As a Public Relations professional who runs her own shop, you could say Jody Schreffler practices PR with a purpose, or that she supports causes as much as she does her clients.

In September Jody volunteered her time to put together two events - one at a local gym, another at the City's First Friday event, that raised more than \$3,600 for NW Housing Alternatives and the Annie Ross House - the only emergency shelter for families in Clackamas County.

The ideas behind each of the events are indicative of Jody's kind of creativity. The event at the gym, the Warrior Room, featured an all-women arm wrestling tournament, and the lemonade stand was run by students from Riverside School, includ-

ing her daughter, that used locally donated products and included the expertise of Jill Younce of the Painted Lady, a Milwaukie coffee house.

Both events raised a lot of money for a great cause, and both events boosted local businesses.

"That's what I like to do," Jody explains. "That's

Learn more about long-term funding options

City Council is considering several long-term funding priorities. In October, 300 registered voters will be surveyed to seek their views. Community priorities under consideration:

The City is obligated to pay for a portion of light rail construction costs. Currently, the City is paying this debt with money that otherwise

would support core services such as public safety, library and parks. By paying off the debt through a General Obligation (G.O.) Bond, the community could save money and maintain core services.

Four neighborhood parks could be constructed at cur-

rently vacant, City-owned parcels in four different Neighborhoods.

Final improvements to Riverfront Park could be constructed through a G.O. bond including an amphitheater, a children's play structure, restrooms, and a water feature.

Moving Milwaukie project ramps up

The Moving Forward Milwaukie: Enhancing Our Commercial Districts project is launching its second phase on Thurs., Oct. 3rd, at 6 p.m.

The Moving Forward Milwaukie effort follows on the heels of the *Fresh Look Milwaukie: Downtown Road Map* project, which brought the community together last spring to determine broad-level priorities for the Downtown commercial core.

Moving Forward Milwaukie will build on those efforts by bringing the community together again to determine priorities for the City's other commercial corridors, including central Milwaukie and the "neighborhood main streets" of 32nd and 42nd

Milwaukie often engages in planning projects - from our transportation system to the parks in the South Downtown. I expect that a lot of folks then wonder why none of it ever gets built.

It's pretty simple, really. It's a financial issue. Because of Oregon law, the City's income is very limited and is largely controlled by property tax values which in recent times have been going down. On the other hand our expenses, like everyone else's, continue to rise and there never (in my lifetime) has been a margin for large infrastructure investments.

We get the few projects we need built with grant money and that often includes something as simple and basic as sidewalks. Furthermore, grants always come with strings attached which cause the projects to cost more than they could otherwise.

We have school kids walking and riding their bikes to school on busy streets with no sidewalks or bike lanes. We have one of the sweetest potential parks in the whole region at our riverfront. We have a library that is too small for the number of people it serves and we have 'parks' in neighborhoods that amount to nothing more than vacant lots. It is within our power to fix all of that.

We, the citizens of Milwaukie can choose to spend our hard-earned money on the kinds of things that make our lives better, richer and more complete. The City is considering asking the citizens of Milwaukie to vote for a bond measure to help refinance our light rail debt and save the City around \$700,000. We, the citizens, could choose to increase that amount and pay for very specific projects that we want to see completed in the near future.

City honors Vietnam vets

To recognize veterans of the Vietnam War, the City of Milwaukie has become the first municipality in the northwest to formally enter the United States Department of Defense's Vietnam War Commemorative Partner Program.

Members of Milwaukie's American Legion Post 180 are partnering with the City in the program, and were on hand at the Aug. 20th, City Council meeting to present Council with the partnership document from the Department of Defense, a commemorative proclamation from the President of the United States, and the Vietnam War 50th Anniversary commemorative flag.

The City and Legion have formed a committee to plan a pair of activities in 2015, 2016, 2017. Early ideas include organizing a Vietnam veteran's parade at the opening of the Portland - Milwaukie Light Rail Project in 2015, and bringing the traveling Vietnam Memorial Wall to the City of Milwaukie.

Updates on projects from the Community Development Department

Transportation System Plan Update

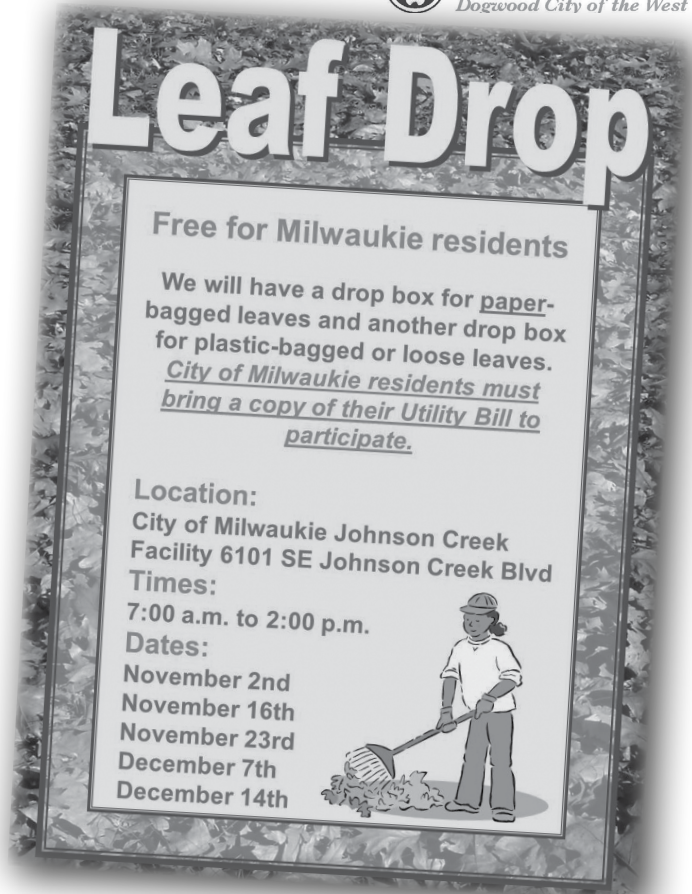
- City Council is expected to hear proposed amendments to the TSP, which prioritizes the City's road, bike, and pedestrian projects, at the Oct. 15th Regular Session Meeting, held at 7 p.m. in City Hall.
- As part of the six-month outreach process, which included two public hearings and three public meetings, citizens focused on project prioritization and showed support for multi-modal projects.

Quiet Zone Project - 37th Avenue & Oak Street Quiet Zone Improvements

- The City held the pre-construction meeting with its contractor, Brown Contracting Inc, on Sept. 13th.
- Brown Contracting is waiting on Union Pacific (UP) to provide the contractor's Right-of-Entry agreement prior to starting work.
- Once the agreement is completed, construction work will begin 30 days later (UP requires 30-day notice in advance of working within 25 feet of their rail line)
- Construction is estimated to begin in late October 2013.

ADA Ramp Enhancement

- The City has been awarded a \$130,000 grant from Clackamas County to upgrade deficient sidewalk curb ramps to meet current ADA standards.
- Design of the project was completed in September and it will be sent to Clackamas County Community Development for bid letting and award.
- Milwaukie's Engineering Department will manage construction and inspection.
- Construction is estimated to begin in late October.

The street name game

While out tricking or treating this Halloween, take a look at the street name you are wandering. Most of our Avenues (north-south) are numbered. Most of our Streets (east-west) are named for the original homesteader, a catchy neighborhood theme, or a President of the United States. The question is how many Presidents are missing, why are they missing and why does the shortest termed President get one?

Here are some hints. Because of when the map was plotted, only the first 11 Presidents are eligible, starting from the south heading north the Streets are Madison, Adams, Washington, Jefferson, Monroe, Jackson, and Harrison.

The answer has nothing to do with political philosophy. It has nothing to do with length of tenure. It has nothing to do with greatness. Give up?

The only reason is the original plot of Milwaukie was a grid, starting from the river and heading east with 352 lot squares with an alley in the middle, but only 35 at the time of recording were filled. Washington Street was the center of town leading to a Public Square. Then Adams, the 2nd President, was the next street to the south, the next street to the north was Jefferson, the 3rd President. The streets alternated back and forth, the odd number President to the north, the even number President to the south with one exception.

As Milwaukie developed, it grew mainly to the north of Washington and not south. That is why we are missing most of the even numbered Presidents and Madison Street is found only in Island Station. So who is missing?

Polk is the exception. Harrison is the last named street to the North, so Polk was the last street at the South end of town.

Select next top volunteer

Nominees can include anyone who resides in the City of Milwaukie or is a member of a non-profit organization that serves the Milwaukie community.

Nominations can be made through an on-line form located on the City's website. The deadline is 5 p.m., Thurs., Oct. 31st.

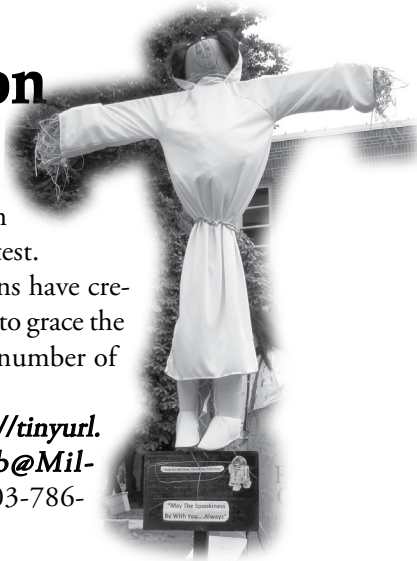

Stagnant Water - If you allow your gutters to fill up with leaves and not clean them out, it can create a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

Illegal Dumping - The leaves that fall on your property are yours. You cannot blow, rake or in any way coax them into the street or to a neighbor's property, even if the leaves came from a tree outside your property.

Council to look at murals

The Milwaukie Arts Committee will hold an informational meeting on the future of public murals in Milwaukie on Thurs., Oct. 10th, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. at City Hall, located at 10722 SE Main St. Participants will get an overview of the proposed program and will have the opportunity to ask questions and provide comments.

Current code language does not permit large-scale public murals in the City. Staff intends to bring code changes to the Planning Commission in the winter of 2013 with final adoption by Council soon thereafter. The hope is to see new murals in town by the end of summer 2014.

High speed rail gets a look

The Oregon Department of Transportation is studying options for high speed passenger rail service between the Columbia River in the Portland urban area and the Eugene-Springfield urban area - a 125 mile segment.

One of the alignments under review would bring high-speed trains along the Union Pacific rail corridor through Milwaukie. An informational meeting will be held Weds., Oct. 30th, 5 to 7 p.m., at the Milwaukie Center.

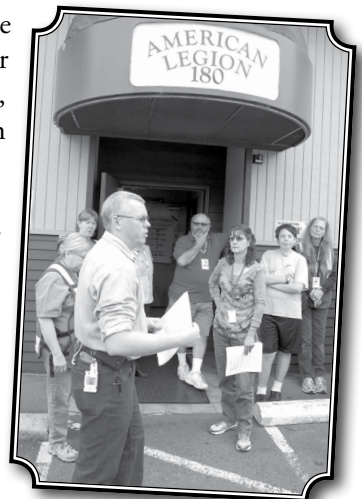

Emergency shelter tested

On Sat., Sept. 14th the Milwaukie American Legion Post #180 Shelter Team, the American Red Cross, and the Milwaukie CERT Team participated in a shelter drill.

The drill was the first walk-through of shelter operations for the Milwaukie teams. Milwaukie's Legion Post is the only one in the Pacific Northwest that has a dedicated Red Cross shelter trained team to operate a disaster shelter. Along with Milwaukie's Community Emergency Response Team, these emergency disaster volunteers will play an important role in Milwaukie's ability to respond to help its citizens following a disaster event.

We attend City Council and Planning Commission meetings and public meetings on ordinance re-writes. Our land use committee needs more volunteers. Interested?

The reason for all this is that in 1970's, the state realized that we would dramatically change in the future so it was decided that ordinary citizens would be guaranteed a full partnership in planning.

We were given an official set of Goals and Guidelines to say exactly how this democratic system was to work, I took great pleasure in being one of hundreds who worked on this historic law. www.oregon.gov/docs/goals.

We are now participating in a 18-month \$254,000 planning & zoning project for Downtown and Central Milwaukie and the 32nd and 42nd Avenue commercial areas. The current adopted plans call for mixed use development of the downtown and central Milwaukie sites. Other plans are for considering zoning changes on 32nd and 42nd at King Rd. The project is called Moving Forward Milwaukie: Enhancing our Commercial Districts. Your thoughts and ideas are welcome.
