MEETING OF MAY 12, 1952

COUNCIL CHAMBERS

796th MEETING

The seven hundred ninety-sixth regular meeting of the Council was held on the twelfth day of May, 1952

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Sperr.

Present: Mayor Sperr; Councilmen Taylor, Mullan, Klein and Norbeck; Attorney Kirkpatrick and Recorder Martin.

The minutes of the seven hundred ninety-fifth regular meeting held on the twenty-eighth day of April 1952, were approved as written.

Mr. Henkel, from Henkel & Son, house movers, came before the Council and requested permission to move a small house through town over the following route: East on Harrison Street to 36th, north on 36th Street to King Road, east on King Road to 40th Street northon 40th Street to Harvey. Mr. Henkel showed that he would be financially responsible and that he would have traffic flagmen along the route. It was moved by Mullan and seconded by Norbeck that Henkel & Son be permitted to move a small house over the route as designated above. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mayor Sperr reported that a "FOR SALE" sign was being made and that he would soon have it in place on the property now for sale by the City in Kellogg Park.

Mrs. I. Jones came before the Council and reported that the contractors had left her property in a bad condition after going through same to lay intercepting sewer and man hole. Attorney Kirkpatrick substantiated Mrs. Jones' claim. It was agreed that acting Manager Sperr should contact P.S. Lord and have the property put back in proper condition immediately.

Mr. Maurice Edwards, owner of the 23rd Street Apartments, came before the Council and stated that he objected to paying fifty cents per month per apartment for sewage disposal maintenance fee, stating that a majority of his tenants were single persons, and asked that his bill be computed at industrial rates. Mr. Edwards was advised that apartments were considered as dwellings and that the ordinance stated that each water user was obliged to pay the sewage disposal fee, and that industrial rates were for industries only.

There was discussion about serving water to users outside the city limits along Lake Road. It was shown that Mr. Fred Cockell owned a two inch water pipe line running along lake Road east of the City limits to his property. Mr. Maynard Egge is now desirous of tapping into the line for service to his new residence outside the city limits on Lake Road. The question was, "Should the City take over Cockell's line, be responsible for its maintenance, and permit new users to tap the line, or continue to serve Cockell through the meter now at the City Limit line; thereby holding Cockell responsible for water passing through the meter and maintenance of his own line; It was decided that the Cockell meter would stay where it is and that the City would not take over his pipe line.

Ordinance Number 564, AN ORDINANCE providing for the grading and surfacing with gravel, of Penzance Street for its entire length; and directing the City Manager to give notice inviting proposals for such grading and graveling, by publication of said notice in the Daily Journal of Commerce, at least once; and declaring an emergency, was taken up and read in full for its second reading and put on its passage with the following results being had: Ayes: Sperr, Taylor, Mullan, Klein and Norbeck. Nays: None. Ordinance No. 564 was passed by the Council and so declared by the Mayor.

Ordinance Number 565, AN ORDINANCE providing for the construction of a sanitary sewer along Penzance street along its entire length; and directing the City Manager to give notice inviting proposals therefore, by publications of such notice in the Daily Journal of Commerce at least one time, and declaring an emergency, was taken up and read in full for its second reading and put on its passage with the following results being had. Ayes: Sperr, Taylor, Mullan, Klein and Norbeck. Nays: None. Ordinance Number 565 passed the Council and was so declared by the Mayor.

Ordinance Number 566, AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of Monroe and Campbell Streets by construction of curbs and sidewalks along both sides of such portion thereof, was taken up and read in full for its second reading and put on its passage with the following results being had. Ayes: Sperr, Taylor, Mullan, Klein and Norbeck. Nays: None. Ordinance Number 566 was passed by the Council and so declared by the Mayor.

Ordinance Number 567 AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of 27th Street by construction of curbs and sidewalks along both sides of said 27th Street, from Washington Street to Lake Road, where none now exist and where they do exist but do not conform to city standards, as to alignment, grade or quality, was taken up and read in full for its second reading and put on its passage with the following results being had: Ayes: Sperr, Taylor, Mullan, Klein and Norbeck. Nays: None. Ordinance Number 567 was passed by the Council and declared by the Mayor.

It was moved by Taylor and seconded by Norbeck that the following Resolution be adopted: *Resolution Number 8-1952*

WHEREAS, Almighty God, in His infinite Wisdom has seen fit to remove from this earthly life, FRED E. BEVINGTON, AND

WHEREAS, FRED E. BEVINGTON was a highly respected citizen of Milwaukie and had faithfully and honorably served the said City of Milwaukie from 1943 to 1945 as Councilman and has also served the City as Water Superintendent and Volunteer Fireman thereof, with credit to himself and to the said City, and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Milwaukie is appreciative of the service rendered to the City by FRED E. BEVINGTON, and the high type of citizenship which he exemplified, and regrets his passing, NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT, AND IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, That the appreciation of the Council of the City of Milwaukie, of the high type of the citizenship exemplified by FRED E. BEVINGTON, and of the creditable and honorable service which he rendered to the said City, and further, the regret of said Council at his passing, be conveyed to his surviving relatives, and further, that a copy be spread upon the minutes of the proceedings of this body.

Passed by the Council of the City of Milwaukie, Oregon, this twelfth day of May, 1952.

SPECIAL MEETING OF MAY 19, 1952
