SPECIAL MEETING OF MARCH 20, 1941.

A special meeting of the Council was held on the twentieth day of March 1941, for the purpose of considering Ordinance Number 410 entitled, AN ORDINANCE providing for a special election to be held on the 21st. day of April, 1941, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of Milwaukie, for their acceptance or rejection, a proposal to amend the Charter of Milwaukie, filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 11, 1905, and to amend all Acts amending said Act by providing that the Council of Milwaukie may enter into an agreement with the Clackamas County Housing Authority relative to the establishment of a United States Housing Authority Project within the corporate limits of Milwaukie, and providing further a designation of the polling places, judges and clerks of election, and declaring an emergency, and other matters relating to the proposed United States Housing Authority Project.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Roberts.

Present: Mayor Roberts, Councilmen Newman, Walden, Sperr, and Kemmerer. Attorney Adams and Recorder Martin. Absent: Councilman Makin.

A communication to Mr. Adams, dated March 18, 1941, from Mr. John R. Latourette, secretary of the Clackamas County Housing Authority, which read in part as follows, "The Authority authorized me to say that there was nothing developed at the conference nor has since occurred which would justify it in repudiating its contract and violating its plain public duty, which was fully set out in its letter to you of February 14, 1941" was read, and ordered filed.

It was moved by Kemmerer and seconded by Walden that the Recorder be directed to prepare and post an Ordinance providing that there be submitted to the voters of Milwaukie, for their acceptance or rejection, at an election to be held on May 5, 1941 the following proposals:

A: That the Council of Milwaukie be authorized to enter into an agreement with the Clackamas County Housing Authority relative to the establishment of a United States Housing Authority Project within Milwaukie.

B: That if the majority of the voters of Milwaukie cast a majority of votes against the first proposal, the Council may expend up to Five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for the purpose of contesting or setting aside that certain agreement dated on or about September 9, 1940, between Milwaukie and the Clackamas County Housing Authority.

C: That the Council may expend up to one hundred (\$100.00) dollars in conducting the election.

And designating the existing election receiving board as the election officials. Motion carried and so ordered.

MEETING OF MARCH 24, 1941.

COUNCIL CHAMBERS

530th. COUNCIL

The five hundred thirtieth regular meeting of the Council was held on the twenty-fourth day of March 1941.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Roberts.

Present: Mayor Roberts, Councilmen Newman, Makin, Walden, Sperr. Water Superintendant Bevington, Fire Chief Lewellyn, Marshal Rigdon, Police Officer Jacob, Attorney Adams, and Recorder Martin. Absent: Councilman Kemmerer.

The minutes of the five hundred twenty-ninth regular meeting of the Council, held on the tenth day of March 1941, were read and approved as read.

The Minutes of the Special meeting of the Council, held on the twentieth day of March 1941, were read and approved as read.

Mrs. Rosa Eckenberger brought before the Council the matter of the expenses of the Library, and requested the Council that the City give eight (\$8.00) dollars per month toward these expenses.

It was moved by Walden and seconded by Makin that the matter of a donation toward the expenses of the Library be tabled until the next regular meeting of the Council. Motion carried and so ordered.

A petition protesting the moving of the Arc light at 40th and King streets, was read.

It was moved by Sperr and seconded by Makin that the Council reconsider the moving of the Arc light at 40th and King streets and the Arc light at 28th and Harrison streets. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Bevington was appointed to take charge of the re-shingling of the East Milwaukie Fire Hall.

Mr. J.C. Stevens of the Engineering firm of Stevens and Koon, discussed with the Council the matter of construction of a Water Reservoir and agreed to meet with the Council at a future date.

It was moved by Sperr and seconded by Makin that Mr. Bevington be authorized to purchase twenty (20) gallons of traffic paint. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Bevington reported that the estimated cost of putting a drain pipe under Main Street at Jackson street, would be two hundred dollars (\$200.00) and that a drain pipe to a Man-hole west of Main street on Jackson street would be one hundred dollars (100.00)

Mrs. Newman brought before the Council competitive bids for the supplies for a sprinkling system for the City Hall grounds. Mr. Makin requested that the Council postpone a decision in order that he might obtain a bid from a California firm.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Walden that the City purchase the oil stove now in use in the Police Officer's quarters, at a price not to exceed fourteen and 75/100 dollars (\$14.75). Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Sperr that the matter of construction a section of sidewalk on Harrison street, west of the Jr. High School, be tabled until a future date. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Bob Malloy brought before the Council the matter of lowering the cost of license for Pin-Ball Machines.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Newman that the City establish a fee of five dollars (\$5.00) per month for each Pin-Ball amusement device operated in the City. Mr. Walden amended Mr. Makin's motion to include that this fee be established for a term of ninety days. Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Walden that Mrs. Farrington be employed as deputy Treasurer during Mr. Wiseman's absence in April. Motion carried and so ordered.

It was moved by Makin and seconded by Newman that a certain list of past due and unpaid water bills as of March 24, 1941,
