Monroe project seeking input

The City of Milwaukie is planning safety improvements on Monroe Street, and the project team is seeking your input.

A public workshop will be held on Wed., Dec. 3rd, at 6 p.m., in the Public Safety Community Room, 3200 SE Harrison St., and will present existing conditions and potential design elements that could be included in a Concept Plan that aims to make Monroe Street a low-traffic, low-speed street that provides safe, quiet routes for motorists, pedestrians, and cyclists.

Monroe Street is identified in the City's Transportation System Plan (TSP) as a potential "Neighborhood Greenway." Neighborhood Greenways often include

This month's Councilor Column is written by Councilor Mike Miller. Councilor Miller completes his term on Dec. 31, 2014.



It seems like only yesterday I was sworn in to begin a 4-year-term. Time has gone fast and many changes have taken place in the City. I will only list a few as space is limited.

The beginning of the development of Milwaukie Riverfront Park is on my list of major accomplishments that I feel proud to be a part. With the development of the park, Milwaukie will have the finest park on the Willamette River.

The most profound change is the construction of the light rail line which is to open in September of 2015. Thanks to all of you, the debt will be paid from a bond passed by you which will allow city services to be maintained at their current levels. All of you now must be vigilant in making sure that light rail meets your needs and TriMet lives up to the agreement made with the City and the City lives up to your expectations.

The improved library system and someday a new and improved library. The library is a place where people come and go with a smile.

An improved sidewalk system and future additions.

A program to improve downtown without giving up the small-town atmosphere and livability.

Finally, in the near future, July 23 – 27, 2015 the City in concert with Celebrate Milwaukie Inc. will be hosting the return of the Milwaukie festival, and as part of the event, the Vietnam Memorial moving wall will be here to honor those who served and lost their lives defending our country.

This is my final column as a Councilor, but by no means will it be my swan song as an active citizen in Milwaukie. Thanks to each and every one of you for allowing me to serve you these last four years.

Riverfront Park update

December work items at Milwaukie Riverfront Park include installing all of the lighting in the park's two new parking lots, installing the lit bollards along the new 12-foot wide pathway that runs along the shoreline of the Willamette River throughout the park, installing the floating dock alongside the new boat ramp, and implementing the planting plan on the river bank.

Construction of the Phase II improvements was projected to be completed by the end of 2014, but due to the cold weather and its impacts on concrete work and other tasks, the new timeline is to have work completed by the end of February.

Though work will still be underway during the Winter Solstice Event on Dec. 20th, the contractor is working with the City to prepare the site to host the festivities.

Trees added at Kellogg

Early in 2015 about 180 trees and literally thousands of new shrubs will be planted in and around the Kellogg Creek Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP) that's located just south of Milwaukie Riverfront Park.

In June 2014, more than 30 residents attended an open house event to review and provide input on the landscaping project, which calls for species of trees and shrubs that will provide visual screening of the Kellogg Creek WPCP, control and reduce odor, and thrive in the environment.

To make way for the new plantings, approximately 60 trees, the vast majority of which are in poor health or dying, will be removed, and many of the shrubs that line the McLoughlin Boulevard-facing fence will be pulled. While the new plants take root and grow, a fabric lining will be installed on the fence to block the newly exposed views of the plant.

This vegetation project was approved by the Kellogg Good Neighbor Committee, a citizen-based group that recommends to the Milwaukie City Council how the "Good Neighbor Fund" should be prioritized and spent. Clackamas County Service District # 1 deposits \$1.00 per month for each of the City's connections (approximately \$11,000) into the Good Neighbor Fund. These funds are used for Good Neighbor-related projects at and around the Kellogg Creek WPCP.

improvements that reduce vehicle speeds with features like curb extensions or mini traffic circles. The City has secured a State grant to create a Concept Plan for Monroe Street between 21st Avenue and City limits at Linwood Avenue.

A second workshop, to be held in the spring of 2015, will incorporate the input gained at the first workshop and from the project's Project Advisory Committee, which includes citizen representatives from Neighborhood Associations and

the Public Safety Advisory Committee, and will present the draft Concept Plan for feedback.

Washington Street Clay Pipe Replacement Project

This project will replace the more than 80-year-old clay pipe that's underneath Washington Street between 25th and 26th Avenues. Design is underway, and construction is forecasted for late spring 2015. This effort is part of the City's Wastewater Clay Pipe Replacement Program that ensures the replacement of the City's clay pipe with more durable PVC pipe over a 10-year-period.

Railroad Avenue Repaving Project

Design for the reconstruction of Railroad Avenue between Harrison Street and Harmony Road will begin in December in order for construction to take place in the summer of 2015. The Railroad project is part of the City's Street Surface Maintenance Program, which collects funding through utility bills for street improvement projects.

Last FREE Leaf Drop dates are in December

Milwaukie residents can help prevent the clogging of storm drains, which helps prevent local flooding and preserves water quality, by dumping off all of their leaves at the City's Johnson Creek Facility, located at 6101 SE JCB, on:

Saturday, Dec. 6th & Dec. 13th, 7 a.m. to 2 p.m.

A drop box will be available for paper-bagged leaves, and another for plastic-bagged or loose leaves. Residents must bring a copy of a City utility bill to participate. And though, not required, citizens are encouraged to bring canned food that staff will take to a local food bank.

BE PREPARED

Flooding can be a challenge in the coming months of winter rain. Be sure you're aware of rivers or streams nearby which could spill over their banks in the event of heavy rains. In case of a flood in your area, stay informed. Check radio, TV or online for information.

If a flash flood is likely where you live, move to higher ground immediately. While driving, be aware that high water on roadways can hide sinkholes or other dangerous conditions. Turn around! Remember to have a "GO" kit in your car - just in case!

The Chief's Corner

Happy Holidays everyone. I hope this season finds you and yours well. This month I want to take a moment to remind everyone about our CodeRed reverse 911 service for emergency notifications. This system allows us to telephone all, or targeted areas of the City, in case of an emergency situation that requires immediate action.

It is important that residents and businesses have their phone number and address registered in Milwaukie's CodeRED system, especially if using unlisted numbers, cell phones or VOIP (Voice Over Internet Protocol).

Registration is confidential, free, and easy. You can learn more and register on line at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/police/codered-emergency-notification-system.

Those residents and businesses without internet access can call the Milwaukie Police Department at 503-786-7406 to register their emergency information by phone.

THIS SYSTEM WILL ONLY BE USED FOR EMERGENCY PURPOSES. We have used this system when looking for missing children or elderly persons, when there has been police activity which has an immediate life or safety threat in a particular area, or in circumstances where there has been reason to do mass notifications for such things as a hazardous materials incident.

Taking just a few moments to register could help us keep you informed and safe during an emergency.

Support The Moving Wall

Several of Milwaukie's Neighborhood District Associations are donating portions of their City-allocated grant money to support the effort of bringing The Moving Wall, a replica of the Vietnam Memorial Wall, to Milwaukie High School from July 23-26, 2015.

Organizers are shooting to raise about \$50,000, and have applied for other grants throughout the region.



Thousands are expected to visit Milwaukie over the four days the City hosts the wall, and organizers are hard at work recruiting volunteers, soliciting donations, and planning for the event.

Museum holds Annie Ross history

Inside 3737 SE Adams St. at Milwaukie Museum is a research library holding countless binders of our past history. One such binder holds a story about one of Milwaukie's pioneer women, Annie Ross Roberts.

You may recognize the name. Northwest Housing Alternatives operates the Annie Ross House that has provided emergency shelter for families for more than 25 years.

The following are excerpts from a Clackamas Review article printed in either the 14th or 21st edition.

"When two young parents, Edmond and Elizabeth Ross, came across the plains from Illinois to Milwaukie in 1865, there was a housing shortage. The Ross's with their three young daughters could only find quarters in the "house-keeping rooms" at the California Hotel on Main Street. This is where Annie Ross was born on April 5th 1866.

Annie Ross grew up in Milwaukie remembering going to school on what is now City Hall grounds. Annie Ross Roberts was well known throughout the community. As the "oldest pioneer" in Milwaukie, she sat atop the Milwaukie Founder's Centennial Parade float in 1950, waving to the crowd and merchants for all she knew by first name. She recalled Milwaukie in those early days. Mrs. Annie Ross Roberts said "for many years the town led a dormant existence. People were poor and had to work hard on their land to make a living for their families. People living here were just home folks, good citizens, good neighbors, and good friends."

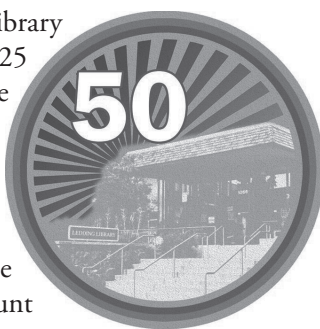

Code changes advancing

The proposed amendments of the Moving Forward Milwaukie (MFM) project that would modify the City's Framework Plan to better accommodate a wider range of Downtown development and business types that the community supports will go before the Planning Commission in a work session on Dec. 9th, in City Hall at 6:30 p.m.

Staff will incorporate comments received from the Planning Commission and the public and make the revised amendments available for public review on Dec. 12th, which is 30 days before Planning Commission's first public hearing on the amendment package on Jan. 13th. Staff anticipates at least two hearings before the Planning Commission.

The MFM Project team is continuing to refine the Central Milwaukie Land Use & Transportation Plan and is beginning to draft Comprehensive Plan and code amendments. Open Houses for Central Milwaukie will be held next year.
