Light Rail bridge ok'd

The Design and Landmarks Committee (DLC) unanimously recommended that the Planning Commission approve TriMet's Design Review application for the light rail bridge over Kellogg Creek/ McLoughlin Blvd at its Oct. 17th meeting.

The Planning Commission will consider the application at its Nov. 8^{th} meeting.

TriMet's presentation emphasized that the DLC and Milwaukie community have been instrumental in shaping the proposed design.

While supporting the overall bridge design, DLC members expressed some concern about lighting near the abutment in the Lake Road area and encouraged the design team to further refine the design of the concrete support columns.

Long-time Library Director retires

The Ledding Library and the City of Milwaukie will lose the services of one of its all-time greats when Library Director Joe Sandfort retires this month.

Joe began his career at the City's library as a Reference Librarian 32 years ago, in 1979, and worked his way up to Co-Director in 1984. Joe's been the Director for the past five years.

The leaves have begun changing to all the different browns, reds, oranges, and yellows as they slowly drift from their comfortable branches down to the ground.

It's a beautiful time of year, but it's important to know it's a violation of our Code to blow, rake, push, deposit, or in any manner, move the leaves from your property into the right-of-way, which includes the sidewalk, planter strip, curb, and street.

You also *cannot* deposit the leaves from your neighbors house onto their property. If it lands on your property it is yours. Look for the Free Leaf Drop-Off Program article on page 2 of this month's Pillot to help you with the removal of leaves from your property.
