MFM project moving

After months of deliberation in public meetings, Planning Commission and Council meetings, draft code amendments that aim to remove barriers and create incentives for good development in downtown Milwaukie will be presented to the public for its review at an event on Weds., Oct. 29th, at 6 p.m. at the Masonic Lodge.

The amendments are a product of the Moving Forward Milwaukie (MFM) project, and address things such as how buildings look, what can happen in them, and how new development is reviewed, all of which when taken together aim to encourage the kind of and development projects the community supports.

On Tues., Sept. 23rd, the Planning Commission and Council held a joint meeting to discuss urban design and how key concepts could apply to new development in downtown. The

Leaf Drop dates are set for season

Milwaukie residents can help prevent the clogging of storm drains, which helps prevent local flooding and preserves water quality, by dumping off all of their leaves at the City's Johnson Creek Facility, located at 6101 SE JCB, on Nov. 1st, 15th, 22nd and Dec. 6th and 13th., from 7 a.m. to noon

A drop box will be available for paper-bagged leaves, and another for plastic-bagged or loose leaves. Residents must bring a copy of a City Utility Bill to participate and are encouraged to bring canned food that will be donated to a food bank.

As I walk the Trolley Trail along the edge of Riverfront Park, it is exciting to see the progress of new walkways, Boat Ramp and parking areas. As I walk further along the Trolley Trail to the south, I am reminded of the long-time adjacent structures which make up the Kellogg Sewage Treatment Plant.

These structures have remained the same for decades as technology for more modern treatment plants have evolved. During my weekly walks along the historic Trolley Trail, it is also evident by the foul odors emanating from this plant, that it is in severe need of improvements in order to advance, even just to reach 1980's technology. This lack of proper infrastructure upgrades will continue to exist unless the owners of this plant, WES, hear from the citizens of Milwaukie.

Fortunately, the folks at WES who run the plant have allowed signs to be placed along the Trolley Trail walking and bicycle path which list the number to call, ANY TIME you smell these foul odors coming from the plant. Be sure to note on the message you leave the time of day you smelled these foul odors and what part of the plant they are coming from.

The number is 503-557-6367. They are awaiting our calls, they want our feedback! It is so important that we tell them to make the necessary repairs and upgrades to the systems so that when our new Riverfront Park opens in less than a year we can all enjoy the park, the views and use of the Willamette River.

So go out and enjoy our wonderful fall weather. But most importantly, let WES, as owners of the Kellogg Sewage Treatment Plant, know that we care about FRESH AIR and the quality of life in our downtown.

Phase II Milwaukie Riverfront Park Construction

Beginning Oct. 1st the precast ramp panels of the new boat ramp will start to be placed. On Oct. 6th the piles for the new floating dock that will run alongside the new boat ramp will start to be pushed into the ground. Also this month the site will be planted, hydroseeded (grass seed sprayed), the new bathroom will be built, and site paving will be completed. All in-water work for the new ramp and dock is to be completed by Oct. 31st.

Parks District on ballot

On this November's ballot voters will be asked if they wish to form North Clackamas Parks District (NCPRD) as an independent district separate from county government, at a new, higher tax rate.

The new district would no longer be governed by the County Board of Commissioners, but by an elected board made up of residents who live in the District's boundaries. There are three Milwaukie-area candidates among the 11 candidates for the new board. If established, the new district would establish a permanent rate of 89 cents per \$1,000. The current rate is 54 cents per \$1,000. The increase would equate to about \$7 per month more on a \$250,000 home. According to the NCPRD, the new rate would allow additional funding for park maintenance and programming, as well as the creation of new parks, natural areas and open spaces.

In June 2014 City Council passed a resolution stating its support and approval of the formation of a new district, along with its consent to be included in the new district, should voters approve its formation.

The NCPRD was established in 1990. Prior to that, the City maintained its own parks department, but then transferred its assets to NCPRD upon its formation.

Help protect our water

Every resident can help protect our local waterways and the water we drink by being mindful of what goes down the drains you see in the City's streets. Pollutants that go down those drains flow untreated directly into our streams and rivers, and some of those drains discharge to subsurface drywells which may impact the aquifer that Milwaukie relies upon for drinking water.

Weigh-in on four parks

Community members are invited to a series of visioning meetings to help shape the design of four Milwaukie parks.

North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District (NCPRD) and the City of Milwaukie are partnering to plan and develop the parks, which are currently known as Balfour, Bowman-Brae, Robert Kronberg and Wichita parks. While funding to build the parks is not currently available, community input will shape the designs that will be used for construction.

At the first round of meetings basic concepts were presented for public feedback which will be incorporated and displayed at a second round of meetings. Due to the size and complexity of the Balfour site, a third meeting will be held in December.

A 'true friend'

Near the front door of the Milwaukie Museum, located at 3737 SE Adams St., hangs a plaque that reads "Christa McDonald ... A True Friend."

She was more than just a friend to Milwaukie, she was also our historian. After fleeing Germany after World War II, she came to live in Milwaukie with her American husband Bill in 1949. As her husband was going to school, she worked in a small bakeshop on Main Street. This is where she started to pick up the bits and pieces of Milwaukie history.

Christa McDonald joined the Milwaukie Historical Society in the early 1960's. Her dedication to preserving Milwaukie history culminated with the Milwaukie Museum. In 1973 the Milwaukie Historical Society had the opportunity to move a farmhouse to city-owned property. She and the Society tackled the job. This is where the Museum now stands today.

The Museum strives today because of her efforts. Six years after the opening of the Museum, Mrs. McDonald informed City Council that it no longer needed funding from the City. She relentlessly gave tours, visited schools, and created traveling exhibitions. She was named *Clackamas Review* Woman of the year in 1992 for her inspirational efforts of keeping Milwaukie History alive.

Thank you Mrs. McDonald for creating a place to share it. Mrs. McDonald passed away in 1994.

The City Code Corner

We are getting to the point in the year where the fall colors start to appear and all the leaves begin to fall. Here are some codes that relate to the falling leaves.

Stagnant Water- If you allow your gutters to fill up with leaves and not clean them out, it can create a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

Illegal Dumping- The leaves that fall on your property are yours. You cannot blow, rake or in any way coax them into the street or to a neighbor's property, even if the leaves came from a tree outside your property. Instead take them to our free leaf drop (see page 1 article).

If you have an old appliance, piece of furniture, old tires or other large items you don't want anymore, give your garbage company a call. Year-round, they can arrange to pick up these things for disposal and also have large temporary garbage containers available if you are working on a clean-out or DIY project. Fees vary.

If the item is still in good and usable condition, consider donating it to a thrift store or other charity such as Community Warehouse or Habitat ReStore. It's a good idea to call them first to see if they accept the item you want to donate.

If you want to get rid of a TV, computer or monitor these items are prohibited from going in the garbage. Recycle them for free at Oregon E-Cycles locations. In Milwaukie these are at Goodwill and the Salvation Army Family Store. For more information visit www.OregonECycles.org.

Civil War Vets' markers added to Pioneer Cemetery

Thanks to Waverley Country Club, the Sons of Veterans of the Civil War and the volunteers who conducted tremendous amounts of research and signature collecting to satisfy U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs requirements, five new grave stones for Civil War Veterans were added to the Milwaukie Pioneer Cemetery on Sept. 8th, 2014.

These new markers were placed on graves that have never had markers at the cemetery, which is located off 17th Ave., just north of Waverley Drive. In order for this to happen, there must be a paper trail of the veteran's service, proof that they are buried in a given place, and a next of kin must sign to give permission for the marker to be installed. Once all of this has been accomplished, the paperwork is submitted to the Department of Veterans Affairs and a new headstone is delivered with names, dates and military service on the headstone. Volunteers Carolyn Arntson and Randy Fletcher performed this research, and if were not for them, this project would not have come together.

The Milwaukie Pioneer Cemetery Association thanks them, Waverley Country Club for marker storage and help with the placement, not to mention help with upkeep in general, of the Cemetery and the Sons of Veterans of the Civil War for making this first wave of new headstones possible.
