

Special meeting of the City Council of Milwaukee was held on the evening of November 16th, 1911 in the ~~office of the Bank~~ ^{regular form} pursuant to call by the Mayor. Present Mayor Streib; Councilmen, John R. Kelso, W. F. Lehman and W. A. Knight.

Meeting called to order by Mayor Streib.

The purpose of the meeting as stated by Mayor Streib was to correct or reconsider a motion made at the Regular meeting of the Council November 14th, at which meeting A. L. Bolstad was appointed as Deputy Recorder.

It was moved by Knight and Seconded by Kelso that the motion made at the meeting of the Council held on the evening of November 14th, appointing A. L. Bolstad as assistant or deputy Recorder be rescinded. Carried.

The office of Recorder being vacant it was moved by Kelso and seconded by Knight that Bolstad be appointed temporary Recorder, Carried

There being no further business it was moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

The Council of the Town of Milwaukee met in special session Tuesday evening Nov. 21st, 1911 in the Council chamber pursuant to a call by the Mayor. Present Mayor Streib, Councilmen, John R. Kelso W. F. Lehman and C. T. Stockton. *at the A. L. Bolstad Marsh & Co.*

Meeting called to order by Mayor Streib, whereupon the purpose of the meeting was stated by the Mayor as being called to hear objections or remonstrances in reference to the assessment levied for the improvement on Washington Street, Fourth Street and Oak Street. Objections were read by the Recorder from the following parties Dan Mass and H.A. and Mary Smith stating that they being over 100 feet back from Washington Street thought they were unjustly assessed for improvement on said Washington Street. The reason given that they thought that assessments should be levied on only property 100 feet from the Street Mr. Mass being present in person voiced his sentiments besides sending in his written complains.

Explanations were then given by L. H. Campbell stating that Block A. in which it appears Dan Mass has his property is about 400 feet long and has an ally 11 ft through the center and according to the charter the assessment would run back to the side of the alley nearest the street improved, found in Sect. 56 of the amended charter and also Sect. 50 in reference to the meaning of the terms owned, abutting property and the word abutting.

In reference to Block B. the City Engineer explained the method of levying the assessments running back to the middle of the block in accordance with the section ^{referred to} and ~~an account of~~ this line being irregular on account of the irregular shape of the block it appears that Mr. Smith's property ~~is~~ located in this block and over 100 feet back from Washington Street, but located in such a way that it lies partly between a line drawn through the center of the block and Washington street, and as the charter provides that the assessment shall extend back to the middle of the block from the street improved it seems natural that the Council was unable and powerless to give the relief asked for in the remonstrances and complaints. Hence the unanimous opinion of the Council was that the assessments had been levied in accordance to and in compliance with the provisions of the charter governing the levying of assessments.

The Mayor further called attention to the fact that the resolution ordering the improvement of Monroe Street between the east side curb line of Front Street and the west ~~side~~ lint of Main Street had been posted the required length of time, whereupon it was moved by Lehman and seconded by Kelso that the Recorder be instructed to draw an ordinance for the improvement of Monroe Street. *and post the same*

The recorder then gave a report as to the cost of having bonds printed. Two houses had submitted bids. Bonds printed without the names of the Mayor and Recorder would cost \$42.50 per 100, and with the names of the Mayor and Recorder on the coupons \$5.00 extra or \$47.50 per 100. 200 bonds would cost in the neighborhood of \$52.50. Hence it was thought advisable not to order any bonds printed until all the assessments were in and all applications for bonding filed, that bonds for all the improvements made could be printed at one time.

No further business moved by Kelso and seconded by Lehman that we adjourn.

The first order of business was the reading of a certificate for the improvement of Main Street signed by the City Engineer stating that Contractor W. H. Counsell had completed the work according to plans and specifications to the satisfaction of the Engineer and street committee.
