## City readying for the future

The first phase of the Moving Forward Milwaukie project is nearing completion just in time for the opening of TriMet's Orange Line and the rising interest in development it is anticipated to bring.

Phase I updates downtown code and zoning and sets the vision for downtown by combining five commercial zones into one zone for easier comprehension; clearly communicating the community's design expectations; allowing a broader range of residential and mixed use development; broadening the range of permitted uses in downtown; and streamlining the review process for new development.

"Before our regulations were onerous and complex," Senior Planner Li Alligood explains. "Now they're more

September usually marks a return to regular routines for many families (including mine).

It's back to school time, with weekends spent watching sports, tinkering on projects, rooting for our kids' school teams, harvesting the last of summer gardens, and enjoying the

turn of the season.

This year, though, September in Milwaukie will be anything but routine. The last of the Light Rail-related projects are being completed in time for the exciting Sept. 12<sup>th</sup> opening. After the big opening day, what's next for our town? Council just approved the community- and Planning Commission-led package of downtown "Moving Forward Milwaukie" code changes to make the development standards clearer and more straightforward. In the meantime, Light Rail will give us new transportation options. But to build a more walkable, bustling downtown, it's now up to us to try new routines.

Council and city staff will be working on economic strategies to further support our business community, and to draw new businesses to town. We're brainstorming ideas and looking to draw on what's worked elsewhere.

But we can't do it without you! So this fall, think about trying something new, too – hop on the Orange Line for a ride, visit a part of town that's new to you, and duck into a local shop.

Support the people that are investing in our town, and together, let's keep our Milwaukie momentum going.

## Key connector constructed



The Adams Street Connector - the pedestrian way between downtown's MAX station and Main Street - was completed in August and now provides a key connection between the station area and downtown businesses. With re-stripping parking spaces on Main Street to add parking stalls, the project resulted in the loss of three spaces. Check it out during the Orange Line celebration on Sept. 12<sup>th</sup> - this is where the live bands are playing, and where the Breakside Brewery beer tent will be set up!

clear and the process streamlined. This is good for the community and developers. The community has clearly communicated the type of development it supports and developers have a clear path to approval should their proposal meet community expectations." Project recommendations related to economic development, such as greater marketing of tools and resources for business retention, recruitment and expansion, are being implemented through a parallel process.

Phase II of the Moving Forward Milwaukie project sets a vision for Central Milwaukie's commercial areas and its code amendments go before City Council in September.

# Kellogg Bridge connection construction underway

Work on the landings for the bike and pedestrian bridge that was constructed underneath the Kellogg Creek light rail bridge is underway and is expected to be completed by mid-November.

This phase of the project will provide landings in Kronberg Park and in downtown Milwaukie next to the Main Street station. A future phase will connect a trail through Kronberg Park to the signalized intersection at 99E/

River Road. This phase is unfunded at this time.

The weathered steel truss bridge section that is already installed is 234-foot-long, and 12-foot-wide. The north connection under construction is 135-foot-long and ties into the sidewalk on the south side of Main Street. The south connection is 35 feet long and it terminates into a circular concrete landing in Kronberg Park.

## A unique Bike Milwaukie

This month's Bike Milwaukie event is going to be different than any other! Riders will meet at three spots to start off the ride on Sun., Sept. 27<sup>th</sup>, at 10:30 a.m.: Oak Grove Boulevard & Arista, City Hall, and the Ardenwald School parking lot.

The Oak Grove group will meet up with the City Hall group. The Ardenwald group will head on down to the Springwater Trail and then riders will all head into Sellwood for the Portland Sunday Parkways Event. Once the groups converge in Sellwood, route riders will be on their own to ride the Parkways route and experience the event at their own speed. Riders will return to Milwaukie on their own schedule after they've enjoyed the Sunday Parkways event!

## Key bike & ped path project on track

The project to construct a multi-use regional trail on the west side of SE 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue between McLoughlin Boulevard and SE Ochoco Street that will create a vital connection between the Trolley Trail and Springwater Corridor is on pace to start construction in spring of 2016.

Bike and vehicle lanes are planned to be re-stripped on 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue to formalize a northbound on-street bike lane for safer travel for pedestrians and cyclists. The roadway will be re-stripped to make room for the 11-foot bike and ped path on the west side of 17<sup>th</sup> Ave.

The large majority of the funding for the \$4 million project comes from a Metro grant - the city is responsible for a 10% match.

Now that summer is nearly over, it may be time to put the motor home or boat away for winter. There are some codes in the city that pertain to recreational vehicles and boats. For instance, did you know?

- Lots less than one acre can only have one recreational vehicle unless others are parked in a garage.
- They need to be currently licensed and completely operational.
- They cannot be parked on grass or dirt.
- They cannot be parked in the right-of-way or on street in a residential zone.

## The old is new again

Ever hear the expression, ‘Everything old is new again’? Well, it is true again as the Tri-Met Orange Line gets set for its grand opening Sept. 12<sup>th</sup>.



There once was the Portland Interurban Streetcar that existed from 1893 through the early 1960’s. This was one of the first electric trolley lines in the country. It changed Milwaukie’s economy mainly of a farming community into the entertainment capital of the Portland area. It provided transportation for the Portland elite to create summer homes around Island Station and Kellogg Lake. This led to many entertainment avenues such as the dance hall on Elk Rock Island, Crystal Lake Park, and other entertainment venues.

On Sept. 12<sup>th</sup> from 1 to 5 p.m., the City of Milwaukie, hosted by Milwaukie Historical Society, will be displaying the history of the Streetcar Line inside Council Chambers at City Hall. Starting at 2 p.m. rail historian, writer, and consultant Richard Thompson will be giving a historical presentation on the Interurban Streetcar. At 3 p.m. there will be a presentation of stories collected from Milwaukian’s about their experiences on the Streetcar line. Come and share your experiences!

Later that day, City of Milwaukie and Milwaukie Historical Society are presenting a Trolley Trail Lantern Walk beginning at 6:30 p.m. The Walk will begin at Klein Point and end at the Park Avenue Max Line stop. The walk follows the path of the old streetcar line and will feature talks about where the old Streetcar stops were, historical facts located around the trail, and an explanation of the art and innovations along the Trolley Trail and Orange Max Line.


