Leading the charge

For years the Lewelling Neighborhood has spearheaded the effort to create an Adopt-A-Road program in the city, and the efforts were realized on Oct. 17th when 20 Lewelling residents joined forces to pick up trash around Ball-Michel Park, Logus Road and Stanley Avenue.

Neighborhood Chair Bryan Trotter says the motivation was to create a volunteer opportunity residents could easily plug into.

"The Adopt-A-Road program is a great way to meet your neighbors, show some community pride, and teach our kids about volunteerism," Bryan said.

Now, with a formal program in place, six other groups have adopted roads throughout Milwaukie, and the hope is that families, civic



groups, businesses, and faith-based organizations will join the effort and expand the number of streets that are regularly tidied up.

The city provides the bags, pickup tools, vests, safety signs and collects the trash. The volunteers commit to adopting a road for two years and pick up litter at least twice a year. Leaves MUST be bagged in paper or plastic bags to be accepted at this location. Loose leaves will NOT be accepted at City Hall lot.



I would not have imagined a year ago that I would have the opportunity to meet and be part of such a wide variety of teams with so many caring residents. People who live and work in Milwaukie are involved in so many aspects of the community I'm not sure anyone knows the real number of volunteer hours. Or,

the real amount of citizen input.

That's why I'm confused when someone says (especially at a public meeting where citizens provide input), "Well, 'they' will just do what 'they' want anyhow."

I don't know who the "they" is supposed to be. Almost all decisions, changes, additions, celebrations, codes, whatever, are discussed by citizens in a variety of ways before the item gets to decision makers to set policy. So anyone can really be part of "they."

That's one of the things that makes Milwaukie great; the voices of the people.

But, there's one area where more voices would be appreciated, listened to, welcomed and is easy to accomplish; Neighborhood District Associations, or NDA's as we commonly know them.

Each of our NDA's meet routinely, and the info about meetings is in the *Pilot* and on the website. Their function is as a land use overseer, and also as a community builder, providing ways for citizens to meet together for projects, celebrations, concerts, community gardens, discussions, meals, meetings, and even street art.

Anyone in the city can attend their NDA meeting and find a way to get as involved as you like, or just go to the meetings and offer ideas and listen. If you aren't sure which group you're a part of there are NDA maps on the website, or you could call the city (503-786-7568) and ask.

Think of our city as a fine tapestry, and each of you as a crafts person who adds their personal touch to the artistry of the tapestry.

School district seeks input

North Clackamas Schools is seeking input from community members about proposed bond projects for the November 2016 General Election. The proposal will include projects for school repairs, safety and enrollment growth.

The forums will include a discussion on the future of Milwaukie High School's original 1925 building and how to best respond to several issues, including small classrooms with obstructed views, narrow and poorly-lit hallways, and structural issues in case of earthquake. A key question: can the facility be remodeled or should it be replaced?

Council raises min. wage

As a signal of its commitment to support living-wage jobs for all of its workers, Milwaukie City Council unanimously passed a resolution establishing all employees – seasonal employees, interns, independent contractors and full-time employees, will earn at least \$15 an hour, at its Oct. 20th meeting in City Hall.

"Council passed this resolution for a number of reasons," Mayor Mark Gamba explained. "First, to correct the misconception that some of our full-time positions were earning less than \$15 per hour. Another was to send the message that we as a Council do not believe the current minimum wage is a living wage and the state needs to increase it dramatically. And, finally, and most importantly, to thoroughly evaluate what we were paying all of our positions. In doing that, we found that we were paying our seasonal employees \$13.85, and from now on they'll earn \$15, and so will any interns that work for us."

As result of passing the resolution, in addition to raising the wages of seasonal workers, the city's Human Resources and Finance Departments will formally set pay scales assuring future full-time, part-time, intern, seasonal, and independent contractors will be paid at least \$15 per hour.

Moving Forward nearing the finish line

The Moving Forward Milwaukie Project – an initiative that began in 2013 to stimulate development in the downtown area, key commercial areas in central Milwaukie, and a pair of “Neighborhood Main Streets” that serve surrounding neighborhoods – is nearing completion.

Downtown zoning and code changes took effect Oct. 31, 2015, and the amendment packages for the Central Milwaukie and Neighborhood Main Streets are expected to be finalized by City Council this month.

The changes revising the use, development, design standards, and design review procedures for development in Central Milwaukie go before Council on Nov. 3rd, and changes revising standards for the “Neighborhood Main Streets” of 32nd and 42nd Avenues go before Council on Nov. 17th. The revisions are intended to encourage attractive, functional commercial areas in central Milwaukie and pedestrian-oriented, neighborhood-serving business districts around segments of 32nd and 42nd Ave.

“It’s been a long process that’s incorporated a lot of public input,” said Senior Planner Li Alligood. “With these packages in place, Milwaukie is better positioned to accommodate the new residents and businesses that are being drawn to Milwaukie because of its special character.”

The City Code Corner

We are getting to the point in the year where the fall colors start to appear and all the leaves begin to fall. Here are some codes that relate to the falling leaves.

Stagnant Water- If you allow your gutters to fill up with leaves and not clean them out, it can create a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

Illegal Dumping - The leaves that fall on your property are yours. You cannot blow, rake or in any way coax them into the street or to a neighbor's property, even if the leaves came from a tree outside your property. Instead take them to our free leaf drop (*see page 1 article*).

Losing a link to our past

On Sept. 15th Milwaukie lost one of the greatest orators of Milwaukie history. Clair Kuppenbender lived in Milwaukie for over 50 years of his life and provided wonderful insight on growing up in Milwaukie in the 1940's and 1950's.



He remembered going to Crystal Lake Park and saying admission was the same price as the street car. Clair would love to tell the story of rocking the street cars as kids so the roofs would rub the roofs of oncoming cars and of bouncing on the back of the street cars to lift the fronts off the tracks.

Clair's other favorite story was about "having fun with the police". At the time, Milwaukie had one officer, and one vehicle. One night he and a friend observed the officer "resting his eyes" while on patrol. They handcuffed the officer to the steering wheel and took the key. Being the only officer with the only vehicle, there was no one to call for help, leaving him at the mercy of Clair and his friend.

Clair Kuppenbender was an integral part of the Milwaukie Historical Society and Milwaukie Museum. His stories shed light for the younger generations to understand how Milwaukie was in those times.

This Thanksgiving while your family is around take the time to learn about your family history or what the older generation did for fun or trouble. Before long, just like Milwaukie Historical Society learned, there may not be a second chance to hear the oral stories.

Visit the Milwaukie Museum on Saturdays from 1 to 5 p.m. to learn more about Milwaukie.

Public hearing for Monroe Greenway set

For the past year, the city staff has been working with community members to develop the Monroe Street Neighborhood Greenway Concept Plan to identify the types of improvements that will make Monroe Street a safer route for bicycles and pedestrians.

A draft of the Concept Plan has been sent to the Council, and it wants to hear from the public before making a decision to adopt it. City Council will hold a public hearing on Nov. 3rd, at City Hall at 6 p.m. to provide residents



an opportunity to share their comments, suggestions, and questions about the draft Concept Plan.

Neighborhood greenways are routes where bicycles share the travel lane with auto vehicles, with sidewalks or hard-surface paths for pedestrians, safer intersections for all users, and facilities such as bioswales for stormwater management.

This year, Clackamas Fire District #1 (CFD#1) recognized Fire Prevention Month with a theme of "Hear the Beep Where you Sleep!" We visited elementary schools giving presentations and hosted six station open houses to instruct fire and life safety tips.

In 2015, the U.S. Fire Administration reported 1,760 civilian home fire fatalities. Of these deaths, 20 have occurred in Oregon and two in CFD#1's service area. To prevent fire fatalities, install working smoke alarms in every bedroom of your home.

Every year since 1974, CFD#1 partners with our communities in an Operation Santa Claus program to collect non-perishable food and new unwrapped toys. We will participate in 15 neighborhood parades across our communities beginning in late November.

Council to consider parking permit increase

City Council is considering proposed changes to the Downtown Milwaukie Parking Permit program starting Jan. 1, 2016.

Changes being considered include: increasing fees, limiting advanced sales, removing bulk purchase discounts, offering only monthly and quarterly passes and eliminating semi-annual passes.

Council will discuss these proposed changes during its Work Session on Nov. 3rd at 5 p.m., and during its Regular Session on Nov. 17th, that begins at 6 p.m. at City Hall.



The wonderful maple tree near the Annie Ross house is changing colors, reminding us that our neighborhood is changing too.

The orange line which turns into the yellow line has made it convenient to travel into downtown Portland, but it has left a few feeling blue.

Residents near the Park Avenue station to our south have gained media attention because of their experience with park and riders blocking driveways, mailboxes and fire hydrants. Kudos to Milwaukie for revamping the parking

permit process so we have an option to park our cars on the street, while excluding the park and hiders. The process can be initiated by either the City Manager or by residents. If this becomes a problem in Milwaukie, you will have our support in finding a solution.

Recently I have been seeing red when traveling back from downtown Milwaukie, by spending six or more minutes waiting at a rail crossing while nothing happens. The city is aware of the problem, but a solution may take a while. As a result folks are finding new routes, increasing traffic on local streets.

Our NDA is developing a comprehensive record of all concerns reported by pedestrians, bicyclists, and automobile drivers. Whether a trash can is needed or a crosswalk would make it

safer for kids walking to school, your ideas and possible solutions are welcome and needed.

Orange is not only the new black, but for at least for one it is the new green. A gentleman has been knocking on doors asking for money and mentioning that Portland residents are cheap so he took the MAX to Milwaukie to do his pan handling.

I would encourage everyone to report incidents such as this to the police department, so they know what is happening.

For those of you that are fans of maroon, changes to Milwaukie High are being considered by the North Clackamas School District. A survey about the options to make it safer can be taken at its website.

Street resurfacing of Railroad Avenue is nearing completion. A few extra inches of roadside paving have brought out more walkers, bicyclists, moms with baby strollers and people in wheelchairs. The school district has located school bus stops in two

locations on Railroad Avenue.

While it's wonderful to have a smooth road after years of potholes and bumps, some drivers are using the improved road and shoulder as an opportunity to drive at or even above the posted 35 mph speed limit.

Much of the traffic on Railroad Avenue doesn't begin or end in Milwaukie. Railroad Avenue is a handy cut-through from east Clackamas County to downtown Portland. Our neighborhood and Linwood bear the

brunt of this traffic. We can do little to educate the drivers who don't live in our neighborhoods.

But those of us who live here can be a role model for others by always observing the speed limit and actually avoiding walking or riding a bike on Railroad Avenue.

Because after all, it is still a dangerous road with very little space on the shoulder. Please don't encourage anyone to use it except by vehicle. And enjoy the smooth ride.

After 19 months, the traffic signal at SE Johnson Creek Boulevard and SE 32nd Avenue in Portland was finally activated on Oct. 14th. This signal was part of the Portland-Milwaukie Light Rail project and mandated by Oregon Department of Transportation for traffic mitigation at SE Tacoma St./Johnson Creek MAX station near McLoughlin Boulevard.

Monroe Street Greenway and Moving Forward Milwaukie (MFM) are ongoing topics for Ardenwald. MFM pertains to the McFarland and Murphy sites, and commercial businesses zoning changes along SE 32nd Avenue. In addition, SE Harvey Street sidewalks and the access stairs to the Tacoma Street MAX station from the Springwater Trail next to pedestrian bridge are still on the radar.

The Friends of Tideman Johnson Park work party will meet Sat., Dec. 5th, 9 a.m. to noon at Tideman Johnson Park, then take a break in January.
