## Light Rail enters land use review

The Portland - Milwaukie Light Rail project is entering the City's permitting and land use approval phase for the alignment's facilities and structures that are located in Milwaukie.

Last month TriMet submitted the first land use applications for the bridge structure over Kellogg Lake and a segment of the Trolley Trail to Milwaukie's Planning Department.

Key to this process is providing the public opportunities to review and provide input on these applications.

Following is a summary of the review process the City will follow for these two applications. Similar review processes will follow as other land use applications for the other elements are submitted.



## City secures money for trail

Every two years the Joint Policy Advisory Committee on Transportation (JPACT) and Metro Council decide on how to spend federal transportation funds which are known as Regional Flexible Funds (RFF) locally. Metro Council anticipates allocating approximately \$22.5 million for local projects in 2014-15 based on two major focus areas:

- Active Transportation and Complete Streets (ATCS) projects
- Green Economy and Freight (GEF) projects.

The \$22.5 million available in RFF is distributed between Washington County, Multnomah County, Clackamas County, and the City of Portland. Clackamas County's share of the RFF pot is \$ 3.759 million. Seventy-five percent of the RFF is allocated to ATCS projects (\$2.7 million) and the remaining 25% to GEF projects (\$790,000)

The Metro Subcommittee which is comprised of elected officials from Clackamas County jurisdictions that reside within the Metro boundaries met on August 4<sup>th</sup> to make a recommendation to Metro and JPACT on which projects should be funded with the RFF for 2014-2015.

There were six ATCS projects proposed for consideration to the Metro Subcommittee. The City of Milwaukie submitted the 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue Multi-Use Regional Connection Project. This project will connect the Trolley Trail (to be completed in early 2012) and the Springwater Trail. This project will complete the last mile of a regional 20 mile bike and pedestrian loop trail.

The project will construct a multi-use trail on the west side of SE 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue between Harrison Street at McLoughlin Boulevard and Ochoco Street. The project will include two 11' vehicle lanes, two 5' bike lanes, and a separated 12' pedestrian/bike trail. This project will all be done within the existing right-of-way.

The City of Milwaukie requested the entire \$2.7 million in RFF for this project. The Metro Subcommittee voted unanimously to support Milwaukie's request.

I would like to thank all of our citizens and neighbors who took the time to testify in favor of this project. Your overwhelming support of this project was a major factor in why Milwaukie's proposal was selected over the other five worthwhile projects.


## City Hall Sculpture Garden has a new hue


## View City's historic properties
