

SPECIAL MEETING OF MAY 7, 1941.

(Cont'd)

authorizing the Council of Milwaukie to expend not to exceed \$100.00 in conducting that certain election to be held on the 5th day of May, 1941, relating to the question of the construction of a United States Housing Project in Milwaukie.

502 YES. I vote for the amendment.....244
503 NO. I vote against the amendment.....154

It was moved by Kemmerer and seconded by Walden that the canvass be accepted. Upon roll call being taken, the following result was had:
Ayes: Kemmerer, Makin, Newman Sperr, Walden. Nays: None.
Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Sperr and seconded by Kemmerer that Mr. H.H.Moyer's Theater building permit be extended until June 13, 1941, and that if further progress of the building is satisfactory to the Council, the permit will continue in force. Motion carried and so ordered.

A Resolution, signed by fourteen Citizens, was presented to the Council, which in part read as follows:

"RESOLVED: That we ask the City Council of Milwaukie to use every means possible to urge the United States Housing Authority to discontinue permanently all work on the Project".

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Newman that the Recorder send the following extract from the Citizen's Resolution to the United States Housing Authority, Washington, D.C.; Langdon Post, Regional Director U.S.H.A. San Francisco Cal; Clackamas County Housing Authority, Clackamas, Oregon; Senator Charles L. McNary, Rufus Holman, James W. Mott, and Homer D. Angel; Washington D.C.

"WHEREAS: The legal voters of the City of Milwaukie, at a regularly called election held on May 5th 1941, voted practically three to one (102 for and 304 against) in opposition to the United States Housing Project known as the Milwaukie Project, now therefore be it,

RESOLVED: That the Council of Milwaukie request the United States Housing Authority to discontinue permanently all work on the Project"
Motion carried and so ordered.

On motion duly made and seconded the meeting adjourned.

MEETING OF MAY 12, 1941.

COUNCIL CHAMBERS

533rd. MEETING.

The five hundred thirty-third regular meeting of the Council was held on the twelfth day of May 1941.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Roberts.

Present: Mayor Roberts; Councilmen Newman, Makin, Walden, Sperr, and Kemmerer. Water Superintendent Bevington, Fire Chief Lewellyn, Marshal Rigdon, Attorney Adams, and Recorder Martin.

The minutes of the five hundred thirty-second regular meeting of the Council held on the twenty-eighth day of April 1941, were read and corrected as follows; that the motion by Kemmerer should include that the Police Officer was to be hired on a month to month basis, and that the motion by Sperr should include the following supplies to be purchased by Mr. Bevington, two street brooms, twelve meter boxes, and six hack saw blades.

The minutes of the special meeting of the Council held on the seventh day of May 1941, were read and approved as read.

Mr. Adams reported having called on Mr. Wiseman and that Mr. Wiseman had promised to forego his salary in favor of Mrs. Farrington until such time that he could return to the office.

Mrs. Shirley Buck appeared before the Council representing the Evergreen W.C.T.U. and asked that that organization be authorized to plant a tree in the City Hall grounds, as a memorial to Mrs. Mildred Eisert.

Mr. Bevington gave an interesting and instructive report of the District Convention of the American Water Works Association, and stated that a copy of the proceedings would be sent to the local newspaper.

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Mr Sperr brought before the Council his plans for street improving and dust oiling. It was decided to wait until the next regular meeting of the Council to make any decisions in order that Mr. Adams and Mr. Sperr might make proper investigations as to what could be done about the Logging Companies' use of 21st street from Lake Road to Jefferson St, and Jefferson street from 21st street to Main street.

The matter of the fifteen thousand dollar Bond voted in May 1940 was discussed.

It was moved by Walden and seconded by Makin that the matter regarding the fifteen thousand dollar Bond voted in May 1940, be tabled indefinitely. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Otto Rickman requested that the Council vacate 33rd street in Roseland Addition.

It was moved by Newman and seconded by Walden that Attorney Adams make investigation of 33rd. street in Roseland Addition. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Auditor's monthly report was read and ordered filed.

The Fire Chief's monthly report was read and ordered filed.

The following resolution was read.

WHEREAS, Almighty God in His infinite wisdom has seen fit to remove from this earthly life,

Will Sanders, and

WHEREAS, Will Sanders served the City of Milwaukie with honor and distinction as Mayor and Councilman, and

WHEREAS, The Council of Milwaukie regrets the passing of Will Sanders and his loss to the Citizenry,

NOW THEREFORE

Be It, And It Is Hereby Resolved, that:

- 1.- The appreciation of Milwaukie of the service rendered by Will Sanders to the City and its Citizens, and the high type of character and civic spirit that he exemplified, and
- 2.- That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of the Council; that copies hereof be forwarded to his surviving relatives, and that copies hereof be supplied to the press.

It was moved by Walden and seconded by Makin that the Council accept the resolution. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Council requested that a letter be written to Mr. L.S. Burton extending their appreciation of his service to Milwaukie in the past years as editor of The Milwaukie Review.

It was moved by Makin and Seconded by Sperr that the following bills be allowed and that the Recorder be instructed to issue warrents for the payment of same.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Walden that the City install two lights to be used as police signals, one at Monroe and Main streets, and one at the City Hall. Motion carried and so ordered.

Investigation as to the matter of a franchise for the East ~~Busses~~ Side Busses Inc. was referred to Attorney Adams.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Kemmerer that a bid for Contract for Kerosene oil, from Union Oil Co, be tabled until the next regular meeting of the Council in order that other Oil companies might submit a Bid. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Recorder was instructed to have notice of the opening of Bids for Kerosene on May 26, 1941, put in the Milwaukie Review

Mrs. Newman made a request for one 18inch brush @ \$9.00 and 100 lbs. of sweeping compound for the Janitor.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Sperr that the City purchase 3000 feet of 1/2 inch Type K. copper tubing at a price not to exceed \$16.75 per 100 feet. Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Walden that the City purchase a lock for the door and barr the window of the room south of the kitchen, in the basement of the City Hall, Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Newman and seconded by Makin that the City purchase three cases of Meters. Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Sperr that the City pay five dollars (\$5.00) to each of two men for distributing the Charter Amendment, and five dollars(\$5.00) to each member of the voting boards, and Marshals of the voting boards, who served during the Special Election on May 5, 1941. Motion carried and so ordered.

On motion duly made and seconded the meeting adjourned.
