

Gamba on May ballot for Mayor

Councilor Mark Gamba will be the only candidate listed for Milwaukie Mayor on May's special election ballots. The City Recorder accepted petitions for Mayor until 5 p.m., March 10, 2015, and Gamba is the only resident who filed.

Gamba, or a write-in candidate, when elected in the May 19, 2015 election will fill the unexpired term vacated by Jeremy Ferguson, which expires at the end of 2018.

Quiet Zones go into effect

On May 1st, the new rail quiet zone goes into effect in downtown Milwaukie at SE Harrison, Monroe and Washington streets, at 21st Avenue and Adams Street, and at Mailwell Drive. In the quiet zone, light rail and heavy rail train operators are not required to blow their horns as they approach a crossing (although they are allowed to use their horns at their discretion).

• Be safe at the tracks! Expect a train even if you don't hear a horn.

In my New Jersey hometown, we only had a few events each year that neared the scale of Milwaukie's: the Fireman's Fair, a few holiday parades, and Sidewalk Sale days. These annual events marked the seasons of my childhood, and as a kid, gave me a strong sense of character and community in my town. Now, as an adult, I see Milwaukie through my friends' children's eyes as they clap for our Christmas Ships and watch, wide-eyed, as the Davis Graveyard team parades through Main Street under amazing and elaborately scary umbrellas.

Our extensive and varied volunteer-run events are great fun, and they are a hallmark of Milwaukie's strong community. And as one of your new City Councilors, I've delved into our city budgets over the past few months and learned how valuable this community service is – in real dollars. The 700 hours each month that volunteers put in at our Library keep operations running smoothly. Our volunteer First Fridays coordinators, and the Celebrate Milwaukie Inc. board that organizes Farmers Markets, provide Milwaukie with economic incubator spaces for farmers and makers. City boards, Neighborhood Associations, and committees organize our Umbrella Parade, neighborhood concert series, and park cleanups, among others, keeping dollars local and neighborhoods tidy.

The City Code Corner

It's that time of year again when you have to start dusting off those lawn mowers and cutting shears.

There are some ordinances in our City that restrict the height of vegetation in certain areas. For instance, grass, weeds, and wild blackberries are not allowed to be taller than 8 inches in height. Trees and shrubs overhanging the sidewalk below 8 feet and the street below 12 feet must be cut so that pedestrians and vehicles can pass safely.

Finally, for our friends at the fire department, we need to keep a 3 foot radius clear around the fire hydrants, so they can protect all the investments that you and your family have made. If you have any questions, contact me at 503-786-7409 or salyerst@milwaukieoregon.gov.

In the Works

Project Updates from Engineering Department

Milwaukie Riverfront Park - Phase II Construction

- The floating dock is installed.
- Concrete work is making its way up towards Washington Street to complete the new access point.
- New curbline constructed over old Jackson Street access point.
- Old utility poles removed from middle of park.
- Bathroom construction is progressing off-site.
- Work on new signal at Washington Street to begin in April.
- Grand Opening for the completion of Phase II improvements scheduled for May 1st.

Adams Street Connector

Once constructed the Adams Street Connector Project will create an active pedestrian boulevard with street furniture and trees to connect Milwaukie's future downtown light rail station at 21st Avenue and Lake Road with Main Street. Construction is anticipated to begin in late April and be completed by the end of June.

Street Surface Maintenance Program

This year's Street Surface Maintenance Program project is the reconstruction of Railroad Avenue from 37th Avenue to Linwood Avenue. Construction is scheduled to begin in the middle of July and be completed by the end of August.

Moving Forward project in gear

The Planning Commission recommended approval of the downtown Milwaukie plan and code amendment package on March 10th. The first Council hearing is scheduled for May 5th and will hopefully be in effect by early summer 2015. These amendments address how new development looks and functions and the process required for approval.

The Planning Commission begins hearings on the Central Milwaukie plan and code amendment package on April 28th. These amendments address allowable uses, development and design standards, and creating connections to and through Central Milwaukie.

Finally, the Neighborhood Main Streets phase that focuses on 32nd and 42nd Avenues kicks off with a project advisory committee (PAC) meeting on April 1st. This phase of the project follows up on the 2012 Neighborhood Main Streets project, which was conducted by a group of graduate students from Portland State University.

Museum opens Curiosities exhibit

What do boxing gloves, avocado seed dolls, and a permanent wave machine (right) all have in common?

They are some of the items of our newest exhibit at 3737 SE Adams St. The exhibit is named Curiosities from the Museum's Collections and was funded by a donation from Jeff Odegaard.

Curiosities from the Museum's Collections highlights some of the artifacts that have been donated to the Milwaukie Historical Society over the decades. When the historical society was first organized in 1936, it initially focused on public programming. Eventually, the society began gathering artifacts and displayed these at the Ledding Library, the Milwaukie Masonic Lodge, and the old City Hall on Monroe Street.

The collections grew significantly with the opening of a stand-alone museum in 1975. The historical society and museum now have hundreds of artifacts, relating to local, regional, and statewide history. The artifacts in this exhibit span more than a century of history, from an 1850 tombstone to a souvenir from the 1980 eruption of Mount St. Helens.



Explore the stories behind these unique objects. Many can be studied further in the historical society's research library. Visit Milwaukie Museum on Saturdays and Sundays from 1-5 p.m. to view the newest exhibit.

PASS to extinguish fires

Clackamas Fire has a number of fire and life safety initiatives that we focus on and this month's is the use of fire extinguishers.

A fire extinguisher is your best defense against small, contained fires that have just begun to

burn and can control flames until the fire department arrives.

Every type of extinguisher is designed to fight a certain type of fire and there are four classes which are determined by the type of fuel. Using the wrong fire extinguisher can cause a fire to spread and place you in greater danger.

To use an extinguisher safely, stand eight to ten feet from the fire with your back to an unblocked exit and use the PASS procedure. For more information, please

Approximately 540 fourth and fifth grade students from five schools attended the event to see exhibits, demonstrations, and stage shows about water-related issues. Milwaukie Stormwater was one of 18 agencies and non-profit groups exhibiting.



At the City's exhibit, kids got to see how surface waters can be polluted by seemingly innocuous activities and chemicals found in our neighborhoods, when the rain comes and washes them into nearby creeks and streams.



Congratulations to Kim Travis who is now Ardenwald-Johnson Creek Neighborhood Association's Public Safety Advisory Committee representative. The NDA nominated Kim at the February regular meeting and was appointed by Milwaukie City Council on March 17th.

Questions about possible parking garage at Tacoma St./ Johnson Creek Station were raised in February. TriMet responded, saying the unused contingency funds cannot be used for a parking garage, therefore, the parking garage will not be. The access stairs from Springwater Trail to the bottom of the access path was also cut, which would have saved pedestrians from east walking an extra 0.2 mile.

Spring is here and plants are in bloom once again. This also means upcoming plant sales to continue fundraising for Balfour Park (*Check page 4 for details*).

We'll have our board elections at the May regular NDA meeting. All positions are up for elections. The May meeting date is to be determined because fourth Monday being Memorial Day.
