Celebrate Earth Day at the Volunteer Restoration Event on Saturday, April 22

In celebration of Earth Day, the city is hosting a volunteer restoration event at the Willow Place Natural Area (4699 SE Pennywood Dr.) in the Lake Road neighborhood on **Saturday, April 22 from 9 to 11 a.m.** The natural area is a 1-acre greenspace that serves as a stormwater detention facility, while providing valuable habitat and environmental benefits.



Volunteers will focus on removing invasive plant species, such as English Ivy, English Holly, Sweet Cherry and Clematis to help the existing native trees and shrubs thrive. Later, volunteers will plant out the site after more area has been cleared. Community members are welcome to stop by to help with part or all the event, or make a quick visit to pick up free tree seedlings and learn about the city's natural resource work. Light refreshments are provided.

Volunteers should wear weather-appropriate clothing and shoes for uneven or muddy terrain. Gloves and tools are provided, but volunteers are welcome to bring their own.

City Updating Reporting and Permitting Systems

The city, partnering with GovBuilt, has improved its reporting and permitting systems. Soon, a new platform to apply for a tree removal permit, submit a municipal code violation complaint or pay a business tax will be up and running. The new systems come with new features, for example, code complaints can be submitted using “pin to map” features to provide a picture of the violation, and tree permitting no longer needs to be completed using PDF documents or paper copies, to name a few. Neighborhood Hubs Planning Enters Phase 2

WHAT IS A NEIGHBORHOOD HUB?

Neighborhood hubs are gathering places where community members have easy access to goods and services close to their homes, and where neighbors can create meaningful relationships with each other. Hubs vary in size and intensity, with some as small as a neighborhood tool library and others as large as a cluster of mixed-use buildings with housing above shops and services.

The city is exploring planning, placemaking and economic development tools that will help encourage hubs at various stages of growth, while allowing new hubs to emerge. The development of a hub, however, will primarily come from private property owner motivation.



PROJECT BACKGROUND

In 2017, City Council incorporated neighborhood hubs into the Milwaukie Community Vision & Action Plan after a citywide engagement process that included more than 1,000 residents.

Neighborhood hubs are a critical component of the city's Comprehensive Plan implementation process—the city integrated hubs into the 2040 Comprehensive Plan and developed recommendations for future hub implementation. Outreach in 2018 and 2019 helped the city better understand each hub, including economic conditions, growth potential, and community support.

NEXT STEPS

City staff will create an action plan with the goal of helping hubs grow to meet community needs. A community engagement process will refine the hubs vision, including a focus on identifying the needs of property owners, businesses and underrepresented communities as they relate to the growth and development of hubs.

HOW CAN COMMUNITY MEMBERS GET INVOLVED?

Milwaukie's Historic Fruit Orchards



In celebration of Earth Day, take a moment to learn the beginning of Milwaukie's fruit orchards, which become known as the birthplace of orchards in the Pacific Northwest.

In summer 1847, Henderson Luelling left Iowa, bringing across the plains several hundred yearling grafted sprouts of apple, pear, cherry, plum, prune, peach, grape, and an assortment of berries. These were placed in soil in two large boxes, made to fit into a wagon bed, then carefully watered and tended on the long and hazardous 6-month journey with an ox team, thousands of miles to the banks of the Willamette River, just north of Milwaukie.

On the grounds where Waverly Country Club is located now, a little patch in the dense fir forest was cleared away with great labor and expense, and the first Oregon orchard was set in fall 1847. It was said that the orchard was a more significant representation for the luxury and civilization of this country, than any cargo ship that ever entered the mouth of the Columbia River. A fellow traveler, William Meek, had also brought a sack of apple seeds and a few grafted trees, and a partnership was formed in 1848—the firm of Luelling & Meek, the first nursery.

Seth Lewelling came west on the Oregon Trail in 1850 and joined his brother Henderson at his nursery in Milwaukie in 1853. Henderson traveled on in 1854 and Seth expanded the nursery. Over the years, Lewelling developed and introduced many fine varieties to horticulture, including the Bing, Black Republican, Lincoln and Willamette cherries, as well as the Lewelling grape, Golden prune, Sweet Alice apple, and Lewelling almond.

Window Fall Prevention

The Clackamas Fire District needs your help to reduce the risk of injury to children. Safe Kids Worldwide reports 3,300 children younger than six years old fall from windows each year.



Windows attract curious children. Children younger than seven are most at risk of falling from windows and least likely to remember rules. Most window falls happen from windows with properly installed screens.

Limit window openings to 4 inches with window stops. If you must open windows more than 4 inches, use a window guard or safety screen. Move furniture away from windows, and do not stack items beneath windows.

LAKE ROAD

At the March meeting, Lake Road discussed the unavoidable diversion of traffic onto local streets with ODOT's proposed plan to place tolls on freeways. ODOT and state legislature are trying to raise much-needed revenue to make seismic upgrades on bridges, while also moving traffic quickly and reducing congestion on freeways. It appears as though their focus is not on local streets and communities, but on connecting highways throughout the state. A cost analysis for implementing this tolling system is fluctuating, as well as estimates for the revenue it may bring in. Some think the tolling will cause more problems than it will solve, but more study about this needs to be done. Are there other simple, yet effective options to increase revenue? Last month, the neighborhood and Milwaukie Rotary Club partnered to pick up litter on Lake Road. Yes, littering is against Oregon state law, even cigarette butts. More educational outreach and placing permanent trash receptacles can help prevent some of this. A special thank you to the volunteers who helped!

The FEMA-sponsored Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for hazards that may occur in communities where they live. CERT trains volunteers in

basic disaster response skills, such as fire suppression, light search and rescue, team organization, terrorism response and disaster preparedness, that professional emergency responders can rely on during disaster situations, which allows them to focus on more complex tasks. Locally, team members participate in ongoing monthly training and assist in community events to keep skills current.

Free training classes taught by local FEMA-certified trainers are offered twice yearly. The next class in Milwaukie is held over May 6, 13 and 20. Preregistration is required. Trainees participate in a three full-day Saturdays that combine classroom and hands-on skills training. Following graduation, trainees have the option to apply to join one of four active CERT teams within Clackamas Fire District's boundaries.
