



Milwaukie Fest Brings Fun and Celebration on July 11, 12 & 13

Milwaukie Fest is finally here! The second weekend in July brings three days of fun with a variety of fun activities, including skateboarding, live music, crafts and games, an outdoor movie and professional wrestling!

On Friday, July 11, the city and North Clackamas Parks & Recreation host a night of music and movies at Ardenwald Elementary School from 7:30 to 10 p.m. Milwaukie's own Couch Brass kicks-off the night with New Orleans-style street brass, along with fun lawn games. Barbecue and frozen treats are available for purchase. At dusk, enjoy a free screening of *Despicable Me 4*.

On Saturday, July 12, the event moves downtown from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Main Street will close from Jackson Street to the post office. Each block will have its own theme to highlight the spirit of the community. For a line-up of events hosted on each block, **check out the lineup on page 3** of this newsletter.

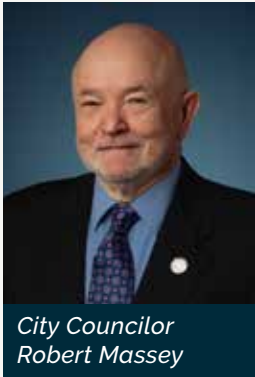
Several community partners are also hosting activities on Saturday. The Milwaukie Mile is hosted at 9 a.m., and pFriem Family Brewers and Keeper Coffee will host a beer garden with food, music and games from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. At 1 p.m., Henry Point Development and the Milwaukie Masonic Lodge will open the original 1938 time capsule from the historic city hall building. The Milwaukie Parks Foundation and Northwest Watersheds Council will host their annual duck race in Milwaukie Bay Park at 5 p.m., and several downtown businesses will feature live music.

Sunday, July 13 will be the biggest farmers market of the season! Come out for facepainting, art projects and summer sales!

Milwaukie's Great Outdoors



In February of this year, City Council adopted three goals for the calendar years 2025 to 2027. In addition to affordability and economic development goals, City Council wanted to focus on natural areas for relaxation and play. Specifically, the goal reads:

Parks and Greenspace: Deliver Milwaukie Bay Park and expand equitable access to greenspace, including the future restored Kellogg Creek natural area.

Why did City Council place such a high priority on parks? Parks have many benefits:

- Promote physical activity that improves health and reduces stress.
- Protect groundwater, improve air quality, and provide wildlife habitat.
- Attract visitors, boosting the local economy and contribute to property values.
- Enhance Milwaukie's overall quality of life with opportunities for play, exercise, meditation, community gatherings and just chilling out.

While Kellogg Creek and Milwaukie Bay Park get much attention, City Council is also focused on smaller parks. We are so pleased with the opening of three new neighborhood parks this year. There is more work ahead to acquire and fund additional sites. Picking the right locations will be important to ensure they are easy to walk to and allow underserved areas to get the attention they deserve.

The city works closely with the North Clackamas Watersheds Council and multiple stakeholders for the Kellogg Dam and natural area project. Several big wins came in the form of federal and Metro grants over the last two years that jumpstarted this work. By 2027, we hope to see the Kellogg Dam removal in progress and restoration of the Kellogg Creek natural area underway. Future federal grants, however, are uncertain, which may impact that timeline.

I want to thank the many residents who wrote, testified and marched for action to develop our beautiful waterfront at Milwaukie Bay Park. After several years of no progress, we are cautiously optimistic about a renewed dialogue with the leadership of the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District. The grassroot voices of our residents truly make a difference.

Each quarter, City Council does a deep dive reviewing our goal action plans and tasks to evaluate progress and maintain accountability. The next parks and greenspace review is at our work session on Aug. 5. Attend or tune in to follow the city's progress on this important goal. Fireworks Prohibited in Milwaukie City Limits

As a reminder, community members are encouraged to take note of a city code about fireworks. City Council passed ordinance 2225, which prohibits the sale, possession and use of fireworks in Milwaukie city limits. The maximum possible fine for a fireworks violation is \$1,000.



In the past, temporary bans have been placed on the use of fireworks when the risk of wildfires was high. After weighing their potential impacts to veterans, pets and wildlife, as well as the continuing fire hazards they pose to homes and other structures, especially during the drier summer months, City Council decided to make the ban permanent. Community members may notice fireworks stands are missing as well. This ordinance extends to them, as well as permanent stores and businesses, within city limits.

For those looking to celebrate Independence Day with fireworks, the city encourages community members to seek out public fireworks displays outside of the Milwaukie area. For more information about the fireworks ordinance, visit www.milwaukieoregon.gov.

King Road Improvement Project Begins Late Summer

The King Road improvement project will repave King Road, between 43rd and Linwood Avenues, and create improved connections for pedestrians and bicyclists. Construction crews will build multi-use paths along both sides of King Road that will connect to the recently-constructed multi-use paths on Linwood and 43rd Avenues. Crews will also rebuild curb ramps at each intersection to meet current ADA standards, and repair water and stormwater lines.

The travel lanes on King Road will remain 12 feet wide, the speed limit will remain 25 MPH between 43rd and 44th Avenue, and 35 MPH between 44th and Linwood Avenue in city limits. The left-turn lane will also remain on King Road.

Northwest Natural has already begun work on their gas line improvements to get ahead of this work that will begin in late summer. This project is made possible thanks to funding from the Safe Access for Everyone (SAFE) program and the Street Surface Maintenance Program. 1938 Time Capsule to be Opened on July 12

As part of the Milwaukie Fest event activities, Henry Point Development, Milwaukie Historical Society, Milwaukie Masonic Lodge and City of Milwaukie are partnering to open the original 1938 time capsule inside the historic city hall building on **Saturday, July 12 at 1 p.m.** The event begins with an official procession led by the American Legion and Milwaukie Masons to the historic city hall building, a flag raising ceremony and remarks by several notable community members. Afterwards, the 1938 time capsule is opened, followed by the official filling and sealing of the new 2025 time capsule, which will be placed inside back in the wall of the historic city hall building. The event concludes with remarks from Travis Henry of Henry Point Development.

Slurry Seal on Residential Streets Begins in Mid-August

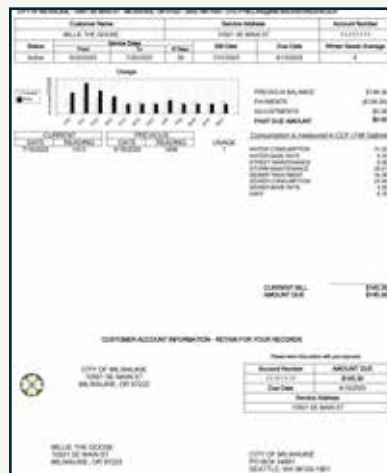


The city's public works and engineering departments maintain about 75 miles of paved road surfaces. Their goal is to extend the serviceable life of the streets in an efficient and fiscally responsible manner. To help achieve that goal, more than four miles of residential streets in the Lake Road, Lewelling, Island Station and Historic Milwaukie neighborhoods are set to be resurfaced with a slurry seal in August 2025. Slurry sealing is a cost-effective preventative treatment that postpones more time consuming and expensive reconstruction projects.

The project is anticipated to **begin on Aug. 19 and finish on Aug. 22**. During this time, the streets are closed to all pedestrian, bicycle and vehicle traffic from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. The slurry seal treatment must cure for 8-10 hours before streets reopen. On-street parking is also prohibited during this time. Notices to community members and businesses affected by the work will be hung on doors 36 to 72 hours prior to the start of work with details about the closure and what to expect while work is underway.
