At the federal level there has been news that will impact libraries across the country.

- First, The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has placed its entire staff on [administrative leave](#).
- Second, congressionally approved grants to [State Libraries and others](#) have been terminated.

A copy of the letter sent by IMLS Acting Director Keith Sonderling is to the right. There will surely be judicial challenges to this and we'll keep an eye on the State Library's [evolving response](#).

Dear IMLS Grantee,

This letter provides notice that the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) is terminating your federal grant effective April 1, 2025, through the termination clause in your Award Agreement.

This grant is unfortunately inconsistent with IMLS' priorities. Independently and secondly, the President's March 14, 2025 executive order mandates that the IMLS eliminate all non-statutorily required activities and functions. See *Continuing the Reduction of the Federal Bureaucracy*, E.O. 14238 (Mar. 14, 2025). Therefore, the IMLS hereby terminates your grant in its entirety effective April 1, 2025.

Please remember that your obligations under the Grant Agreement continue to apply. Additionally, an audit may be conducted by IMLS after the termination of the agreement.

Community Partnerships, Collaborations and Connections:

K-5th grade students enrolled in the Clackamas Web Academy came to the library on a field trip on March 7 with their parents. For many of the kids, it was their first visit to the library. They enjoyed storytime, a library tour, and the chance to get library cards.

We shared storytime with the Ready Set Go families in their Wichita classroom, with teacher Denys translating to Spanish. The Metropolitan Family Services kindergarten-readiness program will come to the library on a field trip in May.

Programs, Services, and Outreach

Tasha and Fida visited Seed Libraries in LINCC to get ideas for ways to improve the current seed library. They came back with ideas for donations, organization, displaying, and marketing the seed library.

The Clackamas County Braver Angels hosted a discussion of community members interested in breaking down social and political divides through conversation, engagement, and understanding.

A standing-room-only crowd of enjoyed the Celtic tales and songs of Will Hornyak. The storyteller is a Milwaukie native and a regular favorite here at the library.



Robert helped 3 patrons with technology assistance: resetting older laptops and use of their DVD player.

Robert scheduled Ida West to give a presentation for “Women and Money” on Saturday, June 7th, from 2:00 to 3:00.

Tara coordinated with Colleen Johnston (Clackamas County Master Recycler) to host the third Repair Fair to be held in the Ledding Library Community Room. For those unfamiliar with repair fairs, they are free community events that bring volunteers with fixing skills and people with broken items together. The goal is to extend the lifetime of everyday objects and reduce waste. A total of **52 repairs** were made.

The Milwaukie Poetry Series hosted featured poet Judy Montgomery and a bilingual Arabic poetry reading this month.



Tara hosted award-winning writer Maggie Stuckey, author of *The Bountiful Container* and *The Container Victory Garden*. Maggie shared how even with little or no suitable outdoor garden space just about anyone can grow their own healthy food. It was a packed house.

To demonstrate just how easy it is, Maggie planting up an actual container garden, sharing tips & tricks and answering questions as she goes along. Everyone in the audience was entered into a drawing, and one lucky person got to take home the finished garden.



Teens took over the library at our Spring Break Teen Lock-In. Staff from N. Clackamas Parks & Recreation District joined 6 library staff for the Friday night after-hours event. For two and a half hours, teens could enjoy pizza, karaoke, video games, ping pong, a photo booth, button-making, board games or just a place to hang out.

Science educator Rick Reynolds brought hands-on activities, magnifying glasses and a variety of bat skeletons to his Helpful Hungry Bats program during Spring Break. We also offered a drop-in art lab with bookmark-making supplies and a weeklong scavenger hunt.



March Book Displays:

Our main lobby display featured Women's History Month. Women's history was also highlighted in the teen room and the Children's library. Our second lobby display showcased Irish American Heritage Month. Additional displays throughout the library included Ramadan & Eid Al-Fitr and Jane Austen (the author was born 250 years ago this year).
