ORDINANCE NO. 23

An ordinance to prevent the obstruction of the public highways of the Town of Milwaukie, Oregon.

Passed May 12, 1908.

The Town of Milwaukie does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to lead or drive or cause to be led or driven upon any of the sidewalks of said Town any horse, mule or cow except for the purpose of crossing the same or to allow any such animal belonging to him or under his care to stand on said sidewalk, or to hitch or cause to be hitched any of said animals, so that they shall be upon or shall be upon or obstruct said sidewalk.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to suffer or permit any horse, cow or other animal, street car, carriage, sled or other vehicle, belonging to him or under his care, to stand or stop upon any cross walk or intersection of two streets or a street or alley, for any other purpose except the taking up of passengers or setting down of passengers, nor for any longer time than will be necessary for such purpose.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or for any corporation by its agents, or for any agent or employee of any corporation to leave any street car or motor car or express car or freight car standing on any of the streets of said Town after dark of any day for a longer period than ten minutes..

Sec. 4. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before any court of this Town shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred Dollars or by imprisonment in the Town jail for a period of fifty days or by both such fine and imprisonment.
