## The Pilot returns

In June 2013 *The Milwaukie Pilot*, the City's newsletter, will return to residents' mailboxes as an eight-page, monthly publication. The Co-Pilot edition, which was inserted into utility bills and encouraged readers to view on-line editions like this one, will no longer be printed.

City Council decided to restore the mailed newsletter in hopes of informing a broader segment of Milwaukie's population of community events and issues. The new version is a lower costing version than what was previous in place, and features two more pages of content.

**WHAT'S ACCEPTED:** Load in this order for easy unloading - Appliances, scrap metal, tires (10 max.), yard debris (less than 6 ft. long & 4 in. across) and bulky discards such as old wood, furniture, mattresses, lawnmowers without gas or oil, BBQs-no propane tanks, carpet, plumbing fixtures, windows, etc.

**WHAT'S NOT ACCEPTED:** Hazardous materials, electronics, paint, household garbage, liquids, animal waste, propane tanks, batteries, drums, dirt, sod, stumps, rock, concrete, industrial or commercial waste. Some items may not be appropriate and will be refused.

## Earth Day party a success

About 90 volunteers from 11 partner organizations collected more than 800 pounds of garbage, 360 pounds of weeds and cleared 2,100 yards of invasive plants from downtown Milwaukie streets and natural areas as part of the City's first annual Earth Day Celebration event on April 20<sup>th</sup>.

From seniors to toddlers, volunteers brought the shared goal of making Milwaukie greener and cleaner.

Willamette View, a continuing care retirement community, brought two buses full of residents from their "Green Team" and Cub Scout Pack 181 joined with parents and siblings. Starbuck's not only donated coffee but brought an energetic group of employees and the Milwaukie Rotary Club members fulfilled their mission of 'service above self' and brought in more than 400 pounds of garbage.

The City decided to celebrate Earth Day in an effort to increase volunteerism and promote sustainability. Mayor Ferguson declared April 22, 2013 as Earth Day in Milwaukie stating that "...the citizens of the City of Milwaukie are committed not only to the protection and preservation of the environment, but also to the restoration of ecosystems and habitat."

Four projects underway look to create a sustainable future for Milwaukie.

As a City, the work we do at any moment will have its greatest effect in the future. The City we live in today is the result of decisions made 10, 20 or even 160 years ago. We must always keep that in mind as we begin new projects and try to imagine

the needs not only of our neighbors 5 years from now but of their grand children 50 years from now.

The removal of Kellogg dam and the restoration of Kellogg Creek will begin the process of repairing the damage done to local salmon runs which is a small part of protecting this important food source for the future citizens of Milwaukie. What it will do for the current residents is to create a beautiful free flowing stream through our South Downtown, replacing the blackberry choked, mud puddle that Kellogg lake has become.

Our contract negotiation with Wildlands is nearing completion, and with that first step we will start the process that will fulfill the dreams of many residents for the last 20 years.

The Transportation System plan update creates an opportunity to tweak the plan that was the result of hard work by dozens of our fellow citizens and at the same time draw attention to the goals laid out in that plan that have gone unnoticed for the past several years. It is an excellent opportunity for the community to come forward and ask the Council to get on with the important infrastructure improvements that will facilitate sustainable forms of transportation and create more livable, walkable, bikable safe routes for families in our neighborhoods.

Both the Downtown Refresh and the Neighborhood Main Streets projects provide an opportunity to re-zone and re-code for a more livable future. Allowing and encouraging development that will improve the number and types of services available at a walking distance. The concept of a 20 minute Neighborhood is that someone should be able to walk to fulfill most of their daily needs within a 20 minute round trip.

If these concepts are important to you, your voices need to be heard at every opportunity.


## Market opens season

The Milwaukie Sunday Farmers Market will celebrate its 15<sup>th</sup> season when it opens Sun., May 12<sup>th</sup>.


This year several new vendors will join many long-time vendors, so come on down and buy Mom a bunch of flowers on Mothers' Day/Opening Day.

ALIGN planning, a group of Urban Planning graduate students from PSU, is heading up the community engagement process in partnership with the City of Milwaukie.



## BE PREPARED

# It was 'pure gold' that created Milwaukie

In 1847 Lot Whitcomb came to Oregon from Illinois for two reasons: his wife needed a healthier climate and he read the book *Wagon Train* by Joseph Palmer which describes the beauties of the Willamette Valley.

Whitcomb knew his next occupation after building a canal in Chicago was to build and own a sawmill out West. After leading 147 wagons west, Whitcomb found Andrew Fellows' abandoned cabin where present day Jefferson St. and McLoughlin Boulevard meet. Lot Whitcomb understood Johnson Creek would power his sawmill and his prosperity. Early-on profits were scarce.

Then word hit: "There's gold in dem dare hills!"

Yes, the California Gold Rush was on and many men left the frontier to go make it rich.

Lot Whitcomb was tempted, but knew lumber would be his "gold fortune." Who supplied the lumber for buildings, mining operations, and gold transport? Lot Whitcomb.

His sawmill boomed. Whitcomb's mill was producing 6,000 feet a day in two 12-hour-shifts. In fact, Whitcomb was selling so much lumber to the San Francisco Bay Area he commissioned a boat builder, Joseph Kellogg, to create vessels for his operation. Whitcomb was so successful that he was the sole agent for lumber brokering in the region. Milwaukie's Bay supported 4 sawmills, a boat builder, and a grist mill. Milwaukie was on the map and booming.

- 1 Barking dog can be a nuisance.**
- 2 RV's on a lot less than an acre is prohibited.**
- 3 Feet is the required setback for an accessory structure (in most cases).**
- 4 Or more dogs on a property is not allowed (considered a kennel).**
- 5 Feet is the required minimum sidewalk width for new development (in most cases).**
- 6 Feet is the tallest fence you can build, and only in the backyard.**

## The Chief's Corner

May is National Bike Month and a good time to be aware of the more vulnerable users of our roadways.

The better weather and the longer daylight hours are a natural draw for our children to head out on their bikes. Motorists are reminded that kids on bikes may not be as safe or as aware of traffic safety as older cyclists.

When driving around cyclists, drivers should: 1) check the bike lane for bikes, 2) always signal when turning to alert others, 3) pass cyclists with plenty of room to spare, 4) don't honk at cyclists or follow too closely, 5) allow cyclists to use crosswalks (it's the law), 6) look when opening your driver's door, 7) use caution in residential areas as many cyclists prefer these lesser-used routes.
