Future Milwaukie City Hall Building to Receive Official Signs in Early March

Exciting things are happening as the city repurposes the former Advantis Credit Union building into Milwaukie's new city hall building. At the beginning of March, the new exterior signage will be installed on the east and west sides of the building. The sign will read "Milwaukie City Hall" (see conceptual rendering above) in white with a backlight to illuminate the sign at night. As a safety precaution, the sidewalk in front of the building will be closed briefly while the Advantis sign is removed and the new sign is installed.

While the building will say Milwaukie City Hall, don't let that fool you! All city services will remain at their current locations until the interior remodel is complete, which is expected in late summer/early fall 2023. Once complete, the new city hall building will consolidate multiple city departments into a central location to provide better community services. The building will feature a new City Council and municipal court chambers and additional community meeting space. The city will provide additional updates as construction continues, and communicate any potential disruptions to city services.

Working to Address Affordability Issues in Milwaukie

Milwaukie, we hear you and we're listening. Affordability is an issue that elected officials have been fighting for over the years at every level of government. Time and again, the public has watched the same movie play out: "Cost of Living Increases, Wages Don't," or at least not nearly at the same speed and voracity. Everything from a box of cereal to gas has risen exponentially thanks to a combination of inflation, supply chain issues and corporate greed. All of this with little to no respite in sight for people

and their families. This article isn't to point out the obvious, but rather to tell you that we see what's happening, we understand and empathize with the real struggles people are facing just to keep what they have and put food on the table. There's not a single day that goes by where this topic is not on my mind.

Nothing in government is easy, especially when it comes to funding programs and providing the essential services the community needs. Increasing the rates paid by residents seems to be the default mechanism to create that funding. While it's a difficult decision to make, it's an easier path to take. But, we weren't elected because it's easy, nor were we elected to increase the cost of living on people. We were elected to do the hard work, the not-so-easy tasks, the things that impact the everyday lives of people in a positive way that enhances and improves quality of life. Tips for Fraud Prevention and Avoiding Identity Theft

A responsible consumer can minimize the risk of identity theft by exercising caution and prudence. Below are a few tips:



- For passwords, avoid using easily available information, such as a mother's maiden name, birthdate, last four digits of a SSN or phone number. Instead, use a unique password that includes a series of upper- and lower-case letters, numbers and symbols.
- Secure personal information in the home, especially for those with roommates, frequent visitors, or employ outside work or services done in the home.
- Don't give out personal information on the phone, through the mail or over the internet unless you initiated the contact or are sure the contact is legitimate. Identity thieves are skilled liars that often pose as a representative from a bank, internet service provider, or even government agencies to obtain information.
- Double-check customer service contacts are legitimate by verifying their phone number with account statements or official websites.
- Guard mail and trash from theft. Deposit outgoing mail in post office collection boxes or at a local post office branch instead of an unsecured mailbox.
- Promptly remove mail from personal mailboxes. Don't allow it to remain unattended while away at work or shopping. If you are planning to be away from home, call the U.S. Postal Service at 1.800.275.8777 (or your local Post Office phone number) to ask for a vacation hold.

Please remember, the Milwaukie Police Department (MPD) will **NEVER** call to ask for money or financial payments over the phone. If you suspect someone is not legitimately calling from the MPD, hang up and call the non-emergency line at 503.786.7500 to verify.

Community Works Together to Develop Housing Strategies

The current housing crisis has impacted many people, some much more than others. For the last 10 years, housing prices and rent has increased dramatically. For the last several years, the city has worked with housing experts, community members and City Council to better understand the city's housing needs along with strategies to help address them. In fall 2022, the city conducted a community survey to better understand housing needs in Milwaukie—a special thanks to those who completed it! In January 2022, City Council discussed a housing capacity analysis about housing demand and land available for development, and the Housing Capacity Technical Committee met to discuss potential housing strategies. Among those groups is the Public Safety Advisory Committee, which is tasked with reviewing a variety of safety-related needs, including city infrastructure related to pedestrian, bicyclist and driver safety, as well as emergency management, and making recommendations to City Council. Our meetings are hybrid, so I can join from home, which makes it easier to participate with a new baby (Rowan). Connecting with fellow members has also enabled me to learn about other ways to volunteer and contribute. When Stephan Lashbrook asked for additional help for the waterfront Winter Solstice event, I happily strapped Rowan into his front pack and we poured hot chocolate for the hundreds of friends and neighbors who showed up on a cold December night to watch the ships decorated with lights on the Willamette River. As a member of the Public Safety Advisory Committee, I deeply believe coming together to work with and know your neighbors is an important way to ensure public safety for all."

Electrification Information Session

On **March 20 from 6 to 7:30 p.m.** at the Ledding Library (10660 SE 21st Ave.), community members can attend an informative event about the benefits and cost-saving incentives for transitioning to electric. During the session, local experts will address:

- How methane gas is one of the most significant contributors to climate change
- New research about the amount of methane and other toxins leaking inside homes from gas stoves and the health hazards that leakage presents
- Available and soon-to-be available tax incentives to electrify homes

The library parking lot is limited. Attendees are encouraged to use nearby street parking, if possible.

New Statewide Parking Regulations in Effect

In March 2020, Governor Brown issued Executive Order 20-04, directing state agencies to reduce climate pollution. In response, the State of Oregon Land Conservation and Development Commission adopted rules requiring jurisdictions in metropolitan areas to update certain regulations intended to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Some of these rules address how jurisdictions regulate parking.

At the beginning of 2023, Milwaukie and other metro cities can no longer require off-street parking for affordable housing, small dwelling units or childcare uses. Also exempt from required off-street parking is any development located within three quarters of a mile of the MAX Orange Line or within a half mile of bus lines running four times per hour. This rule disallows Milwaukie from requiring off-street parking on roughly 81% of the city's properties. By June 30, 2023, the city must also either remove parking requirements citywide or adopt more complex parking regulations for the 19% of properties where parking mandates may still be applied. For this reason, City Council directed staff to remove off-street parking mandates citywide. These policies are not intended to prevent builders from providing parking. Instead, it is to allow the market to set the correct amount of parking in new developments and avoid overbuilding.

Smoke Alarm Safety Tips

Smoke alarms save lives. When properly installed and maintained, smoke alarms play a vital role in reducing fire deaths and injuries. If there is a fire in the home, smoke will spread quickly, but smoke alarms provide time to get out.

Important to know:

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms in every bedroom and outside each separate sleeping area. Install smoke alarms on every level of the home.
- Smoke alarms should be interconnected—when one sounds, they all sound. When smoke alarms sound, get outside and stay outside.
- Test smoke alarms once a month to ensure they are functioning properly.
- Replace all smoke alarms in the home every 10 years.
