## City Council Names Pam Denham Volunteer of the Year

City Council recently selected Pam Denham, who started volunteering as soon as she moved to Milwaukie 11 years ago and hasn't stopped since, as the 2024 Volunteer of the Year.

Denham spent eight years as the Island Station Neighborhood District Association's (NDA) representative on the Public Safety Advisory Committee. She's served on the city's Transportation System Plan Advisory Committee since 2023. Currently, she serves as her NDA's secretary. Denham is also currently one of two board members for the Milwaukie Environmental Stewards Group (MESG), which coordinates Styrofoam collection, as well as the annual Sustainability Fair. Terri Geier Brindell, the founder of MESG, had the initial idea for a fair and, with the help of Pam and others, the event is now in its fourth year.

Denham is a member and co-team leader of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). She has taught medical classes for CERT, and helps teach some of the ongoing training. In addition, she is a board member for the Milwaukie Historical Society, which owns and operates the Milwaukie Museum, and a member of the Raging Grannies, a group of women who go out in the streets to promote peace, justice and equality through song and humor.

Her advice for anyone considering volunteering is to, "just step up and do it! Start small and see what you can learn. Give it some time and, if one opportunity doesn't seem to be the right fit, try another one. There are so many options in our city where you can help."

# Middle Housing in Milwaukie: The Good, The Bad, The Opportunity



This past month, I've heard from residents across the city reacting to developments coming to their neighborhoods. To put it bluntly, middle housing is different from the urban fabric we are accustomed to. I know many families who say they would not want to live in houses so small without dedicated parking. Absolutely fair. I also know many families in my generation who are desperate to buy a home but have resigned themselves to the idea that this will forever be out of their reach. These houses are unfamiliar,

but in Portland, new middle housing units are selling for ~\$300,000 less than new single-family homes. When we talk about affordability in Milwaukie, middle housing is going to play a key role.

The Shortstack development in the Ardenwald neighborhood shows me what we can achieve with middle housing. What once was a deteriorating house sitting on a large lot is being developed into 15 affordable homes. This project uses an innovative community land trust model, allowing individuals to buy a home while a non-profit retains ownership of the land the units sit on. Combining these strategies, the sale price of each home is expected to be \$245,000.

My qualm with our middle housing growth: despite the lofty goals we set as a city, most neighborhoods in town are not walkable. By and large, our sidewalk network is woefully incomplete and our strict zoning code makes it illegal to build things worth walking to. Density for density's sake is not the policy direction we should take as a city, we

must balance growth with livability.

How do we do this? We need to bolster our SAFE program to build more sidewalks in growing neighborhoods, legalize corner stores across the city, and develop thriving neighborhood hubs within walking distance of all residents. This new growth will pay higher property taxes than existing



housing, helping subsidize city services. The new clustering of residences helps us deploy city services more efficiently, stabilizing the cost of doing city business. As these units are built, developers pay system development charges (SDCs) that fund improvements in our parks, utilities, and streets. If we harness growth, Milwaukie has the potential to create a positive feedback loop that will bring great things for our residents. We've already begun to see this in our downtown as it comes back to life. But to continue this, we must have the foresight to act.

## Hillside Construction Update



Construction on Phase 1 of Clackamas County's Hillside Park project is moving along, tracking on budget and on time. Below are some recent construction highlights. Stay tuned for more exciting updates in the future.

- Building A This is the building closest to 32<sup>nd</sup> Avenue. Framing for all residential floors is nearly complete, and crews will transition to roof construction soon. Completion date is approximately May/June 2026.
- Building B This is the middle building. The roof has been installed, and mechanical, electrical and plumbing work continues. Completion date is approximately May/June 2026.
- Building C This is the building farthest from 32<sup>nd</sup> Avenue. Installation of the interior finishes has begun, including cabinets and countertops. Exterior cladding and painting have also begun. Completion date is approximately January 2026.

## **Summer Construction**

Construction season is officially here! Many have likely noticed a lot of construction activity happening throughout Milwaukie. Summer typically brings warmer temperatures and dry weather, both ideal for street and public improvement projects. It's also typically the time of year when the city initiates projects called out in its Capital Improvement Plan, which includes work such as street, sidewalk, asphalt, water, stormwater and sewer line development—all critical components to maintaining the quality of life in Milwaukie, but can certainly disruptive while they're being built. # Bulky Waste Collection on June 14 and June 21

The annual curbside bulky waste collection event, which helps dispose of items that don't typically fit into garbage carts and can't be donated or sold, is back again on Saturday, June 14 (for the southwest side of city) and Saturday, June 21 (for the northeast side of city).

Collection is limited to single-family residential homes within Milwaukie city limits and current solid waste services. To determine a property's pick-up date and hauler, use the mapping tool at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/bulkywaste.

#### THINGS TO REMEMBER:

- City staff do not coordinate Bulky Waste Day pickups and cannot reschedule missed or partial pickups. Residents must contact their hauler directly to notify them of pickup issues.
- A list of standard items is available on the city's Bulky Waste Day webpage. Accepted items vary by hauler. Incorrectly prepared or unacceptable items will not be collected. Reach out to your hauler directly to verify item eligibility and pickup requirements for specific items.
- Items must not exceed the equivalent of five garbage bags or one couch.
- Do not use the normal carts/bins, these are strictly for regularly scheduled pick-up days.
- Place all items curbside by 6 a.m. on collection day. Do not add items after 6 a.m.
- Items collected during Bulky Waste Day collections go to landfills, so please recycle or donate items when possible. Use the Metro Find a Recycler tool to find a donation or recycling center for specific items at oregonmetro.gov/ tools-living.
- Collection is a lengthy process and takes a significant effort from haulers. Please show patience and understanding as they manage the day. Depending on the volume of items that require pick-up, collection may extend into the evening, and haulers may use multiple trucks.

City staff cannot answer questions related to missed pick-ups or hauler-accepted items, and cannot schedule new pick-ups. It's important to contact haulers directly for these issues:

# Milwaukie History Talk: First Fruits



On Saturday, June 28 at noon, author Linda Ziedrich discusses her book First Fruits: The Lewellings and the Birth of the Pacific Coast Fruit Industry, a fascinating look at the lives of horticulturists Henderson, Jonathan and Seth Lewelling. Traveling across the Overland Trail--Henderson to Oregon in 1847, with a wagonload of fruit trees, and Seth and John to California three

years later--the brothers would establish themselves as pioneers in the west's growing fruit industry. By recounting how Henderson planted the first orchard of grafted fruit trees in Oregon, how Seth originated the Black Republican and Bing cherries, and how John led the development of the Napa Valley wine industry, First Fruits preserves the Lewellings' place in history.

Ziedrich writes about food from garden to table, culinary history, and the cuisines of the world. Her books include *The Curious Kitchen Gardener: Uncommon Plants and How to Eat Them* and *The Joy of Pickling*, now in its third edition. She lives in Lebanon, Oregon. This is a free event, with seating available on a first-come, first-seated basis. ## Milwaukie Porchfest Returns July 11, 18 and 25





## **Author Talk: Judith Barrington**

In celebration of Pride month, attend a special reading and author talk with Judith Barrington on **Sunday, June 15 at 3 p.m.** The 14 literary memoirs collected in Barrington's new book, *Virginia's Apple*, explore her life across six decades. The content is wide-ranging—the early days of Second Wave feminism, navigating a sometimesprecarious existence as an out lesbian long



before it was commonplace, leaving England and becoming an American citizen, finding a life partner, and growing old with an inherited disability. These stories are laced with humor and joy, while pulsing below the surface is the slow unfolding of delayed grief over her parents' drowning when she was nineteen, revealing how such a loss can shape a life.

Barrington is a poet, memoirist, teacher and feminist activist. She has published five books of poetry, three poetry chapbooks, two memoirs and a book on memoir for writers. She was born in Brighton, England in 1944, lived in London and Spain, and moved to Portland in 1976 which she has made her home ever since. ## **Bicycle Safety**

Summer is here, which means outdoor activities on the roadways increases, including bicycle traffic. It's important for both drivers and bicyclists to remember the Stop as Yield law. This law allows bicyclists to treat a stop sign or flashing red light as a yield sign, but they

must make sure to slow and check for traffic that has the right of way. Bicyclists must stop, if necessary, to prevent a crash. For motorists, be sure to watch for bicyclists and give them ample space.
