City assembling team to score baseball

In its aspiration to land a minor league baseball team, the City Council heard a staff recommendation at its Sept. 20th Work Session to assemble a team of communication and design professionals to advance the baseball concept on the ODOT site in the North Industrial area. At its Oct. 4th meeting, Council will be asked to approve contracts that will launch the advisory team.

The team includes an architecture firm that will conduct site and building feasibility studies, a project

management firm with expertise in public/private sports facility construction, and a communications firm with experience raising money for minor league baseball stadiums.

"Council has been out in the community and continues to hear excitement about the Bring It Back

The DLC is charged with forwarding a recommendation to the City's Planning Commission for a Nov. 8 hearing. That hearing is also open to the public and comment is encouraged.

The stadium will likely be multipurpose and could also host baseball games for all levels of play, but will be built in such a way that it could also

The "Bring It Back" project includes building a stadium, repurposing the historic ODOT building, and creating retail spaces that will all support our local economy and help to make Milwaukie a destination. The project will also bring a number of family-wage jobs to the region.

When I tell people I live in Milwaukie, they ask me about the project. They want to know how soon we will be playing ball, which team we're likely to get, what we're going to name the stadium, how many people will the stadium hold, and the list goes on.

And it's not just the public that's expressed a great interest in the project. Investors and developers have contacted the City with their ideas on how they can be a part of bringing a minor league team to the region.

Soon the City Council will be asking you, the public, to provide your input on the many aspects of the project as we begin our work in earnest. There is much to learn and a lot of work to do, and I hope you will be following the effort.


Bike Milwaukie gets rolling

October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. In a survey of Oregon women age 20-55, nearly one-third reported one or more forms of violent victimization during the prior five years. A survey of young Oregon women indicates that 30% of 11th grade females and 24% of eighth grade females said that an adult had intentionally hit, physically hurt, and/or had sexual contact with them.

The costs of domestic violence in Oregon are estimated at over \$50 million dollars a year - \$35 million for direct medical and mental health services.


Bow wow wow yippy yo yippy yah Linwood!
