MEETING OF NOVEMBER 25, 1946

665 th MEETING

The six hundred sixty-fifth regular meeting of the Council was held on the twenty-fifth day of November 1946.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Sperr.

Present: Mayor Sperr, Councilmen Hamlin, Roberts, Nelson, and Rowe. Manager Kelsey, Attorney Kirkpatrick, Treasurer Dillery, and Recorder Martin. Absent. Water Superintendent Hofmann, Fire Chief Lewellyn, and Police Chief Delp.

The minutes of the six hundred sixty-fourth regular meeting of the Council held on the twelfth day of November 1946, were read and approved as read.

Jimmy Newman and Bob Sutherland came before the Council and requested that the Ski Club, a Milwaukie organization, be permitted to use the assembly room of the City Hall for a meeting place on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month. It was moved by Rowe and seconded by Hamlin that the Milwaukie Ski Club, under the direction of Fred Wilde, be allowed to use the assembly room on December 12, 1946, for a preliminary meeting, without cost. Motion carried and so ordered.

Attorney Kirkpatrick read a proposed amendment to Ordinance No. 489.

It was moved by Hamlin and seconded by Nelson that Section 3 of Ordinance 489 be amended, to change the fee for business tax from a blanket fee of \$10.00 to a graduating fee of from \$5.00 to \$15.00. Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Rowe and seconded by Nelson that Ordinance No. 489 be read by title only for its second reading. Motion carried and so ordered.

Ordinance Number 489 AN ORDINANCE regulating and licensing businesses, profession, pursuits and occupations in the City of Milwaukie, and fixing the penalty for the violation of the same, was taken up and read by title only for its second reading and put on its passage with the following result being had. Ayes: Sperr, Hamlin, Roberts, Rowe, and Nelson. Nays. None. Ordinance Number 489 passed the Council and was so declared by the Mayor.

It was moved by Rowe and seconded by Hamlin that the Treasurer-Auditor report be accepted as presented. Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Rowe and seconded by Nelson that the attorney prepare an Ordinance authorizing the issuance of bonds for the improvement of 37th Street, that the date of said bonds shall be January 1, 1947, that the interest shall be 2½%, that the same be advertised in the Milwaukie Review and that the Mayor and Recorder be authorized to sign said bonds. Motion carried and so ordered.

Attorney Kirkpatrick presented a deed, on behalf of Stanley and Genevieve Zelasco for a strip of land 60 feet in width and extending 36th Street south from Harrison Street a distance of 300 feet, to be used for street purposes. It was decided that no action would be taken at this time, pending action taken by the Southern Pacific Co. in extending the street through to Monroe Street.

Manager Kelsey reported that he was making investigation as to what other cities were doing with regard to cutting of curbing for driveways, and that he also was investigating the matter of combining the several insurance policies now held by the City. Mr. Kelsey suggested that in this combination the City could also have liability coverage and asked that a committee be named to act with him in the matter. The Mayor appointed Attorney Kirkpatrick and Auditor Phillips.

Manager Kelsey gave a very good report of the League of Oregon Cities Convention which he had recently attended. Mr. Kelsey stated that the League was going to ask the State Legislature to

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increase the amount of the percentage of gasoline tax and liquor tax allotment which is given to the cities.

A letter from Auditor Phillips stating that the Housing Authority of the County of Clackamas had remitted to the City of Milwaukie in lieu of taxes on Hillside Park, the amount of \$1, 198.32. It was moved by Rowe and seconded by Hamlin that this money be distributed as follows; and that the following sums be paid to the County and school districts.

Motion carried and so ordered.

A petition requesting that a street light be placed at 26th and Lake Road was read. The matter was referred to Manager Kelsey for his investigation and recommendation.

It was moved by Nelson and seconded by Roberts that in accordance with the policy adopted by the Council on October 28, 1946, a recommendation for renewal application for 1947 Retail Beer Class "B" license be granted to Ted Simpson of the Milwaukie Cafe. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Recorder announced that this was the time and place for the hearing on the acceptance or rejection of the sewer on 30th Street from Washington Street to the southerly terminus of 30th Street and that the total cost for said sewer was \$4,882.19. The Mayor called for objections to the acceptance of said sewer. Bob Hofmann protested the condition in which his driveway at 1625 30th Street was left. Manger Kelsey stated that the driveway would be properly cared for and that the assessment roll on the project was sufficient to care for the expense and recommended that the Council accept the project. It was moved by Hamlin and seconded by Rowe that the City accept the 30th Street sewer as finished by the contractors and authorize payment for same. Upon roll call being taken the vote showed the following result; Ayes: Sperr, Hamlin, Roberts, Nelson, and Rowe. Nays: None. The Motion was carried and so ordered.

The Recorder announced that this was the time and place for the hearing on the acceptance or rejection of the Monroe Street sewer from 29th Street northeasterly a distance of 836 feet, and the the total cost of said sewer was \$2,385.76. The Mayor called for objections to the acceptance of said sewer. There were no objections. It was moved by Rowe and seconded by Nelson that the City accept the Monroe Street sewer from 29th Street northeasterly a distance of 836 feet as finished by the Contracors and authorize payment for same. Upon roll call being taken the following results were had. Ayes: Sperr, Hamlin, Roberts, Nelson, and Rowe. Nays, None. Motion carried and was so declared by the Mayor.

Mr. Ivar Tolstead came before the Council and stated that there are now in use in Milwaukie, what is known as Ski Ball games and asked what the license for operating same would be. Attorney was requested to prepare and Ordinance covering license for Ski Ball game, Juke Boxes, and Punch Boards.

Mr. Tolstead also requested that a wig-wag signal be placed at the Southern Pacific Tillamook Branch Tracks crossing Washington Street. Mr. Tolstead was referred to the Public Utilities Commission.

It was moved by Rowe and seconded by Roberts that the following bills be allowed and that the Recorder be directed to issue warrants for the payment of same.

MEETING OF DECEMBER 9, 1946.

666th MEETING

The six hundred sixty-sixth regular meeting of the Council was held on the ninth day of December 1946.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Sperr.

Present: Mayor Sperr; Councilmen Hamlin, Roberts, and Nelson. Manager Kelsey, Attorney Kirkpatrick, and Recorder Martin. Absent; Councilman Rowe, Treasurer Dillery, Water Superintendant Hofmann, and Fire Chief Lewellyn.

The minutes of the six hundred sixty-fifth regular meeting of the Council held on the twenty-fifth day of November 1946 were read and approved as read.

A committee of students from the Milwaukie Union High School, with Rhoda LeCocq as spokesman, Mrs. Margaret Obertuffer, teacher and Mrs. Grace Morse, and Mr. T. H. Strouitt representing the P.T.A. came before the Council. Miss LeCocq presented a plea for a recreational center in Milwaukie. Marilyn Sutherland and Ed. Norbeck also spoke, both stressed the need of a professional director to be in charge of any program which might be worked out. The ladies from the P.T.A. assured the Council that that organization was 100% back of the movement and that they were satisfied that other organizations would join in. Councilman Roberts suggested that a mass meeting be held and that all organizations and churches in Milwaukie be invited to be represented. The date of the meeting was not definitely decided but it was decided that on account of the holiday season the meeting would not be held until the middle of January.

Mr. C. A. Rindt was a visitor at the Council meeting and, while not wishing to make a complaint, stated that he would appreciate having an investigation made of the condition of sidewalks, particularly on Lake Road where the accumulation of mud on the sidewalks forces pedestrians to walk in the street. Mr. Kelsey stated that he would make investigation of the condition of sidewalks throughout the city and if necessary would have offenders punished under the provisions of Ordinance 420.

A letter from Mr. H. M. Ray was read. Mr. Ray requested a temporary permit for remodeling his building at 1024 Main Street. It was moved by Roberts and seconded by Nelson that a temporary permit, with a time limit of one year, for remodeling a building at 1024 Main Street and that a change of occupancy permit be granted to Mr. Ray. Motion carried and so ordered.

A petition, requesting that parking space be reserved for Practicing Physicians with offices in Milwaukie, was read. It was moved by Roberts and seconded by Nelson that the Practicing Physicians with offices in Milwaukie, be exempt from fines for overtime parking providing that their automobiles are properly identified with medical insignia or other identification, and that the Recorder write them each a letter informing them of the action of the Council. Motion carried and so ordered.
