



Ledding Library Bond Measure up for Voters on May 17 Ballot



The Ledding Library was built in 1964 and has served the people of Milwaukie for more than 50 years. The proposed bond measure will add 35 cents per \$1,000 assessed home value per year.

Built in 1964, the Ledding Library has served the people of Milwaukie for more than 50 years, and receives approximately a quarter of a million visits every year. When the current library building first opened, Milwaukie had only 10,000 residents, and it hasn't been significantly improved since 1987. Today, the city has more than 20,000 residents, however, the library has not expanded to meet demand that has more than doubled. Last year, the library offered 663 programs for children, adults, seniors, and local businesses with more than 19,000 people in attendance—nearly the entire population of Milwaukie. As the city continues to grow, demand for additional space for educational programming in the library is outpacing its ability to supply it.

Recently, City Council voted unanimously to refer a bond measure to the voters on this May's ballot to invest in needed improvements, repairs, space and updates to the library. The bond measure would authorize the city to issue up to \$9.2 million to pay for improvements to the library and Pond House. For more information, visit

I strongly believe in Milwaukie—it's one of the better places around."

On a brief trip to Philadelphia earlier this month, my family and I spent an afternoon at the National Constitution Center. Opened in 2003, the Center tells the story of America's founding and the history of freedom, the Constitution, and civil rights in the United States, including the struggle to win the right to vote. It was a poignant visit and reminder that we owe many liberties we have today to those who came before us to advocate for change.

So how are we doing today in exercising these rights? During the last countywide election in November 2015, just 1,473 people in Milwaukie voted. The previous year, 6,101 people voted in local Milwaukie races. Sometimes, decisions on local issues come down to just a few votes.

When asked why they don't vote, people often reply, "I'm too busy" or "nothing really ever gets done anyway." That's why I think this May 2016 election in Milwaukie is pretty special. For more than 15 years, Milwaukie volunteers have been working on a long-term repair, maintenance, and capital investment strategy for the Ledding Library. After determining the work's estimated construction cost last year, in February, the Task Force voted unanimously to recommend that City Council put forward a ballot measure.

This month, you can weigh in on Measure 3-477 and have a direct say in whether to fund improvements, updates, and potential expansion to the Ledding Library. Don't forget to return your ballot by May 17 at 8 p.m. And please vote—your voice matters.

Illustrator's Art Show



Planning Commission to Consider Marijuana Regulation



On May 24, the Milwaukie Planning Commission is scheduled to hold a public hearing on new zoning ordinance regulations regarding marijuana businesses. Current city requirements only govern the allowed

location and operating characteristics of medical marijuana dispensaries. The new regulations will address recreational marijuana retail stores, as well as marijuana grow sites and facilities for processing, warehousing, testing, and researching marijuana.

The draft code amendments propose the following:

- Allow retail stores in commercial areas provided they are 1,000 feet from schools and other marijuana retail stores.
- Allow processing and warehousing in industrial areas.
- Allow testing and research in commercial and industrial areas.
- Limit outdoor grow sites in residential area to amounts allowed under state law.
- Require medical grow sites in residential areas to be indoors with ventilation and odor filters.
- Require recreational and medical grow sites in industrial areas to be indoors and with ventilation and odor filters.
- Prohibit grow sites in the North Milwaukie Industrial Area.

City Exploring Urban Renewal Plan

City Council has directed the preparation and public review of an urban renewal plan for downtown and central Milwaukie. The urban renewal plan will eventually be voted on by the Milwaukie City Council, tentatively scheduled for late summer 2016. If adopted, the urban renewal plan would provide funding for numerous projects in three main categories:

- **Economic Development:** new places to live, work, eat and shop.
- **Transportation:** getting around downtown and central Milwaukie
- **Public Amenities:** improvements to parks and public spaces, gateway and entryway improvements

This urban renewal study is guided by an advisory group composed of representatives from the neighborhoods, businesses, and taxing districts that would be within urban renewal area. They have already met three times to discuss important aspects of the urban renewal plan, including the boundary, goals and objectives, projects, and financing plan.

Additionally, the plan relies on input from the public. The city hosted an open house in April, and there are still several opportunities to provide input at the First Friday celebrations on May 6 and June 4, and at the Farmers Markets on May 22 and June 26. Clackamas Fire Adopts Fireworks Ordinance



Clackamas Fire District #1 has adopted Ordinance 15-01, which authorizes the fire district to prohibit the use, explosion or discharge of fireworks within the district boundaries. The intent of this ordinance is to temporarily ban the use, explosion or discharge of fireworks only when weather conditions create an elevated level of fire danger that the District has declared as High or Extreme. The temporary ban would be imposed to help prevent property loss and personal injuries caused by fireworks.

The ordinance authorizes the fire district to regulate the manufacture, sale, use or discharge of certain fireworks within district boundaries. Any person to have violated the prohibition could be subject to a penalty of up to \$500 per violation, at the discretion of the fire chief.

City Code Corner



There's nothing like putting in that sweat equity in your home, right? One of the most common home projects is building that nice new fence. However, it is important to note some vital information prior to installation:

Height – The maximum height for fences from the front edge of the house to the backyard is six feet. This includes any additional lattice work attached to the top of the fence. From the front edge of the house towards the front property line, the maximum height is 42 inches, or three and a half feet.

Right-of-way building – Make sure you know where your front property line is before placing your fence. The right-of-way is where the sidewalk would and could be, if you don't have one.

Property line – Property line disputes with adjoining property owners are civil matters and not handled by the city, so try to work out the property lines with your neighbor prior to building the fence.



A Rich History of Green Thumbs



Milwaukie's history of agriculture and horticulture is vast. Nearly all of the land that the community's homes now sit on was once a thriving vegetable, orchard, or flower farm. One of the legendary floral producers is Milwaukie Floral.

Originally called Lakewood Greenhouses and located on Lake Road, Milwaukie Floral grew and marketed approximately a half million cut flowers and potted plants. In a 1923 Milwaukie Review article it states, "the Lakewood Greenhouse wholesales and retails their products, having a store located at 4th and Yamhill. They ship flowers all over the state of Oregon, Washington,

and Idaho with consignments going as far north as Alaska, east to Iowa and Illinois.

Gene and Rosa Leitz bought Lakewood Greenhouses in 1935. The purchase price was \$5,000, and all of their friends thought they were nuts. Their first crops were growing tomatoes and sweet peas, however, their first customer was looking for geraniums and Milwaukie Floral was born. In 1964, Donna Leitz Johnson, Gene and daughter, Rosa, built the existing building at 3306 SE Lake Rd, which remains in the family today.

Concerns over environmental air pollution are a hot topic these days with recent investigations into several local companies. Our neighborhood is downwind of several small and large industrial sites that each have an obligation to operate within the law and to respect their neighbors by going beyond minimal compliance.

If you have concerns in particular about odors that are coming from an industrial site, Oregon DEQ has a revised nuisance odor regulation that strengthens the citizen complaint process. To escalate a concern, DEQ must receive ten intake forms from ten different addresses over a 60-day period. To report a nuisance odor, you can either call 1-888-997-7888 or go online to www.deq.state.or.us/complaints. To keep up with the most current news regarding recent air pollution events, visit www.saferair.oregon.gov.

The community can help reduce local air pollution levels by making an effort to reduce driving, eliminate the use of toxic lawn and garden chemicals, and convert to electric powered lawn care tools.

In other news, the NDA approved a grant to support the Rowe Middle School End Hunger campaign and we are starting the planning for Music in the Park this summer. There are five Wednesdays in August, so a lot of good music and family fun to look forward to this summer!
