October Monthly Activities Board Report

From the Director:

October was a busy and successful month. Although we made a strategic decision to reduce library hours modestly, we saw more visitors walking through the door, attending programs, using Wi-Fi and total questions asked than the previous October! For full statistics, see the last page of this report.

I'm proud of how well this staff is working with each other, with our community and across City departments. This month we hosted a quarterly city-wide staff meeting, followed by our library staff development day. It's hard to find the time to bring our whole staff together for training, especially in a library that supports the community seven days per week. However, it is very important to me that we invest in this team, so they can complete the job we've asked them to undertake.

October brought the conclusion to our second annual Author Series. Attendance and participation more than doubled this year, likely in part due to our community partners helping spread the word about the series. Special thanks to the Friends of the Ledding Library for providing the funding to make our programs possible and to our community co-sponsors Spoke & Word Books who were onsite to sell books at most of the author talks. They also advertised the programs in their store with a special display. (Work Smarter Together)

They have both demonstrated how we can Work Smarter Together. We are happy they will both be back at the library soon (MM Smarter)

Kudos to **Sara** for making storytime more accessible this month with a visual schedule. Sara created a pictorial outline of storytime activities that is especially helpful for kids with sensory issues.

Kirsten coordinated a volunteer training session for teen volunteers. 13 teens have signed up to work 20 volunteer hours each this school year. It is no small feat to get them all trained!

Improving Organizational Health & Sustainability:

In October, the library instituted a modest hours change. This change is strategic and is an outcome based on priority two in the library's three-year <u>strategic plan</u>. The goal isdesigned to increase organizational capacity with our current budget and staffing.

- The library is open fifty-six hours per week which is three hours more than Multnomah County Libraries and Lake Oswego Public Library, but six hours fewer than Oregon City and Happy Valley.
- The library remains open seven days per week, opening every day at 10:00am.
 - The library closes at 6pm on Mondays, Thursdays & Fridays.
 - The library closes at 7pm on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.
 - The library closes at 5pm on Saturdays and Sundays.

Supporting Staff:

 The library closed on Wednesday, October 30 for a staff training day. After welcoming our city coworkers to the library for a citywide meeting, the library team reviewed building evacuation plans, learned about a new translation service for use with the public, and participated in de-escalation training from Right2Be. The City's Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Coordinator Gabriela Santoyo Gutierrez joined us.







- Robert attended the Milwaukie Houseless meeting with Kelly to learn more about the local outreach groups and partners in Clackamas County.
- Jana attended the NW Public Employees Diversity Conference with 5 other Milwaukie City staff.
- On Thursday, October 17, the library (along with the other departments of the City of Milwaukie) participated in the Great ShakeOut earthquake drill. At 10:17am, staff members in the library (as well as a few patrons) performed the earthquake safety skills of Drop, Cover, and Hold On.

Helping Milwaukians Most in Need:

- The library partners with Clackamas County Health, Housing, and Human Services to provide Rent Well E-Course Lab drop-in sessions.
 - Rent Well is a tenant education class that helps people overcome housing barriers related to evictions or rental history, credit, or criminal history.
 - o During the October 15th lab 4 clients attended the lab.
 - Two of the clients were connected to other services.
 - o Spanish instruction and other language interpretation are provided.
- Robert taught three tech help sessions with two patrons:
 - helped a patron use their app to communicate with their wife in a nursing home;
 helped a patron set up apps on their Android phone and delete and disable some unnecessary apps.

Book Displays:

For the first half of October, we highlighted Hispanic Heritage Month. For the rest of October, we featured spooky stories with our display, "Dare to be Scared". We included many seasonal and horror movies on our "Staff Picks" DVD rack. Other displays throughout the library spotlighted Hispanic Heritage, Rosh Hashanah, Diwali, Dia de los Muertos, Halloween, and World Animal month.

Other Highlights:

• More than 500 children have signed up for our 1000 Books before Kindergarten program since it started 2 years ago. This early literacy initiative encourages language play and book sharing between caregivers and children in their first 5 years.
