Bringing *The Wall* to town

The idea to bring the Moving Wall - a half-sized replica of the Vietnam Memorial Wall - to Milwaukie was raised more than two years ago through the partnership between American Legion Post 180 and the City. Around the table were Jerry Craig from the Legion, then City Councilor Mike Miller (*pictured left*), Linda Hedges and City Manager Bill Monahan.



Now, after the addition of dozens of volunteers, months of rigorous planning and fund-raising, the Moving Wall is coming to Milwaukie High School and will be open for viewing 24-hours a day between noon on Thurs., July 23rd through 2 p.m., Sun., July 26th. On Sat., July 25th at 10 a.m. the Honoring Military Service and Sacrifice Parade will wind through Downtown and military and community organizations will pay tribute to those who served in our Armed Forces.

The hosting of The Moving Wall is part of the City and Legion's partnership to mark the 50th anniversary of the Vietnam War and both will work together to organize special events and programs to observe the 50th anniversary in 2015, 2016, and 2017.

Council adopts goals

City Council formally adopted six goals for 2015-2016 at its May 1st meeting and now City staff will dedicate staff time and resources to achieve those goals. The six goals are:

- Focus community resources on an all-inclusive bike, pedestrian, and street safety program
- Evaluate the options to expand the Ledding Library to address the present and long term
- Develop an urban renewal strategy for downtown and north industrial area
- Develop a proactive economic development strategy to support existing businesses, attract incubator and innovative business
- Under the Kellogg for Coho project, create a strategy to make improvements that would enable salmon to access Kellogg Creek to spawn
- Complete neighborhood parks and develop stronger strategy for maintenance of existing parks

The scoop on goose poop

Members from the City Council, Parks and Recreation Board, Riverfront Task Force, North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District, Audubon Society, United States Department of Agriculture, and other wildlife experts met on June 15th to discuss the goose poop situation at Riverfront Park.

Conclusion: there's no "one-size-fits-all" solution to the problem. But, everyone agreed on a plan to manage geese in a humane and nonlethal way that encourages biodiversity and ecosystem resilience. The Plan will consist of short- and -long term solutions. Examples of short-term solutions include hazing techniques like dog herding, egg depredation, and education (don't feed the geese!). Long term solutions will involve landscape and habitat modification. Creating a long-term impact on local Canada geese populations takes time and patience. It is unrealistic to think that geese will ever completely leave the area, but the population can be managed.

Adopt-a-Road in town

Congratulations to the Lewelling Neighborhood District Association for stepping up to be the first neighborhood in the City to launch an Adopt-a-Road program!

Participation in the program is simple: adopt a stretch of road for at least two years and pick up litter at least twice a year. The City provides all of the tools and materials needed and will install a sign at your adopted site to recognize your efforts of adopting the road after it is free of litter for six months. Monroe Street Greenway Concept Project

City Council discussed the proposed Concept Plan aiming to create low-volume, low-speed conditions on Monroe Street to provide a safe, quiet route for motorists, pedestrians, and bicycles between McLoughlin Blvd. and Linwood Avenues at its June 16th Work Session. Among the key topics was traffic diversion and its impacts to nearby intersections and side streets - in particular Washington Street between 37th and Home Avenues. A public meeting will be held with residents along the Washington Street route before the end of summer to further discuss the Concept Plan.

Moving Forward Milwaukie

Because of the direct impact on the form and function of future development in Downtown Milwaukie, City Council continued the hearing on the Downtown Plan and code amendments to the July 21st, City Council meeting. The main discussion item will be off-street parking requirements. The Planning Commission continued the hearing on the central Milwaukie plan and code amendments to July 14th. This is expected to be the final recommendation hearing, with Council hearings beginning in the fall. These amendments will shape how development in these areas look and function and allow a wider variety of business located in central Milwaukie.

- Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities*
- Recognize sparklers can cause injuries*
- Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully*
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap*
- Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly*
- After fireworks complete burning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket.*

With summer in full swing and the weather drawing people to enjoy the great outdoors, Island Station is seeing many more people visiting Spring Park and Elk Rock Island.

With increased use of the parks, we would like to remind folks that there is no camping or fires allowed. We ask that visitors come to the island with a new "detective perspective", looking for small treasured plants and wildlife

to admire or photograph. Come with a garbage bag in your pocket to "spy" and remove any litter or refuse left by others. And look carefully to stay on the official delineated paths, especially on the west side of the island around the vernal pools area which is the only habitat of its kind in the Portland-metro area.

The area is multi-jurisdictional, which means it may be difficult to know who to call for help. For serious problems or crimes in progress, call 911; for non-emergency problems or crimes not in progress in Spring Park, call the Milwaukie Police Department non-emergency line at 503-786-7500; For non-

emergency problems or crimes not in progress on Elk Rock Island, contact Park Rangers at 503-823-1637; for boating violations or crimes on the river, contact Clackamas County Sheriff Marine Patrol at 503-655-8211; for fires, call Clackamas Fire District at 503-742-2600. It may seem difficult to navigate all of these managing agencies, but it is very nice to know that there are so many folks involved in keeping our parks safe and enjoyable for all. Additionally, we now have a neighborhood foot patrol out and about on the island, a knowledgeable presence to provide further assistance.
