



City Council Goals for 2023-24 Focus on Climate Resilience, Equity and Parks

After a thoughtful decision process, City Council has adopted three overarching goals to guide their work for 2023 and 2024. City Council goals lead to dedicated financial and staff resources for associated work plans. After several discussions, City Council determined that preserving the three goals set by the previous City Council was the best course of action to fully achieve their intended community impact.

CLIMATE CHANGE MITIGATION & RESILIENCE

The city will take aggressive steps to minimize climate change and increase climate-related resilience by continuing to implement specific actions identified in the city's climate action plan that provide the greatest effect possible.

EQUITY, JUSTICE & INCLUSION

The city further commits to the pursuit of an entirely equitable Milwaukie by supporting the implementation of policies, procedures, practices and training needs identified in the forthcoming diversity, equity and inclusion plan to help lead the city to become more responsive to, more trusted by and more reflective of the community it serves.

IMPROVING MILWAUKIE'S PARK SYSTEM & SERVICES

The city commits to the difficult work of determining whether (and under which terms) to the leave North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District, or to remain in the district and the subsequent actions needed to assure high-quality service for the people of Milwaukie, no matter the outcome.

Letter to the Community: City Council Remains Committed to Important Issues

As your City Council, we remain committed to addressing the most pressing issues impacting our community. We establish City Council goals that guide our work and dedicate resources and capacity towards those priorities.

In January, we held a retreat at which we discussed the many issues that impact Milwaukie residents and our immediate future. We examined past City Council goals that have informed the work of the city, and considered potential areas that reflect the deep needs of our residents and unique opportunities for Milwaukie. In that and subsequent discussions, the majority of City Council settled on continuing the three goals from the prior City Council: implementing our climate action plan, addressing equity and social justice in our community, and forging a path forward for management of Milwaukie's parks.



While we are proud to have identified three important goals in our City Council resolution, we understand that other critical areas were not selected as goals. In discussing the goals, we also considered several possible topics including, but not limited to, economic development, community affordability and the removal of Kellogg Creek dam, which are all important to our community.

We want to assure you that City Council will continue to advocate for issues that were not selected and work with you and community groups to make Milwaukie a thriving, equitable, and sustainable place to live, work, and play.

Real progress is being made with the removal of the dam in the administration of a \$15 million grant for that purpose. That work has a staff person from the City of Milwaukie who is engaged in the project and works closely with partners to move toward the goal of dam removal and restoration of that area of our community. We are excited about this work and will continue to advocate individually around this long-term project.

In addition, we recognize that economic development and creating living-wage jobs are crucial to the success and vibrancy of our community. Council is committed to working with our partners in the private sector to create a thriving and diverse economy that benefits all members of our community.

Further, as a small city, we have a unique opportunity to work together to find solutions that work for everyone. We are committed to doing everything we can to make our community a more affordable place to live. We know that affordability is not just about dollars and cents; it's also about quality of life.

We understand that affordability, particularly in housing, is a top concern for many members of our community. We believe that everyone should have access to safe and affordable housing, and we are committed to finding ways to help make that a reality. Ongoing work on housing affordability will continue for at least two years, including the preparation of a new Housing Capacity Analysis and Housing Production Strategy. That work contains several recommendations which guide the city as we address housing availability, affordability, and quality. The city has also allocated the first \$1.8 million of our Construction Excise Tax to support more affordable housing in the community.

We believe that by working together, we can create a more equitable, affordable and prosperous future for our community. We thank you for your ongoing support and engagement in our identified City Council goals and all these important issues.

Use, Possession and Sale of Fireworks **Prohibited in Milwaukie**



Community members are encouraged to take note of a recent code change regarding fireworks. In February 2023, City Council passed ordinance 2225, which prohibits the sale, possession and use of fireworks in Milwaukie city limits. The maximum possible fine for a fireworks violation is \$1,000.

In the past, temporary bans have been placed on the use of fireworks when the risk of wildfires was high. After weighing their potential impacts to veterans, pets and wildlife, as well as the continuing fire hazards they pose to homes and other structures, especially during the drier summer months, City Council decided to make the ban permanent. Community members may notice fireworks stands are missing this summer as well. The new ordinance extends to them, as well as permanent stores and businesses, within city limits.

Bulky Waste Collection Comes to Milwaukie on June 10 and 17



This year's curbside bulky waste collection event is Saturday, June 10 or June 17, depending on location. The event is meant to help residents dispose of items that don't fit into typical garbage carts and can't be sold or donated. Bulky waste day collections are currently limited to single-family residents within

Milwaukie city limits with current solid waste services. To determine your property's pick-up date and hauler, visit the mapping tool at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/bulkywaste.

THINGS TO REMEMBER:

- · City staff do not coordinate bulky waste day collections and cannot reschedule missed or partial pick-ups—residents must contact their hauler directly to notify them of issues.
- Contact your hauler for a current list of accepted items. A list of standard items is available on the city's website. This list is not exhaustive and haulers should be contacted directly for specific item acceptability.
- Items listed as unacceptable will not be collected.
- Items not prepared correctly will not be collected.
- Do not use your normal carts/bins—these are strictly for regularly scheduled collection days.
- Place all items curbside by 4 a.m. on collection day. Do not add items after 4 a.m.

Bulky waste collection is a lengthy process and takes a significant effort from haulers - please be patient as they work the day of the event. Depending on the volume of items, collection may take all day or into the evening. Haulers may also use multiple trucks to collect specific items.

Please keep in mind: Items collected during bulky waste days go to landfills, so be sure to recycle or donate items whenever possible.

City staff cannot answer questions related to missed pickups or accepted items, or schedule new pickups, it is important to contact your hauler directly for these issues:

Emergency Preparedness: Water Storage

Water is among the most important emergency resources. The Oregon Department of Emergency Management suggests storing one gallon of water per person per day is a good place to start. This water for drinking, as well as cooking and personal hygiene. Specialized water storage containers can be purchased online or at many local retailers, often in the camping section. Tap water can be stored safely in these containers for up to six months. Durable, reusable containers are cheaper to maintain over time because they can be refilled with tap water. If that option is too expensive or overwhelming, gallon jugs of water can be purchased in most supermarkets and are also acceptable storage options, if kept in stable temperatures out of direct sunlight.

The most important thing to remember when preparing for emergencies is that some is better than none. A household that has stored even one gallon of water is better prepared than a household without any at all.
