Annual 9K for K9 a success



City weathering drought

Having come through the hottest and driest June on record the City's water system was able to handle the sustained heavy water usage. In June 2014, the City produced 62 million gallons, this June the City produced 90 million gallons. Thankfully, at the time of print, July's usage was on pace with the last several years.

The City is more protected against drought conditions because the City's water supply is ground water. City well records show no change in the water level of the aquifer over the past 20 years.

Making Downtown shine

Thanks to the organizing efforts of Celeste A. LeDuke, owner of Designing Women LTD., and Kelli Keehner, President of the Downtown Milwaukie Business Association, many of Milwaukie's Downtown businesses proudly sported red, white and blue bunting, American flags, and supportive messages for the men and women of our military. Have parklet opinions?

On May 22, 2014, the Milwaukie City Council approved a pilot program for downtown seasonal parklets for a 2-year period. A parklet re-purposes part of the street into a space for people; on-street parking spaces are transformed into small parks and seating areas.

One application for a parklet was submitted, approved, and constructed – at Wine:30, 10835 SE Main Street (*right*). The pilot program expires in November 2015.

City Council is considering whether or not to establish a permanent downtown parklet program and will be discussing this issue during the regular session of the Council meeting on Sept. 15th.

We are asking members of our community to participate in a brief survey to help answer whether or not the parklet program should be permanent. Thank you for your participation in this brief survey to assist the City in this discussion!

Forward near completion

After two years, the three phases of the Moving Forward Milwaukie project are nearing completion.

The goal of the Moving Forward project is to remove barriers and encourage appropriate development in Milwaukie's commercial areas.

After four public hearings, City Council plans to adopt the final package of amendments to the plans and regulations in downtown Milwaukie on August 18th.

Phase 2, which will implement regulations and a new vision for central Milwaukie, reached a milestone when the Planning Commission recommended adoption of the package of amendments on July 14th. City Council hearings are expected to begin in September.

Work on Phase 3, amendments to the regulations guiding uses, development, and design in the "neighborhood main street" commercial areas of 32nd and 42nd Avenues, will be coming before the Planning Commission for discussion on August 11th.

With the opening of light rail just around the corner I want to take a minute to give you a quick update on how the public safety planning is going.

So far we have filled five out of the six vacant positions we had at the Police Department last year. With a recent retirement that means we have two more still to fill. As our recruits are released to solo status, we are plugging them into the schedule to beef-up staffing levels. We hope to use some of those hours to enhance our patrols in the downtown area to include foot and or bicycle patrol in the downtown core during peak commute times.

We have also been performing both table-top and live exercises with the Transit Police, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office and CCFD#1 over the last few months. Our officers are receiving training on enforcement of TriMet rules and processes as well as the functionality of some of the trains' safety features.

We hope all of this will help provide a safe environment in the downtown area as well as a better experience for


The City Code Corner

There is an invasive tree that is spreading quite fast in the City called the Tree of Heaven.

These leafy trees destroy foundations and sewer pipes. They produce toxins in the soil that prevent native plants from being established. They spread by seeds that are paper thin that helicopter down as they fall from the tree and by re-sprouting off of roots.

Please remove starts by digging them up entirely as soon as you can. If you have a large full grown tree in your yard please think about getting rid of it and grinding the roots very soon.



Home of Hoover

Milwaukie has had Presidential visits. John F. Kennedy stopped by the soda fountain at the antique store on Main and Monroe Street and there is some evidence that Ulysses S. Grant, while a Quarter Master at Fort Vancouver, traveled to Milwaukie for supplies. But did you know a President lived in Milwaukie?

So where is the evidence?


Dr. John Minthorn was the uncle of our 31st President, Herbert Hoover. When Hoover's parents died, a 9-year-old Herbert Hoover came to live with his uncle here in Milwaukie, before moving to

Newberg at age 11. The evidence that Dr. Minthorn lived in Milwaukie

is well documented. There is Minthorn North Natural Area located at the corner of 37th and Railroad, which was named because of Minthorn Springs, the subdivision. Minthorn Springs was developed in 1885 and was advertised as an alternative to Portland.

There is Minthorn Community Church, which was started in 1929 located at 40th and Llewelling St. It is now named Milwaukie Covenant Church on Linwood Ave. Inside is a stained glass window from President Hoover celebrating the opening of the church.

And the best evidence comes from the Dictionary of Oregon History by Corning. It states, "Thirty first President of the United States, was born in West Branch, Iowa... both parents died before he was nine and he was sent to Milwaukie to live with his uncle, Dr. John C. Minthorn. They moved to Newberg, Oregon where Herbert Hoover attended Pacific Academy (later known as George Fox College) 1885-1888."
