and clerks of election, and declaring an emergency" was taken up for the first time and read. Ordinance Number 412 was read for the second and third times by title only with the consent of all members of the Council and put on its passage with the following results being had. Ayes: Kemmerer, Makin, Newman, Sperr. Nays: none. Ordinance Number 412 passed the Council.

Miss Doris Bridwell asked that the Council reconsider the sale of Lots 47 and 48 Block 16, Minthorne Addition.

Mr. Bevington placed before the Council for their consideration, an estimate, from the Western Golf Course Supply Co. as to cost of Peat Moss, and variety and cost of seed for the City Hall Grounds lawn. Mrs. Annie Hughs placed before the Council, a letter from Clackamas County Agent, Mr. J.J. Inskeep, in which he offered his services in conjunction with the new lawn.

The Recorder was directed to write to Mr. Inskeep requesting him to make an analysis of the soil and outline a course to be followed as to fertilizer, preparation of soil etc.

It was agreed by the Council that the City Hall and Parks Committee be authorized to proceed with the work and planting of the lawn as they see fit.

A communication from Mr. Philip Jacob, in which he tendered his resignation as Police Officer, to become effective on March 31, 1941, and the Mayor's acceptance of the resignation, was read.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Kemmerer that Mr. Jacob's resignation be accepted. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. V.R. Reverman discussed with the Council the matter of a water Reservoir or Tank for the City. Mr. Reverman agreed to make a survey of the City's needs and report at the next regular meeting of the Council.

On motion duly made and seconded the Council adjourned.

MEETING OF APRIL 14, 1941.

COUNCIL CHAMBERS

531st. COUNCIL.

The five hundred thirty-first regular meeting of the Council was held on the fourteenth day of April, 1941.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Roberts.

Present: Mayor Roberts, Councilmen Newman, Makin, Walden, Sperr, and Kemmerer; Water Superintendent Bevington, Fire Chief Lewellyn, Marshal Rigdon, Attorney Adams and Recorder Martin.

The minutes of the five hundred thirtieth regular meeting of the Council held on the twenty-fourth day of March 1941, the minutes of an adjourned meeting of the Council held on the twenty-seventh day of March 1941, and the minutes of a special meeting of the Council held on the third day of April, 1941 were read and approved as read.

Mrs. Eckenberger presented to the Council, a booklet, "History of Clackamas County Libraries," and explained to the Council, the usage of moneys the Council might appropriate for the Library.

It was moved by Newman and seconded by Walden that the Council appropriate to the Library the sum of forty-eight dollars (\$48.00) said sum to be taken from the Stenographic fund. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Council requested Attorney Adams to write to Mr. E.E. Anderson, regarding the Ivy on the walk in front of his property on 23rd, street.

Mr. Bevington reported that Mr. W.W. Jones of Toledo Oregon, had made investigation as to soil conditions, W.P.A. requirements, etc, for the Water storage Tank for Milwaukie, and had offered to design a tank similar to the Hewitt tank, make drawings, specifications etc. in accordance with, and satisfactory to the requirements of the Government W.P.A. Engineers, at a cost not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and would give Engineering service when needed during construction of the tank at a cost of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per day plus milage expenses.

A communication from Mr. V.D. Reverman of Reverman and Chevney in which he stated that he would do all Engineering work in connection with the proposed enlargement of the water distribution system, for the sum of 3% of the total cost of the project, or two

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hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for all preliminary surveys, plans, specifications etc. was read.

A communication from Mr. J.C.Stevens of Stevens and Koon, in which he outlined the City's needs in connection with the proposed water storage tank, and quoted a price of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for preliminary work, was read.

It was moved by Walden and seconded by Sperr that the City accept the offer of Mr. Jones, for plans and specifications for the water Storage Tank, to be satisfactory to the Government W.P.A. Engineers and to the City Council, at a price not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr J.J.Inskeep explained to the Council the manner in which the soil should be prepared, and the kind of seed used, for the City Hall lawn.

Applications from the following persons, for the position of Police Officer were read. Mr. Sam Riley, Mr. H.A.Burbank, Mr. Len Maple, Mr. A.F.Hoverton, and Mr. C.E.Gregory.

It was moved by Kemmerer and seconded by Makin that the Council consider the five applications and defer action until the next regular meeting of the Council on April 28, 1941. Motion carried and so ordered.

A communication was read from Mr. P.R.Oshanic in which he called the attention of the Council to the condition of the dead-end fence at Llewellyn street east of 24th street.

It was moved by Sperr and seconded by Makin that Mr. Bevington be instructed to build and paint a fence at the dead-end of Llewellyn street east of 24th street. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Fire Chief's monthly report was read and ordered filed.

Fire Chief Lewellyn reported that the Firemen preferred that a part of the money budgeted for training salaries, be placed in a fund to be used for replacement and repair of clothing damaged while in active duty, the amount of such expenditures to be determined by a committee of Firemen.

It was moved by Sperr and seconded by Walden that the City give to the Fire Department, sixty dollars (\$60.00) for the Firemen's Relief Fund. Motion carried and so ordered

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Sperr that the City employ Mr. Wm.Hofmann as Assistant Water Superintendent at a salary of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per month beginning April 15, 1941. Motion carried and so ordered.

The matter of deciding which funds Mr. Hofmann's salary is to be taken from was referred to the Water and Street Commissioners, Finance and Fire committees.

The Auditor's report was read and ordered filed.

It was moved by Kemmerer and seconded by Makin that the following bills be allowed and that the Recorder be directed to issue warrants for the payment of same.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Sperr that the City purchase hose reel and parts for repair of the old Fire Truck. Motion carried and so ordered.

MEETING OF APRIL 28, 1941.

COUNCIL CHAMBERS

532nd. COUNCIL

The five hundred thirty-second regular meeting of the Council was held on the twenty-eighth day of April, 1941.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Roberts.

Present: Mayor Roberts; Councilmen Newman, Walden, Sperr, and Kemmerer; Water Superintendent Bevington, Fire Chief Lewellyn, Marshal Rigdon, and Recorder Martin. Absent: Councilman Makin and Attorney Adams.

The minutes of the five hundred thirty-first regular meeting of the Council held on the fourteenth day of April 1941, were read and approved as read.

Mr. Bevington brought before the Council the plans, specifications, estimate of cost of materials etc. for the Water Storage Tank as prepared by Mr. W.W.Jones, and reported that Mr. Stewart, W.P.A. Engineer, had checked all plans, blue prints etc. and had found them to be complete and satisfactory.

It was moved by Newman and seconded by Walden that the Council permit Mr. Ted Binn to drive his tractor on the City streets from his home to the City Hall and return. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Walden reported his findings as to his investigation of applicants for the position of City Police Officer and recommended Mr. Burbank.

It was moved by Kemmerer and seconded by Walden that the Council accept Mr. Walden's recommendation and procure the services of Mr. Burbank as City Police Officer at a salary of \$125.00 per month beginning May 1, 1941. Motion carried and so ordered.

It was decided by the Council that the salary for Mr. William Hofmann be taken from the Fire, Water, and Street funds in the following amounts. Fire \$20.00, Water \$48.00, Street \$ 32.00.

An invitation to the Council to attend the District Convention of the American Water Works Association, in Seattle, was read.

A petition requesting that Harvey Avenue be oiled, signed by residents along said street, was read.

Mr. Sperr reported that he had been making investigation of the condition of streets throughout the Town and getting estimates of cost of repair of a number of streets and would be prepared to submit a report at the next regular meeting of the Council.

A communication was read, from the Bureau of Water Works, Portland, in which was stated that beginning May 1, 1941 the Stand-By charge for Milwaukie would be thirty dollars (\$30.00) per month.
