Council explores cost-savings opportunity

Milwaukie City Council is weighing the option of recommending a \$4 million bond measure for voter approval as a way to save money and retain core services.

If voters approve, general obligation bonds would finance early repayment of the \$4 million debt for Milwaukie's share of light rail construction costs. The bond proceeds would refinance and prepay the debt at a lower interest rate (estimated three per cent), saving the City approximately \$850,000.

Currently, the debt is being repaid from the City's General Fund, which also supports core services including police and Mike Miller are assigned protection, library and parks.

Refinancing the debt would allow the City to retain core services.

The bonds would be payable from property taxes. The additional tax is estimated to cost \$34 per year for a Milwaukie home with taxable value of \$200,000.

Councilors Mark Gamba to lead the City Council's research for the bond measure. In addition to opinion research

As I sat in the dentist chair yesterday my thoughts turned to the Milwaukie Daze festival of 2015. One of the big events I'm involved in, along with the Milwaukie American Legion, is bringing the Vietnam Memorial Wall to our community.

The wall memorializes and honors those who lost their lives serving our country in Vietnam. 2015 will mark the 50-year-rememberance of the war. Jerry Craig of the Milwaukie American Legion

is a part of the effort to bring the Wall to Milwaukie, and he shared with me the following facts.

There are 58,267 names now listed on the polished black wall

THE NAMES ARE ARRANGED IN THE ORDER IN WHICH THEY WERE TAKEN FROM US BY DATE, AND WITHIN EACH DATE, THE NAMES ARE ALPHABETIZED

The first known casualty was on June 8, 1956. 39,996 on the Wall were just 22 or younger

There are three sets of fathers and sons on the Wall

33,103 18-YEAR-OLDS ARE ON THE WALL

Five soldiers on the Wall were 16-years-old One soldier, PFC Dan Bullock, was 15

997 SOLDIERS WERE KILLED ON THEIR FIRST DAY IN VIETNAM

1,448 SOLDIERS WERE KILLED ON THEIR LAST DAY OF TOUR IN VIETNAM

8 women are on the Wall - all were nursing the wounded

The most deaths on a single day was Jan. 31, 1968 - 245 deaths

Updates on projects from the Community Development Department

Transportation System Plan (TSP) Update

- The TSP is the City of Milwaukie's long-range transportation plan. City Council formally adopted the updated TSP at its Nov. 19th, meeting.
- The amendments adopted were the product of two public meetings and an Open House, two Planning Commission hearings, and three City Council meetings.
- The outreach was conducted over a 10-month period of time.

Moving Forward Milwaukie: Enhancing our Commercial Districts Project

 At its Dec. 3rd Work Session the City Council will be reviewing draft development concepts for five opportunity sites in Downtown Milwaukie and two opportunity sites in Central Milwaukie (which includes the commercially zoned areas around the Milwaukie Marketplace shopping center.

Quiet Zone Project - 37th Avenue & Oak Street Quiet Zone Improvements

- Construction completed at the end of November.
- The Application for Quiet Zone Approval has been sent to ODOT Rail.
- Staff expects to have Quiet Zone approval around Dec. 31st.

Sidewalk Ramp Enhancement Project

- Sidewalk ramps near public buildings will be reconstructed and brought into ADA compliance.
- At this time, construction is expected to begin Dec. 9th, and last approximately 60 days.



Rain & leaves bad combo

Heavy rains and falling leaves are a bad combination for the City's stormwater system for two major reasons – the leaves clog storm drain grates and create flooding conditions, and the additional runoff carries more pollutants to local waterways.

Here's a couple tips to aid both of these conditions:

- Use a rake to clear storm drains of leaves and debris near your home or business to help reduce flooding. Dispose of the leaves in yard waste containers, compost bins or at the City's leaf drop site (see above), or, spread them over your garden to protect and nourish perennials.
- Call the stormwater department at 503-786-7687 if you spot a clogged storm drain.
- Don't dump ANYTHING into a storm drain. It's not just wrong, it's against the law.
- Don't drain anything a pool, hot tub, into a storm drain.
 Send it to the sanitary sewer system via toilet, sink or tub drain instead.

"December 7th, 1941, a date which will live in infamy, the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan." - President Franklin Roosevelt.

The Milwaukie economy during the 20's and 30's was based mainly on farming. The biggest crops were flowers, berries, and celery. In fact, in 1924 the celery industry, which included the Meeks Bros., Binn Bros., Takemoto, and Watanabe Bros., cultivated and harvested 4 million plants a year.

What is the connection between these historical facts? It is the most heartfelt, community gift we as Milwaukians should be proud of.

Once America declared war on the Empire of Japan, Japanese, citizens or not of the United States, were directed to "internment" camps to ensure no information was being relayed to the Empire.

The Wantanbe's of Milwaukie were one of those families. They took very little possessions and were carted off to the middle of Idaho for "internment." Their celery business was done, all that they had worked for, their lives and legacy, swept away by actions not in their control. But the Citizens of Milwaukie

made a promise to the Watanabe's.

They would keep their celery farm working, so when the Watanabe family came back, the farm would be there for them. And when the Watanabe's returned near the end of the War, their farm, their homes, and their lives were ready for them to enjoy and prosper.

I cannot think of a better Holiday story than this one. One of helping your neighbors and friends when it is needed the most. So when serving your Holiday dinners, have some celery.

For Milwaukie, it is the truest symbol of a Christmas gift a community can bestow for one of its citizens.
