## Milwaukie's Local Leaders

### Happy Anniversary!

A decade ago the Milwaukie Farmers Market opened across from City Hall with seven vendor spaces. When the Market opens on May 11<sup>th</sup> and celebrates its 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary there will be 75 spaces - proving Milwaukie's Market is one of the most firmly-established in the Portland region.

The two men responsible for the Market's success, Mayor Jim Bernard and Brendan Eiswerth, say that when they



started the market back in 1998 they had no idea the Market would be as strong as it is or would be around to enter a tenth year.

Brendan, who is the Market Master and Jim, who is the Market's Business

Manager, agree that a large component of the Milwaukie Market's success is that in addition to hosting vendors who sell a wide variety of fresh, local produce, the Market's atmosphere fosters friendly interactions that create a genuine sense of community.

"We have a real family-friendly atmosphere," Brendan said. "It's not just a shopping experience, it's more of a community get-together."

Jim puts it in a different, yet similar way. "The Market has become Milwaukie's living room where our citizens come together and talk about what's going on in town. Our market has really brought our community together."

The Market is open every Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. through October and there's always live music. ☘

## The season for streets

When City staff met with residents in developing the Street Surface Maintenance Program (SSMP) that Council passed in January of '07, there was one project that seemed to stand out from the rest - fixing King Road.

The SSMP will fund the \$800,000 reconstruction project of SE King Road between SE Hollywood and SE 43<sup>rd</sup> Ave. beginning in June. King Road will be completely rebuilt from the sub base up, from curb to curb. The City will also be installing water quality upgrades to the existing storm system.

In this construction season the SSMP will also fund the \$260,000 paving project on SE Washington Street between McLoughlin Blvd. and

## Public Comment period to open for light rail

When Metro publishes the federal document that analyzes every aspect of Portland to Milwaukie Light on either May 9<sup>th</sup> or May 16<sup>th</sup> (not known at the time of print)- a chain of events will be triggered that will lead to project recommendations from the project's partners by the end of July.

This being the case, now is the time to let your opinions be known. When the federal document is published a 45-day public comment period will open and a series of Open Houses will be held throughout the project's corridor where citizens will have the opportunity to review the document's information, ask questions, and talk with project staff.

One of these Open Houses will be held at Milwaukie High School, but at the time of print, a date had not been set. When it is, it will be widely publicized and the City will contact those


## Collection Event set for June 14<sup>th</sup>

Your local garbage companies, the City of Milwaukie, Clackamas County and Metro are hosting Milwaukie's popular clean-up event on Saturday, June 14<sup>th</sup> from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. at two different sites.

Sites for collection will be the former Southgate Theater lot at 9600 SE Main St. and the Crosswhite Industrial Park at 64<sup>th</sup> and SE Johnson Creek Blvd.

Milwaukie residents, with their coupon in hand (look for the coupon in the June [Pilot](#) to cut out!) and proof of City residency by way of a water bill or drivers licence, can bring one load to the event at no cost. The purpose of this event is to help residents get rid of "bulky" waste items-not household garbage or hazardous materials.

The following materials will be accepted: Appliances, scrap metal, tires (10 maximum), yard debris (under 6 feet in length and under 4 inches in diameter), old wood, furniture, mattresses, carpet, plumbing fixtures, windows, and other bulky discards. The following will NOT be accepted: hazardous materials, paint, kitchen garbage, liquids, animal waste, propane tanks, car batteries, drums, dirt, sod, stumps, rock, concrete, industrial waste, or commercial waste. Some items may not be appropriate and may be refused.

## Grants improve Neighborhoods

This year marks the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Neighborhood Grant Program – a program that has provided the seed money for citizen-organized programs and projects that enhance our Neighborhoods and community.

In the past decade 400 grants have been awarded and the money has been used for things like concerts in neighborhood parks, neighborhood entrance signs, block parties and picnics, traffic calming in neighborhoods, and support for the Riverfest celebration. Big projects that have been funded through this

program include:

- Ardenwald Summer Reading Program
- Milwaukie Museum Roof Replacement
- Meals on Wheels at the Milwaukie Center
- Milwaukie Umbrella Parade
- Milwaukie K-9 Program

Each Neighborhood Association is granted \$4,000 every fiscal year and many have reserves they've built over time. If you have a project you think would benefit your community, share it with your neighbors at your next monthly meeting. Neighborhood information is printed on the back page. ☒

## The Milwaukie Code Corner

This month I proudly introduce Chapter 8.24 Shopping Carts of the Milwaukie Municipal Code.

This code section requires shopping cart owners to recover those potential rolling traffic hazards within 72 hours of notification. Also, the shopping cart owner must post a toll-free phone number on the cart for recovery.

So, when you see a shopping cart off a store's premises call the store owner right away. For a list

of local store phone numbers please check the following link: <http://www.ci.milwaukie.or.us/departments/comservices/commsvs.html> and click **Shopping Cart Owner Phone List** under the Code Enforcement Section.

Please understand that removing a shopping cart from an owner's property is theft and can result in a citation with a maximum fine of \$500.

Did you know that the intersection at McLoughlin and River Road is the most dangerous intersection in Milwaukie? In 2006 there were 12 accidents at this location.

Did you also know that the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed on both 22<sup>nd</sup> Avenue and River Road is almost 10 MPH over the 25 MPH speed limit?

What is being done about it? Hopefully the City Budget Committee will earmark money for traffic safety that can be put to use in our Neighborhood.

We are thankful for the rumble bumps, larger speed signs and reflective markers that have been put in place by

the City. They have also been enforcing the speed limit with officers in the Neighborhood. In the month of January alone, 11 citations were written for speeding on River Road. And the speed trailer has been put to use recently on both 22<sup>nd</sup> Avenue and River Road. Thank you City of Milwaukie, but our work is not yet done!

We, too, believe there should be another business association in town, run strictly by the businesses with no interference from the city.

As far as Downtown belonging to all of Milwaukie, that's 100% correct. Everybody should have a say, even our Neighborhood.
