Over the next six months our city will engage in a visioning process. Through this effort, all members of our community will have the opportunity to think about and plan for a future we can share and thrive in. It is important for a city to have a powerful vision in order to coalesce all of our efforts in a unified direction and to have a lens through which we view our decisions at all levels.

I believe a city's vision should consider all of its people and their needs and desires now and for the foreseeable future. To that end, my idea for a vision is to make Milwaukie the most Livable, Equitable and Sustainable City in America. I believe that this covers all aspects of what a city should be doing for its citizens. When I say Livable, Equitable and Sustainable, you may be asking "what do those things mean?" Imagine you could have a conversation with someone who lives in Milwaukie 20-30 years from now and, with your questions framed in these terms, this is how they described their community:

How is Milwaukie livable? - "It's easy and safe to walk to most necessary services, the community has a low crime rate, there is attractive, available housing stock for all price ranges, there are abundant living wage jobs, the schools are really good, sidewalks and designated bikeways are well-connected, safe and comfortable for everyone – including kids and families – and nature is integrated throughout our neighborhoods with great parks and natural spaces."

Why do you say Milwaukie is equitable? - "Our community looks out for those least able to look out for themselves, there is abundant affordable housing, services and fees are fair for low income families, discrimination of any kind is not tolerated, everyone is well represented, and there are safe, reliable and frequent travel options like mass transit that everyone can use to get to where they need to go without having to own a car if they don't want to or can't afford one."

How would you say Milwaukie is a sustainable city? - "In Milwaukie, we take pride in making the most and best use of the resources we have in our region. The community produces as much energy as it uses, we have a solar-based grid for generating most of our electric

power, community gardens are available to anyone who wants one, all of our grocery stores feature an abundance of affordable food choices which are locally-produced, water resources are clean and protected and there is an abundance of healthy vegetation and tree canopy. We are sustainable both in how we use land and in how we get around, with environmentally friendly transportation options like biking, walking and mass transit readily available and safe for everyone."

If you would like to be able to describe Milwaukie that way, please join me in establishing a powerful vision for Milwaukie.

North Industrial Area Redevelopment Plan

Metro awarded a \$250,000 grant to the city and Clackamas County to pay for a redevelopment plan and implementation strategy for the North Milwaukie Industrial Area (NMIA). NMIA is the 200-acre commercial-industrial area north of downtown that straddles both sides of McLoughlin.



The purpose of the plan is to position NMIA as a vibrant area where light industrial, manufacturing, commercial, and residential uses are developed in a compatible way. The goal of the strategy is to increase private investment and create living wage jobs. The plan will include the new Tacoma MAX Station and areas west of McLoughlin. The Chief's Corner

Happy New Year! As the year rolls over it's always a good opportunity to remind folks about our Code Red System. This system is a reverse 911 that allows us to notify you when we have an emergency in your neighborhood that requires some action. In the past we have used the program to notify people when we have had police actions involving dangerous suspects running through the blocks, hazardous materials calls and to help locate missing children. If you have a land line associated with your house or business, it is already included in these calls. However, if you are like my family and have cut the cord and gone all mobile, you need to register your cell phone with the system in order to get these calls. This is a good thing to do even if you do have a land line so that you get notifications about your neighborhood even when you're not at home. If you do not have computer access or would like some assistance getting registered, call our Police Department at 503-786-7400 and we will help.



Update on Riverfront Park

Riverfront Park will remain closed to cars and vehicles pulling boats until temporary or permanent repairs can be made to the bridge over Kellogg Creek. Recent rains and flooding events have eroded areas along the shore and have washed away fill material behind the wing wall of the bridge. The situation has made it unsafe to access the park from the south entrance. However, the park will remain open to foot traffic from the north. We recommend parking downtown and using the crosswalk at Harrison and McLoughlin to enter the park. The engineering department is in the process of gathering earth and soils data near the bridge so they can make a determination on repair options. They intend to discuss their findings with City Council on February 2. Also, because Governor Brown has declared rain and flooding in our area as a state emergency, city staff has met with Oregon's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) representatives to apply for emergency funding to pay for costs to repair the bridge and shore. 


Classes on Starting Your Own Business

The City of Milwaukie is partnering with Mercy Corps Northwest to provide a six session Business Foundations I class beginning February 25. The six three-hour sessions will take place on Thursdays from 5 to 8 p.m. The dates of each session include Feb. 25 and March 3, 10, 17, 24, and 31.

The class costs \$175, but there are scholarships available to those eligible. The first ten Milwaukie residents and/or businesses are eligible for a \$25 grant, provided by Milwaukie's Community Development Department. Partial scholarships are also available to low-income individuals with proper documentation.

Milwaukie Pastry Kitchen

Hurtis Mixon Hadley Sr. and his wife, Dorothy Butler-Bishop Hadley, purchased the Milwaukie Pastry Kitchen in 1977.

“With all the challenges we had to deal with, it felt good to walk out and see the line of people outside on opening day.”

In the early 1960’s Hurtis began his career working as a baker’s helper for Bohemian Bakery and Restaurants in Portland. African Americans were discouraged from joining the bakers union and after five years at the Bohemian, Hurtis took his skills to Albertsons. He was then accepted into the Oregon Apprenticeship Program. Hurtis became the first African American in Oregon to graduate and be state certified as a journeyman baker in 1967.

After completing his apprenticeship, Hurtis was promoted to Bakery Manager and Oregon Baker Trainer becoming the first African American to hold these positions while working for Oregon Albertsons. Despite his credentials, knowledge, and success, Hurtis was passed over for the position of Oregon District Manager of Bakeries because “the southern Oregon communities would not accept a Black man in this authority position.”

In 1977, Hurtis along with his wife Dorothy, struck out on their own and purchased Milwaukie Pastry Kitchen, located at 10607 SE Main St. The bakery became the first African American owned and operated full line bakery in Oregon. Hurtis handled the baking, producing many varieties of cakes, pastries, breads, and donuts. Dorothy ran the front counter and sales. After a successful eight year run the bakery closed. Hurtis continued as a baker and Bakery Trainer at Safeway, moving on to Franz and retired from baking while at Orowheat in 1997.

Today both of their legends live on. They are featured in the Oregon Historical Society Museum’s exhibit “Oregon Voices: Changes and Challenges in Modern Oregon History” and Milwaukie Museum’s exhibit “Made in Milwaukie.” Dorothy has published the cookbook “Honi’s Favorite Desserts and Brunches Too: Recipes to Laugh About.” Hurtis can be seen out at Eastmoreland Golf Course either playing or working as the starter.

Bicycling Safety Tips

An important bike safety tip is the use of wearing a helmet, especially one properly fitted. Oregon law requires children under the age of 16 to wear a helmet while riding a bicycle. Parents are encouraged to visit any Clackamas Fire District #1 station to receive a helmet fitting for your child along with a free bike helmet.

In addition to a helmet, it is important for riders to wear bright clothing and reflectors when riding their bicycles. State law requires bikes to be equipped with a white light and rear red reflectors or lights if you are riding at night.



When riding on roadways, bicycles are considered vehicles and must follow the same rules as motorists. Cyclists should ride with the flow of traffic, obey all traffic laws, and yield to traffic or pedestrians when necessary. It’s crucial to be alert at all times when riding your bicycle.

There was a great presentation at our meeting in Jan. from the Intertwine Alliance Oak-Prairie Work Group, a collaboration of agencies coming together to work to preserve native Oregon White Oaks. They are actively identifying new planting sites and teaching homeowners to landscape their yards with native oaks. There will be workshops to instruct for those that are interested. There is support for creating a White Oak habitat in Bowman/Brae park. This is timely, since it would be a good to get the discussion moving forward to decide on a name for our park – One suggestion was "Redtail Park" in honor of the

birds that inhabit the corridor along Kellogg Creek, or another possibility is "Heritage Oaks Park." Come to our Feb. meeting and tell us what you think!

The group continued the discussion about installing permanent, electronic speed reader signs. It was decided to approach ODOT and TriMet about helping us with the costs of these units. Traffic has risen in the Lake Road Neighborhood due to the opening of the Orange Line. We are hoping that these agencies will partner with us in working towards reducing the number of drivers exceeding the speed limits. One of the proposals is to request that ODOT monitor traffic numbers and speeds through the area and compare those numbers to studies from recent years.

There was very low attendance in Jan.; is it possible folks didn't know about the meeting because there wasn't a Pilot in Jan.? Give us some feedback on this - My hope is that attendance will improve as 2016 continues.
