Council talks goals for 2014

A focus of City Council's goal setting session of Jan. 23rd centered on carrying over the top goal of 2013: securing funding to prevent further loss of services.

Council is seeking further reductions in spending and finding alternate revenue streams, including a bond measure.

Passing a bond in May would eliminate the City's debt payments for its portion of the light rail project and preserve the general fund that pays for core services such as police protection and library services.

Council also highlighted completing Milwaukie Riverfront Park, completing a contract with Wildlands to perform the Kellogg for Coho project that would return Kellogg Lake to its natural state, and restoring police staffing, including the naming of a permanent Police Chief.

Needing more time to prioritize these and other goals, Council scheduled a second session for Feb. 29th. The Pilot went to print before that meeting was convened. Details will be posted on the City's website.

Margolin is expected to deliver a big crowd. A retired attorney who has written more than a dozen books, all best-sellers, Margolin will talk about his craft and answer questions from the crowd.

Bond topic taken up at Neighborhoods

City representatives will visit the Neighborhood District Associations (NDA's) in February to discuss the bond proposal City Council listed among its top priorities in 2014.

Council is considering placing a bond on the May ballot that would eliminate the City's debt payments for its portion of the light rail project, which rise to \$365,000 per year, and preserve the general fund that pays for core services such as police protection and library services. The bonds would be payable from property taxes. If the bonds are approved, the additional tax is estimated to cost \$36 per year for a

Rails and Riverfront Park -Signs of progress in Milwaukie

As we move into the new year, I am reminded of how quickly time passes. So much has happened in Milwaukie.

The Light Rail crossings are complete at Harrison, Monroe, Washington and 21st Avenue. The fly-over bridge at highway 99 has the structure in place and decking

is underway. Retaining walls are being finalized and many of the street lights are in place. Still it will be more than 18 months until the system is complete and ready for passengers.

Along the other Milwaukie rail corridor there has been construction activity as well. The crossings of Harrison, Oak street and 37th Avenue have all been modified to qualify for the Federal Rail Authority "Quiet Zone" designation. Small islands or medians have been installed to prevent accidental passage around the crossing gates. It is great to know that all this work is complete ... but one would never know the Quiet Zone is approved and in place ... if you listened to the continued horns blasting long into the night. Maybe someone forgot to tell the train engineers? Or is it that Federal approvals might take longer to be issued than it will for polar ice caps to melt. I think it might be the later.

On a good note, the plans and funding for our Riverfront Park are getting closer to execution. Plans for old piling removals (as well as some trees) are moving quickly. Before long the arrival of construction equipment will take place. Come on down ... ride your bike if you will ... strap it to the whimsical ironwork in the shape of a small trolley car with a very large bird cage bell ... and walk around to see the activity. Soon our Riverfront Park will begin to take shape.


Again, so much has happened this past year. Thanks to all of our Milwaukie tax-payers for their contribution to the effort.

We can all hardly wait to enjoy a picnic in our new park while listening to our newly completed Quiet Zones ... hopefully sooner than later.

New boat ramp to be built this summer

The transformation of Milwaukie Riverfront Park continues this spring and summer as a new boat ramp, restroom and parking facilities are constructed, thanks to grants from the Oregon Marine Board and the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department.

The new boat ramp and boarding float will be constructed south of the present-day ramp, which will be closed this summer during construction. Additional work includes, a new vehicle access point to the park, a riverside trail along the bank of the Willamette River, regrading the site and replanting many riparian areas. Crews will be in the Park in May preparing the site for the heavy construction that will start in June. All of the work is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Updates on projects from the Community Development Department

Moving Forward Milwaukie: Enhancing our Commercial Districts Project

In January, the Moving Forward Milwaukie project team discussed potential development concepts for each of the seven opportunity sites with Council, and evaluated the financial feasibility of each concept.

Development types include residential, office, retail and mixed use projects. Next steps are refining the concepts for presentation to Council on February 18, and discussing potential financial tools with Council on February 20. Project information is available at www. Monroe Street Neighborhood Greenway Concept Plan

This spring the Planning Department will engage citizens, especially those who live near and use Monroe Street, to develop a concept plan that makes it a better and safer route for autos, walkers and bikers. Concept goals will be to:

- Improve roadway conditions for bicycles and pedestrians
- Increase non-vehicular options for residents to access transit and Neighborhood and Downtown amenities
- Calm traffic
- Increase recreation opportunities for all levels of cyclists and pedestrians

Monroe Street has different characteristics at different points throughout town. This project will consider those differences and suggest designs that are specific to the nature of each particular segment.

Quiet Zone to take full effect in February

After years of capital projects to install additional safety measures at railroad crossings and negotiations with a about a dozen different partners and regulatory agencies, trains on the Union Pacific (UP) will only sound their horns in emergency situations when passing through town beginning Feb. 5th. That's the official date when the Federal Railroad Agency ...

With the Quiet Zone enacted on the UP line, which runs through Milwaukie along Railroad Avenue, attention turns to the trains on the Tillamook Branch, which passes through the Downtown and the Island Station Neighborhood. The Portland - Milwaukie Light Rail Project is constructing the improvements at the Tillamook Branch crossings, and that Quiet Zone is expected to be in place in 2015.

Pilots? Where are the planes?

If Milwaukians are Pilots, where are all the planes? We are not named for civilian airplane pilots; but for navigators of the great Willamette and the Columbia, guiding maritime ships into our Milwaukie Bay. The ships were steam powered side and stern wheeler vessels.

Lot Whitcomb created the ship empire in Milwaukie beginning in 1847 inviting Joseph Kellogg to build his maritime dream. By 1850 the side wheeler

"Lot Whitcomb" was born with the hull made in Milwaukie Bay and the mechanical parts from New Orleans.

The launching and activities of "Lot Whitcomb" stimulated the growth of Milwaukie, the construction of other vessels, and a solid distribution of goods in Milwaukie.

Business was booming with imports entering through the Bay and exports leaving through the Bay.

Milwaukie was producing lumber and flour that were shipped as far as San Francisco and Sacramento. But alas, by the mid to late 1850's the Milwaukie shipping industry was fleeting. Portland and Oregon City became more dominate in the political landscape and the shipping investments weren't paying very good dividends. By 1875 Milwaukie Bay was no longer considered a port or barely even a stopping point.

Just because Milwaukie Bay is no longer a Port of Delivery does not mean Milwaukians have lost our river navigation and our love for the Bay. The second phase of Riverfront Park will begin construction this spring and Milwaukians celebrate at the Bay to watch the Christmas Fleet and and fireworks, just like when they launched the "Lot Whitcomb."



Citzen advisory group, residents review CIP

After the Open House of Jan. 22nd that gave citizens the opportunity to review the City's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), the Citizen Utility Advisory Board (CUAB) will review the draft document at its Feb. 5th meeting.

The CIP prescribes which major infrastructure projects will be funded and constructed in the coming years. Road maintenance and improvement projects, stormwater, wastewater and water improvement projects are all accounted for in the CIP, and the CUAB will weigh-in on the proposed projects for 2013-2014.

Major projects include the City's Wasterwater Clay Pipe Replacement Program, paving for the Street Surface maintenance Program, and the 17th Avenue Multiuse Trail.

After the CUAB review, the CIP is incorporated into the draft 2013-2014 Budget, which undergoes its own public review process.

Finance publishes reports

The City's Finance Department has published the Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) - a document designed to provide a comprehensive overview of the City's financial situation, its financial policies and goals, and explanation of how citizen's tax dollars are being spent, in an easy to understand format.

The City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) has also been published, and includes the much more extensive audit opinion issued by an independent firm in December 2013.

Do you want to grow your own produce but don't have enough space with enough sun? In the Linwood Neighborhood, we are fortunate to have a great working community interested in encouraging you to get your hands dirty and eat healthier.

Milwaukie Open Ground Community Garden at 11611 SE Linwood (pictured right) is now in its fourth year, and they are currently accepting applications for the 2014 growing season, no experience necessary. You don't even have to live in the Linwood Neighborhood to apply.

Milwaukie Open Ground has (30) 4'x 12' raised beds. If you're interested in participating in this year's garden season, a fee of \$35 will cover your water in the garden for the year. Last year they built a shed for tools and other garden supplies to be stored on-site. All plots are organic and as a community last year they were able to grow and donate 500 pounds of produce to local charities in our area. They have some communal beds managed by multiple families, which allows them to grow vegetables that requires more space like corn, squash, melons and cucumbers. They also have a bed filled with herbs that are available to all gardeners. Beds will be assigned to new gardeners in March so get your applications in soon. At our Jan meeting Northwest Housing Alternatives presented their up-zoning application which would remove 3 homes and 9 duplexes to be replaced by 33 low income, 8 homeless shelters, corporate offices and 45 parking spaces on their property at SE Lake and Willard Streets.

We are concerned about not only this project but our entire neighborhood which has been pushed by Metro and developers into very high density with lack of adequate services to support it, all claiming planning support for livability. This isolated location is not walkable to the elderly and handicapped. We have seen no discussions to determine the impacts and capacity of the neighborhood to be all high density. Planners ignored that we are already 5 multifamily units to each remaining home and in being so, have met the Metro density standard. We are greatly concerned that the city has held closed door "Forward" meetings with developers where free land and urban renewal money is supported, while our neighborhood rep to that project was denied participation.

We have a strong sense that there is something very wrong in the planning process which is so lop sided in priorities.
