## NDA Program History & Purpose

#### • What is an NDA?

- One of the city's officially recognized channels for community participation
- Open to anyone who lives, owns property or a business, or represents a non-profit organization
- How are NDAs institutionalized?
  - Comprehensive Plan
    - Goal 1.4: Uphold NDAs
  - Some other areas mentioned in Municipal Code include:
    - Public Art Murals NDA Chair provided notice
    - Permit for Major Pruning or Removal of Street Trees – NDA Chair provided notice
- Boundary Establishment and Official Recognition
  - Boundaries established in 1994 by Resolution based on school catchment zones
  - City then requested that NDAs determine founding officers and apply for official recognition. Each filed separately between 1994-1996.

- Standard Bylaws
  - All seven NDAs operate with essentially identical bylaws
    - Ardenwald-Johnson Creek is recognized in Portland as well so operates according to two sets of bylaws
- Typical Officers
  - **Chair** Plans and runs meetings, including agenda creation. Is primary point of contact for NDA
  - Vice-Chair Fills in and supports chair as needed
  - **Treasurer** Manages the finances and completes annual NDA Grant Report
  - Secretary Takes the minutes to tell the NDA's story
  - Land Use Committee Chair/Members Receives land use information from city and coordinates conversations about land use
  - Some have other officers as well To keep people active within the NDA, NDAs can create other officer positions if desired. Topics could include: Communication, parks, transportation, art, etc.

#### SUMMARY OF CURRENT PROGRAM SUPPORT

- 7 NDAs 61 leaders
- 2022 About 68 total meetings
- Most NDAs currently meeting using Zoom provided by city
- Each NDA receives \$4,000 annually through NDA Grant Program after submittal of annual report


- City purchases liability insurance for each NDA Average premium for 2021-22 is \$607
- Events supply trailer Tables, chairs, tents, etc. •
- Training
  - Annual in June
  - One-on-one as needed
  - Other training throughout year

- Communication and engagement: Reserved space in Pilot
  - every month

  - Webpages
    Posting of minutes and agendas on city website
    Articles in the Pilot to
  - encourage involvement
  - Assistance with print material
  - Assistance with event
  - marketing Assistance with branding and identity
- Ongoing assistance as the need arises

• What are the 2-3 biggest challenges moving forward for the NDAs


## Common Themes of Accomplishments

- Pandemic has been challenging, but provided an opportunity to rethink how the NDAs engage and what events might be possible
- Zoom has worked well and NDAs are very grateful that it has been available
  - Added bonus of attracting new people who may not be able to attend in person
- NDAs that regularly hold events pivoted to supporting other groups during the pandemic with small grants
- NDAs are excited to get back to in person events and meetings in 2022









#### Common Themes of Challenges

- While Zoom has worked well there is a general sense that attendance and engagement is better with in person meetings
- Leadership development, retention, and training: Perceived low attendance and less engagement at virtual meetings results in fewer opportunities to develop new leaders
