

Gamba elected Mayor

Running unopposed, Mark Gamba who has served as City Councilor since 2012, and was a Planning Commissioner for two years before that, was elected Mayor on May 19th. Mark will take the oath of office at the June 16th meeting and a reception will follow in the City Hall Conference Room after the Regularly Scheduled City Council meeting that begins at 6 p.m.

His vacated Council position will be on the November ballot, and the winner of that election will serve the remainder of that term through the end of 2016. Council will appoint an interim Councilor to serve until one is elected in November.

The Library's first lady

The namesake of Milwaukie's Ledding Library, Florence Ledding, was a pioneer on many fronts.

In 1901 she became the first woman employee at Allen and Lewis, the largest wholesale grocer in Portland, as a stenographer. She then attended University of Oregon Law School and was the second woman in the State to be admitted

to the Oregon Bar Association. She was then appointed US District Court Bankruptcy Court Referee, the first woman ever to hold that position.

She then married Herman Ledding and they purchased the Scott estate at 2105 SE Harrison St. where the library currently stands. Her and Herman's dedication to educating the youth and the written word is one of the strong holds in our city.

In 1961 Mrs. Florence Ledding donated her property, \$5,000, and her 3,200 book collection to the City of Milwaukie for the sole purpose of building a library. In fact, the deed stipulates the property shall never be used, in whole, or in part, for any other purpose.

Kickstart repair station

Greg Bartz Bowman and Matt Meneley, cofounders of Bike Milwaukie, have initiated a Kickstarter project to raise money for a public bike repair stand that would be installed outside City Hall.

At the time of print 17 backers pledged \$1,225 of the \$2,600 goal. City Council approved the placement of the stand, now the funds need to be raised to make the project a reality.

The money raised will pay for: the bike repair stand with pump, one extra set of tools, shipping, installation expenses, and a plaque that will be installed on the repair stand indicating the top donors.

The City Code Corner

On May 19th Council gave staff direction on a proposed ordinance allowing habitat piles in Milwaukie. The proposed ordinance places no limitations on the number of piles allowed on a property and allows piles of 200 cubic feet on lots 10,000 square feet or less. The draft ordinance allows habitat piles on front yards as long as the piles are not visible from a developed public right of way.

The ordinance defines a habitat pile as a pile of limbs and branches constructed for the purpose of attracting birds and wildlife and cannot include lumber or treated wood.

District accredited again


On May 7th assessors from the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) recommended that Clackamas Fire District #1 be accredited for the fourth time since 2000. The evaluation team of four fire service professionals from throughout the United States and Canada reviewed policies, procedures and documents to validate and verify that the District meets the highest industry standards in the field of fire and emergency services delivery.

Worldwide, only 207 fire agencies have received accredited agency status, with only three in Oregon. The evaluation team will now formalize their recommendations for accreditation to the CFAI Board of Commissioners in August 2015 and officially reaccredit the Fire District.

The noon-time concerts at Ledding Library's outdoor amphitheater resume on June 17th and will take place every Wednesday at noon through Aug. 5th.

Utility Bill Notification

The City has implemented a new automated phone messaging system for utility service. The system is used to notify customers of delinquent account balances prior to service disruption and should ensure more timely and complete notice, and minimize disconnection fees.

The automated message states the applicable service address, available payment options and the deadline to avoid water service disruption.
