



Council puts bond on May 2014 ballot

City Council unanimously voted to place a bond measure on the May 20th ballot, that if passed by voters, would pay off the City's light rail debt.

Refinancing the light rail obligation through a bond would eliminate the City's debt payments for its portion of the light rail project, which rise to \$365,000 per year, and preserve the general fund that pays for core services such as police protection, library services and parks planning and development.

The bonds would be payable from property taxes. If the bonds are approved, the additional tax is estimated

Help Move Milwaukie Forward

The Moving Forward Milwaukie project - a Planning Department initiative to identify policy, regulatory, and financial barriers to development in downtown and central Milwaukie - will hold an interactive public event on March 6th at 6 p.m. at Milwaukie Presbyterian, located at 2416 SE Lake Rd.

During the last several months, the project team has been refining potential development concepts for each of the project's seven opportunity sites. These refinements incorporated feedback from

Council sets goals for 2014

After three sessions, City Council unanimously adopted a set of goals for 2014 at its Feb. 18th meeting.

Council organized the 36 goals into three categories: Ongoing Goals - initiatives already underway that will continue in 2014; Tasks - actions for staff execution that are expected to be completed in a short period of time; and Aspirational Goals - involved, more general efforts, that will take time to complete.

Among the top Ongoing Goals was to find funding to prevent the loss of services, i.e. the bond measure Council voted to put on the May 2014 ballot, completing Milwaukie Riverfront Park, and completing the Kellogg for Coho project by negotiating with Wildlands to remove the Kellogg Dam and restore the area of the lake.

Among the Tasks, Council directed staff to complete the hiring process for a police chief, who can then begin putting together a comprehensive plan for light rail staffing; complete the quiet zones, and direct Code En-

Students fight hunger at Rowe

They explain that 70 percent of the students at Rowe receive free or subsidized lunches, and that they see the issue firsthand and understand how important the programs that are in place are to helping their peers learn.

Quiet Zones In Effect

In February the trains on the Union Pacific line, which runs through town along Railroad Avenue, began observing the Quiet Zone the City has worked for years to put in place.

Trains are now only sounding their horns when the conductor sees a threat to public safety. This being the case, pedestrians and bicyclists are reminded to check both ways before crossing the tracks, especially at the Harrison, Oak and 37th Avenue crossings, and to obey the crossing arms and lights.

The City is working on a communication piece to distribute at local schools that provides young residents railroad safety tips.





Museum shows boxing connection

Upstairs at 3737 SE Adams St., with other sports memorabilia of the Milwaukie Museum, is displayed a pair of EverLast boxing gloves autographed by “The Manassa Mauler,” William Harrison “Jack” Dempsey, World Heavyweight Champion from 1919-1926 and cultural icon of the 1920’s.

These gloves are a tribute to Milwaukie’s contribution to boxing history. George Moore, an African American businessman, convinced Milwaukie City leaders to organize a boxing commission and spent \$9,000 converting an old trolley barn into the 5,000 seat Milwaukie Arena. It was located where McLoughlin and Harrison now intersect.

Milwaukie Arena held 46 bouts, bringing in four world champions and Hall of Famers Tommy Gibbons, Jess Willard, and Sam Langford. But the biggest and most controversial fight was Jan. 2, 1922. World Colored Heavyweight Champion, Harry Wills fought Ben Tate, sparring partner of Jack Dempsey, for the title. As the *Enterprise Courier* reports, “Referee Tom Louttit, taking the only course open following his instructions to the battlers before the opening gong, gave Tate the decision on a foul just at the close of the first round. Wills

forced Tate against the ropes and into a clinch, but on the break he sent a left hook to Tate’s jaw and a right to his body which caused the Texas Giant (Tate) to sink to the floor, letting himself down by the aid of the ropes.”

The controversy would involve not only the Milwaukie boxing commission, but also a State advisory board, lead by Governor Olcott. The decision: a rematch on Jan. 6, 1922. The result: a draw. But on Jan. 17, 1922 Harry Wills defeated Sam Langford at the Milwaukie Arena to defend and claim Heavyweight Champion.

Fire District awarded grant

In 2013, Clackamas Fire faced many challenges that resulted in much success. We responded to our highest number of incidents, which was over 17,000 calls for service resulting in 67% being related to medical emergencies.



Due to this increase in demand and the beginning of growth returning to our communities, we applied for and received a federal grant in the amount of \$1.9 million to hire nine additional firefighter / paramedics. This grant will help us add staffing to three community fire stations.

Clackamas Fire is extremely proud to serve our community through emergency response, training, public education, public information, emergency management, fire prevention, civic engagement, volunteerism, and helping those in need. We are here “To safely protect and preserve life and property.”

Murals in Milwaukie

A survey done in 2012 and feedback provided at two public workshops have revealed strong public support for a mural program in Milwaukie.

The program currently being proposed creates two permitting path options for murals. One option would allow for smaller murals and require a permit through the Planning Department. The other option would allow for larger murals with the potential of some grant funding, once approved by an ad hoc committee and the Milwaukie Arts Committee.

In the Works Project Updates from Engineering Department

Monroe Street Waterline Replacement (Main Street to near 224)

Currently wrapping up the in-house survey and beginning design, construction is expected to begin near the beginning of May.

Monroe Street Paving (McLoughlin to Oak)

Project will begin design in March, construction is slated to follow directly behind the waterline project. The goal is to be finished by the end of August

2014 Wastewater Main Repair Program or fixing of "Op's Trouble Spots"

Has been designed and is being prepared to be bid, construction will be finished by the end of June.

17th Avenue Multiuse Path (Grant)

Currently awaiting a contract to be signed between the design consultant and ODOT. Once signed, staff will be coordinating a kick-off meeting with key members of the biking and walking community for an on-site ride-along. Construction is expected to begin in 2015.

Each Neighborhood Association has a Land Use Chair monitoring applications the City receives. To help track the process, these are upcoming Land Use/Development Review hearings, and Planning


On the week of Feb. 24th, workers will be removing the trees along the north side of SE Johnson Creek Blvd. at SE

Mailwell crossing quiet zone will go in effect after the Portland-Milwaukie light rail alone goes into service in the fall of 2015.

Nearly all Milwaukie residents so far oppose over 3 stories, large subsidies, tax abatements, and grants for large corporations. Some good alternatives to this plan are surfacing. Our City Councilors are interested in our opinions.
