he's been serving ever since.

"I like being involved," he says simply.

## City spelling out transit conditions to TriMet

When TriMet went before City Council in May and announced the park and ride project at the former Southgate site was no longer moving forward because the project's budget had been whittled away, City staff began composing a formal memorandum of understanding (MOU) regarding the design, construction and operation of new transit facilities (including bus, light rail and park and ride facilities) in Milwaukie between 2008 and 2018.

Community Development Director Kenny Asher explained this "umbrella agreement" at City Council's May 20<sup>th</sup> Work Session, emphasizing the document would help TriMet and Milwaukie work as partners as the two organizations move forward with light rail planning. Some of the issues being

## Public Comment period on light rail nearing end

The formal public comment period for the environmental analysis of the proposed MAX line between Portland and Milwaukie will close on Monday, June 23<sup>rd</sup>, so now's the best time to raise your issues and concerns to project staff.

The easiest way to access the Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement is by downloading it at Metro's website, [www.oregonmetro.gov](http://www.oregonmetro.gov). Also available for download is an expanded executive summary document that includes the abstract, authorization and contact information. Those interested may also request a CD-ROM by submitting a request to [trans@oregonmetro.gov](mailto:trans@oregonmetro.gov), or by calling (503) 797-1756.

Printed copies of the draft documents are also available at Milwaukie's Ledding Library.

Milwaukie's City Council will take public comment on July 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> before recommending an alignment.

## City facing decisions that will shape the future

We are at a pivotal point in the history of Milwaukie where imminent decisions will have lasting effects long into our future. Decisions about wastewater treatment, roadway expansion and light rail, are at the forefront of regional and county agendas. They all have impacts on our environment, our safety and livability and our pocketbooks and we need your input as to their viability.

I think long and hard about the consequences of decisions and whether they will stand the test of time. What conclusions did our forefathers reach to think it prudent to place a sewage treatment plant on prime waterfront property over 30 years ago? Today we are questioning that decision and considering a countywide effort to possibly consolidate to a new plant that would be financially and environmentally feasible and promote economic development generating tax revenue for the city and the county. Roadway expansion on Harmony Road poses negative impacts to wetlands and the livability of the surrounding neighborhood. Light rail is no exception to the stand the test of time rule. Any project that threatens the environment, jeopardizes the safety and livability of Milwaukie's citizens, is disproportionate in scale to the existing architecture and surrounding Neighborhoods, is a source of criminal activity and is fiscally prohibitive should always be questioned and subject to a vote of the people.

Community leaders must always be thoughtful and deliberate in decision-making, being fiscally prudent and keeping foremost in mind the safety and livability of our community, for it is our citizens, not the region that will have to live with the consequences of all our decisions.

And fifty years from now, I hope citizens will feel those decisions have stood the test of time. ☸


## Support Milwaukie's K-9 unit the Hawaiian way

negotiated include: the future of the downtown transit center and a strategy to dissolve it, the design and policing of park and rides and bus stop shelter areas, mitigation of light rail impacts, design of light rail stations and parking structures, and station area development or joint development possibilities.

Staff hopes to have a signed agreement with TriMet before Council delivers a light rail recommendation in July.
