



City hosting forum on May bond measure

To provide information about Bond Measure 3-439, the measure that would refinance the City's light rail construction debt and save tax-payer dollars and preserve core services, a forum will be held May 13th from 6 to 8 p.m. at St. John Episcopal Church, located at 2036 SE Jefferson Street.

The bond measure is on the ballot for the May 20, 2014 election.

Interested residents can review information about the bond and City staff and Councilors will be on

hand to answer questions and discuss the City's fiscal future.

Refinancing the light rail obligation through a bond would eliminate the City's debt payments for its portion of the light rail project, which rise to \$365,000 per year, and preserve the general fund that pays for core services such as police protection, library services and parks planning and development.

Filmmaker and Milwaukie resident Gregory Baartz-Bowman (*below*) is bringing the "best and brightest" short films from around the world to town for the finale of the *UpRiver/Down-town: The Milwaukie Festival of Short Film* series on Sat., May 10th, at the Masonic Lodge, located at 10636 SE Main St.

"These filmmakers have either 'Made It', or are 'Making It,'" Greg said of the selected works. Admission is free, and a family-friendly showing is at 7 p.m., and one geared for adults is at 9 p.m. This is the series' second season, and this year's previous four film nights have all been well-attended, drawing hundreds of people.

"There's something going on," Greg said. "This film series is being embraced. You can count on 150 people to come Downtown on a Saturday night to watch film."

Besides creating a vibrant community event, Greg also relishes the fact that the series brings movies back to the Masonic Lodge, which was built especially to show films back in 1927. Greg explains Masons built the lodge to house a theater as a way to bring in revenue, and was designed by the same architect who designed the iconic Bagdad Theater in Portland.

The film festival is sponsored by Straw Bale Films, The Clackamas County Cultural and Tourism Agency, Celebrate Milwaukie Inc., and the Masonic Lodge. Greg says that if he can continue to secure grants and small donations like he has for the first two seasons, the third series will open this January.

"The idea is to bring people out in the winter," Greg said. "I think the film series brings something to town."

As spring arrives its time to start thinking about fun activities in Downtown Milwaukie set for this spring and summer.

In the Works | Project Updates from Engineering Department

Milwaukie Riverfront Park

Phase II construction, which includes a new boat ramp, river-side path and site regrading, begins in June. The boat ramp and park will be closed during construction, expected to extend through 2014.

Monroe Street Waterline Replacement

1,400 feet of old cast iron pipe susceptible to cracking and leaking will be replaced with new ductile iron pipe that is stronger and more long-lasting. Water main will be replaced between Main Street and 28th Avenue. Construction June through August.

Monroe Street Reconstruction

After the waterline work Monroe will be reconstructed from McLoughlin Boulevard to Oak Street. Construction in August and September.

17th Avenue Multiuse Path

ODOT has approved proceeding and staff will be coordinating a kick-off meeting with key members of the biking and walking community.

REFINANCING MILWAUKIE'S LIGHT RAIL CONSTRUCTION DEBT

FACT SHEET: *Bond Measure 3-439*



MILWAUKIE CITY COUNCIL IS LOOKING FOR WAYS TO RETAIN CORE CITY SERVICES AND SAVE MONEY.

In May, voters will be asked to consider a \$4 million general obligation bond to refinance the City's debt obligation for light rail construction. By refinancing the City's debt, the City has an opportunity to lock-in a lower interest rate, saving taxpayer money.

FOR VOTER CONSIDERATION

These savings are possible only through the sale of general obligation bonds.

The sale of general obligation bonds would eliminate the City's debt payments, rising to \$365,000 per year, and preserve the general fund that pays for core services such as police protection, library services and parks development.

The bonds would be payable from property taxes. If the bonds are approved, the additional tax is \$.18 per \$1,000 of assessed value, and is estimated to cost \$36 per year for a Milwaukie home with a taxable value of \$200,000.

MILWAUKIE'S LIGHT RAIL INVESTMENT

The City's \$5 million contribution to light rail is paying a dividend of \$13 million in local improvements, including:

- ◆ Rebuilding intersections to add lighting, curbs and safer pedestrian crossings
- ◆ Reconstructing and widening sidewalks
- ◆ Moving utility lines underground in the downtown
- ◆ Restoring wildlife habitat along Crystal Creek and Johnson Creek



General obligation bonds will allow Milwaukie to refinance debt, save money and retain core services.



Milwaukie's light rail investment supports rebuilding intersections, adding lighting, curbs and safer crosswalks.

Museum curators get rolling

When you visit the Milwaukie Museum at 3737 SE Adams St., on Saturdays and Sundays from 1 to 5 p.m., you may see an individual with a laptop gazing at the collection. It will likely be a team member from Alder, LLC, the newly-hired curator of our Museum. This was made possible by a generous grant by the City and citizens of Milwaukie.

Let's meet the team ... Morgen Young is a consulting historian whose work centers primarily on the development and execution of museum collections. Maija Anderson has ten years of experience in the management of archives, artifacts, and library collections. She is currently the Head of Historical Collections and Archives at OHSU and has worked on projects with the University of Chicago Library and Hyde Park Historical Society. Val Ballestrem, a Milwaukie resident, is a public historian with particular expertise in the history of Oregon. He currently holds the position of Education Manager for the Architectural Heritage Center and has previously worked on projects with Oregon Historical Society and the Oregon Military Museum.

Although the curator funding was only given as a one-time, one-year grant by the City of Milwaukie, Alder, LLC has proposed a five-year strategic plan to enhance the Museum. Alder, LLC's plan addresses topics such as: policy development, continued maintenance of the museum collections and research library, development of an interpretation plan, recommendations for future education programming, volunteer coordination, and fundraising strategies.

The City Code Corner

Here are some tips for you if you're thinking about building a fence this spring or summer:

Property Lines - The City doesn't get involved in property line disputes between neighbors, but the fence does need to be installed on private property and not in the public right-of-way.

Height Limits - From the front of the house forward, the maximum height a fence can be is 42 inches. In the back, the height limit is 6 feet.

Types - Fences can be made with different materials, but cannot include barbed or razor wire in residential areas.

People run in to the local coffee shop or grocery store, only planning on being gone for a few minutes, leaving their bags, brief cases, purses or i-thing (insert phone, pad, pod) sitting on the seat in plain view. The problem is it only takes about 10 seconds for a thief to break a window and grab the goods. And sometimes we make it even easier and forget to lock the door.

Unfortunately, these crimes are difficult to investigate. Oftentimes the only leads we have is video surveillance of the suspect when they're using your credit card to make purchases at area stores. So remember, don't leave valuables in plain sight. Lock them in your trunk, stick them under a seat, and remember to lock those cars.

Updates on projects from the Community Development Department

Moving Forward Milwaukie

The Moving Forward Milwaukie Advisory Committee, comprised of a member of City Council, the Planning Commission, the Design and Landmarks Committee, the South Downtown Committee, property and business owners from the three project areas, and representatives from the Neighborhood Associations met on April 21st for the fifth time to continue the development of a draft action plan to remove policy, regulatory, and financial barriers to future development in Milwaukie.

The results of the meeting are available on the Planning page of the City's website. Next the project team will discuss potential actions with Council at its May 20th Work Session.

Monroe Street Greenway Concept Project

Neighborhood greenways are well-connected, low-volume streets with traffic-calming treatments that promote safe and comfortable travel for bicyclists and pedestrians while still accommodating motor vehicles.

A citizen engagement process developing a greenway concept or concepts for Monroe Street will begin in June 2014 with the aim of delivering a recommendation to ODOT by June 2015.

Neighborhood greenway treatments increase non-vehicular options, increase access to transit and amenities, and incorporate stormwater treatment measures. Monroe has different characteristics throughout town. This project will consider those differences and suggest designs specific to each segment.

Our Neighborhood has filed an appeal to the City Council (May 20, 7 p.m.) from the Planning Commission approval of the application by Northwest Housing Alternatives for building 3-story multifamily residential units and a 5,000 sq.ft. office building four blocks into our single-family Neighborhood.

This is the first of many such projects that will be asking for preferential treatment. Proponents claim we oppose housing for the poor. As long-time contributors to NWAHA, we oppose this application on legal grounds, a.k.a. the mess the City finds itself in with its multiple planning documents which conflict and have density designations all over the scale, inadequate parking requirements, and putting a big office building where

it should not be. The project will add only three shelter units and 22 affordable housing units and take out nine single family homes. Other projects will be asking for big zoning and planning changes plus our financial backing.

Just as lobbyists in Salem are not permitted to vote on legislative bills, we don't believe developers, vested interests and non-residents should be able to have an equal vote in deciding on 5-story residential buildings in Downtown Milwaukie. These are gravy trains for investors and are heavily subsidized with our City, state and federal tax money, only they will not pay property taxes for 10 years. This is the "Forward" project.

We are concerned that they also have benefit of the City ready to re-write the zoning/planning ordinances to suit the investors (who also sit on the Project Advisory Committee!)

We are seeking canvassers to help with a credible survey to determine how our Neighborhood feels about this. Please call or email me (back page). Give an hour for democracy? It's a great investment!
